(**The meeting was called to order at 1:05 p.m.**)

CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:

Legislators on the Veterans Committee, please come to the horseshoe. We're about to begin with the Pledge of Allegiance. Everybody, if you'll please rise and join Legislator Sarah Anker in the Pledge of Allegiance.

(**Salutation**)

Thank you. If we can remain standing, please, one sec. Please remain standing for a moment of silence. Let us remember all those men and women who have lost their lives in service to our country, and those who continue to sacrifice to ensure our freedoms.

Today, we ask that we specifically remember two U.S. soldiers who were killed in the Nangarhar Province of Afghanistan on February 8th, Sergeant 1st Class Antonio Rodriguez, who was just 28 years old, and Sergeant 1st Class Javier Gutierrez, who was also just 28 years old. Both were killed as a result of wounds sustained while engaged in combat operations. Please keep them and their families and friends in your thoughts and prayers.

(**Moment of Silence**)

Thank you. Thank you. Please be seated. Okay. I don't believe we have any correspondence, but we have some cards today in our Public Portion. Our first speaker, I would like to call up Cathie Doherty. Cathie.

MS. DOHERTY:

Good afternoon.

CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:

Good afternoon, Cathie. How are you?

MS. DOHERTY:

I'm doing well.

CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:

Good.

MS. DOHERTY:

I think I've met most of you and spoken before in front of you, but for the ones I haven't, I'm Cathie Norton Doherty. I'm a Navy veteran, daughter of a veteran, wife of a veteran, and now mom of a Navy veteran. I'm a female veteran advocate here in Suffolk County, and recently appointed to the Women Veterans Advisory Board, very thankful for that.

I don't think there's any opposition, hopefully not, in this room, to Women Veterans Appreciation Day, but I can tell you in the trend I've seen across the country, in this being passed in other states and counties, there is actually opposition against it. So touching on that really quick, even presidents of local veteran organizations here in Suffolk feel we should all be united as

1 veterans. I agree, we are. We love all women, but we still have a
2 Mother's Day where we recognize mothers. We have a Vietnam
3 Veterans Day.

4
5 So the other day -- my husband and I live in Patchogue, wonderful
6 place, thanks to Rob Calarco and our Mayor. We live across from a
7 park and we've actually -- I have a very old Tahoe, beat up,
8 sitting in the driveway, and on the back we have stickers,
9 Desert Storm veteran and Navy veteran. So we've actually had
01:08PM 10 people come and knock on our door thanking us for our service,
11 usually my husband. We get stopped sometimes in a grocery store
12 parking lot, people see it. And, of course, Applebee's, when we go
13 for our Veterans Day dinner, you know, they look to my husband and
14 thank him for his service.

15
16 (*Laughter*)
17

18 So it's not anything I've gotten used to, but I've learned to live
19 with it. It's tougher at the V.A., when they expect me to display
01:08PM 20 a dependent I.D., instead of a veteran I.D.

21
22 But, anyway, last week, I came out to my car, after we had a
23 meeting discussing the importance of a Women Veterans Appreciation
24 Day, and it -- I got a little note and it said, "*Thank you and/or*
25 *your son for your service, from a very grateful American.*" And
26 while I appreciate that, my cousin -- my husband's car parked next
27 to mine is a little Nissan Versa, so you might tend to think he's
28 the driver of the Tahoe and I'm the Versa; not. And I have a
29 daughter who lives in my home, too. So to me, I just kind of
01:09PM 30 thought, oh, boy, you know, they don't picture this face when they
31 picture a veteran, they picture my dad, my husband, my son. And I
32 think until we change that, I think until little girls know it's
33 okay to see me wearing a veteran sweatshirt, and come up and thank
34 me for my service and not be scared, I think that it's very
35 important we pass Women Veterans Appreciation Day and get our local
36 organizations and businesses involved. So thank you. Have a
37 wonderful day.

42 Cathie, don't go anywhere, we have -- we have some questions for
43 you. First, we want to thank you for your service.

44
45 **MS. DOHERTY:**

46 Thank you.

47
48 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

49 And, also, for your service on the Women's Veterans Advisory Board
01:10PM 50 as the new, newly voted in secretary.

51
52 **MS. DOHERTY:**

53 Thank you.

54
55 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

56 So thank you very much for that and everything that you do.

MS. DOHERTY:
Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:
Legislator Fleming has a question for you.

LEG. FLEMING:
Hi. And thank you for your service. I do -- I appreciate your point. That's in a way almost symbolic, or sentimental in a way, but I think there's also a really important policy-driven reason to specifically recognize women veterans. And I wonder, in your capacity as serving on the Advisory Council, and thank you for your leadership in helping to form the Council --

MS. DOHERTY:
Thank you.

LEG. FLOTTERON:
-- could you just give us a couple of thoughts about policy issues that we, as policy-makers, might have an easier time bringing to the attention of the taxpayers and the people who would fund efforts to meet the needs and concerns that are unique to women veterans? If you could just -- I think recognizing women veterans specifically, as you say, until such time as it's normalized --

MS. DOHERTY:
Right.

LEG. FLEMING:
-- will help us, as policy-makers, advocate for specific issues that are unique to you. And I don't know if it's too early in your process, but could you just maybe give us a couple of thoughts as to what those might be?

MS. DOHERTY:
I'm going to answer your question, and then I'm going to also defer to the next speaker, Stacey, because I believe in her job she has more of a capacity to know right now when we're dealing with homeless women veterans which we have many of in Suffolk, and the process for them to get adequate transitional housing, as opposed to a homeless shelter, or a substance abuse shelter, or something like that, transitional housing for them that they can bring their children. I think that's something very needed on Long Island. We do not have it. We have very good models of it across the country. There's a process in Suffolk County right now for women to receive help with housing, and that's what I'm going to refer to Stacey on. She's more familiar, I think, with where those roadblocks are in trying to get women veterans.

I think you are all doing a great job so far, and when we come forward, lack of resources still, lack of places specifically geared towards us, safe, comfortable environments. And you've been wonderful in the past with places like Warrior Ranch, when we come and look for help securing property or securing funding. I am a 100% firm believer in peer mentoring and peer, one-on-one peer,

1 veteran to veteran. I think the Dwyer Program and programs like it
2 that follow are very important, and funding's very, very important
3 to them.

4
5 I think nobody really, truly -- like anything you go through, I
6 can't really understand what it's like to be a Legislator, or if we
7 experience loss, we can't understand truly another person's, unless
8 we've experienced so similar, and it's like that for women
9 veterans. While people are very well intended and want to help, we
01:13PM 10 know how to help each other. So I think listening to us and
11 focusing the funding, I know that's big in New York right now, that
12 programs like the Dwyer Program get funded. And now I'll refer to
13 Stacy, if --

14
15 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
16 All right. Don't go anywhere.

17
18 **MS. DOHERTY:**
19 Okay.

01:13PM 20
21 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
22 But I will point out to everyone that Cathie brought forward at the
23 last Women's Veterans Advisory Board meeting that there is not a
24 female gynecologist --

25
26 **MS. DOHERTY:**
27 Right.

28
29 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
30 -- at the V.A., so, right.

31
32 **MS. DOHERTY:**
33 Yeah. I didn't know if you wanted me to touch on the V.A. issues.

34
35 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
36 Well, I mean, that's something I think the Legislators need to
37 know. We are -- you know, we're working on a draft of a letter,
38 which, you know, hopefully, I would assume the females will sign on
39 to, but, hopefully, everybody on this committee will sign on to,
01:14PM 40 asking the V.A. to -- you know, to have a female gynecologist.

41
42 **MS. DOHERTY:**
43 Right.

44
45 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
46 Because nothing is like more crazy to me than not having -- there
47 are female doctors in every other type of medicine that a V.A. can
48 go to -- that a veteran can go to. They -- and if they don't have
49 them, they import them from one of the hospitals and have them come
01:14PM 50 in --

51
52 **MS. DOHERTY:**
53 Right.

54
55 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
56 -- except in gynecology.

1
2 **MS. DOHERTY:**
3 Right.

4
5 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
6 There's only a man. Now there's one woman on staff, apparently,
7 that is in the emergency room that nobody has ever seen, no female
8 veteran has ever seen in a gynecological appointment.

9
01:14PM 10 **MS. DOHERTY:**
11 And we can't make an appointment with her.

12
13 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
14 Right.

15
16 **MS. DOHERTY:**
17 And this has been ongoing for us locally, Suffolk County and Nassau
18 County, with Northport. We can't fix the V.A. system countrywide,
19 but Northport we can try to. And what I had found was women from
01:15PM 20 87 years old down to 27 years old didn't want to go to the
21 Northport V.A. for their GYN care, even if they were 100%
22 service-connected, because their only choice of GYN care was a male
23 doctor. And without any specific complaints against him, of
24 course, I believe he's a good doctor, he's a little bit older.
25 With that, we have -- somewhere close to 80% women veterans make it
26 out of the military facing issues from MST. So, personally, I find
27 it insensitive to ask them to see a male doctor if that's not
28 within their comfort level.

29
01:15PM 30 So we've met with everybody from our Congressmen to the Director of
31 the Northport V.A., up to the Chief of Staff of Veterans Affairs.
32 And the Northport V.A. says that they cannot put out a want ad
33 specifically for a female hire, because that's against the law. I
34 get that, but the sensitivity and -- I mean, we're just talking
35 about helping women veterans to feel safe.

36
37 So when we ask women veterans and we ask ourselves why are women
38 veterans not comfortable going to the V.A., why they're not going
39 there for their healthcare, and why is the number growing every day
01:16PM 40 of women veterans who are committing suicide, I think it's very --
41 it's just ridiculous to not look at an issue like that with our
42 healthcare.

43
44 And I could go on for a couple of more things about the V.A., like
45 our -- if you go to receive MST counseling at the V.A., you sit in
46 the same waiting room as any other man, or anyone going for any
47 other type of mental health help. So as an MST survivor, you could
48 potentially sit in the waiting room with --

49
01:17PM 50 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
51 Cathie, tell everybody what MST is, for those who don't know what
52 that is.

53
54 **MS. DOHERTY:**
55 Military Sexual Trauma.

1 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

2 Right.

3
4 **MS. DOHERTY:**

5 So you could sit in the same room with the person who abused you or
6 violated you, so that's kind of crazy. And where the women's
7 clinic is actually located, on the fourth floor in the hospital in
8 the furthest corner. So what I found, not just myself, for a
9 long time I thought it was me, until I became an advocate and
01:17PM 10 started talking to women veterans, and I found that we have like --
11 we walk through the front door and there's just rows and rows of
12 chairs of male veterans, a lot who live in the building up there
13 and kind of spend their day in the lobby of the V.A. And we call
14 it "*The Gauntlet*", because it's like walking in and hearing every
15 comment from, "*You're too pretty to have served,*" to whatever else
16 I won't repeat in this room. So we ask for little things of the
17 Director up there, from the past seven of them. Change the chairs,
18 just turn them around. Move them, make a lounge downstairs, but
19 make it more comfortable. Move the women's clinic, stuff like
01:18PM 20 this.

21
22 So we appreciate now that we have the Advisory Board, and we can
23 keep you all posted on what we're doing. Right now, I could use
24 letters that you think it's pretty crazy we don't have access to a
25 female GYN. With that, I'll say cardiology, dermatology, every
26 other clinic at the V.A. you go to, they bring in specialists from
27 Stony Brook to see us. The only clinic they don't do that is
28 Women's Health, so.

29
01:18PM 30 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

31 So Legislator Krupski has a question for you.

32
33 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

34 So you said this MST, there's what percentage of women coming out
35 of the military are --

36
37 **MS. DOHERTY:**

38 It's hard to really know, because so many are unreported, but --

39
01:19PM 40 **MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:**

41 Ninety-one.

42
43 **MS. DOHERTY:**

44 Ninety-one, based on like reported, what we know.

45
46 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

47 That's percent?

48
49 **MS. DOHERTY:**

01:19PM 50 Yes.

51
52 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

53 So is there anything, any steps taken by the military to like
54 address that? Because that's -- because if you have to treat
55 something, it's way more complicated than preventing it.

1 **MS. DOHERTY:**

2 Right. And I think in the military, based on my experience now
3 back in the early '90s, to seeing my son's experiences on his ship
4 just in the past few years, the military really isn't doing a lot
5 to change it. There's still issues with being able to report it at
6 your command and not face consequences.

7
8 So I go to a lot of conferences and different things, talk to a lot
9 of women veterans on where we think changes could be made in the
01:19PM 10 military, but I think it's so far rooted and deep, it's going to
11 take a lot. And I think we have to right now look to take care of
12 them when they come home as an initial step in helping the whole
13 process, because the military's almost untouchable.

14
15 Right now, and it goes before Congress all the time, the Feres
16 Doctrine. The Feres Doctrine was put in place I think after World
17 War II, maybe World War I, but it states that military members
18 cannot sue the U.S. Government for whatever physical injury they
01:20PM 19 incur while in active duty. So if you lose a limb while you're in
20 combat, you cannot sue the military. We sign waivers, pretty much.
21 Under that is still rape. So if you're raped on active duty, no
22 matter what failures fail the service member after that chain of
23 command, or whatever, she cannot sue the military, she cannot sue
24 the U.S. Government.

25
26 So we -- I know that there are certain Congress people out there,
27 like Kirsten Gillibrand, who actively try and get that specifically
28 altered, that Feres Doctrine either overturned. They don't want to
29 do that. They feel it will open up a can of worms, everybody will
01:21PM 30 be suing the government. So I leave that in your hands, but I
31 don't know what that process is, but that needs to be taken out of
32 the Feres Doctrine. And then there would be consequences for rape,
33 sexual assault on active duty, and then maybe we would see the
34 numbers go down.

35
36 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

37 Well, thank you for your service.

38
39 **MS. DOHERTY:**

01:21PM 40 Thank you.

41
42 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

43 Yeah. And just so everybody on the committee knows, it's been
44 incredibly eye-opening sitting with these women, who are, you know,
45 just incredible in the service to their country, and also in
46 service to our local communities and what they've brought forward.

47
48 And I did sit and meet with Kirsten Gillibrand's representative and
49 let her know about this gauntlet that the women have to walk in
01:22PM 50 the -- in the V.A., and maybe move the women's clinic to either
51 another building, because there's no way -- so, if you leave it
52 where it currently is, you know, other than moving the chairs,
53 there's no way to prevent women from having to literally walk
54 through all the men sitting there to get to where the women's
55 center is. So it really should be either moved to another
56 building, we were thinking where the -- where the child care center

1 is, you know, to do that, because that makes the most sense.

2

3 **MS. DOHERTY:**

4 Right.

5

6 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

7 So, you know, start talking about that. And then I hear about, you
8 know, not having any female gynecologist, which is just bizarre
9 land to me.

01:22PM 10

11 So, like I said, I think that the weight of this committee would,
12 you know, really go a long way to help with these issues, and we're
13 putting together these letters and it's -- you know, we just did
14 this the other day. So as soon as we have the draft of this, we'll
15 get it to everybody, and I hope everybody is -- you know, will sign
16 on to try to help the ladies there.

17

18 Thank you. Thank you so much, Cathie.

19

MS. DOHERTY:

21 Thank you. Thank you, everyone.

22

23 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

24 Our next speaker, Stacey Ann Castro-Tapler, our Vice Chair of the
25 Women's Veterans Advisory Committee. Hi, Stace.

26

27 **MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:**

28 Hi, good afternoon. Thank you so much for your time today. Cathie
29 really covered a lot of things, but I have a little bit different
30 perspective. So when I was thinking about speaking today, I was
31 actually anticipating a lot more people being in this room.

01:23PM 30

32

33 So one of the things over the past couple of weeks I've noticed
34 about Legislators is that you have an amazing job. You have such
35 diversity in your job. You can go from one day you're working with
36 a Girl Scout, to the next day you're talking about the lakes in
37 Patchogue, it's amazing. The rest of the population, you don't
38 have that. So that's what I need your help with.

39

41 If I were to ask every single person in this room to close your
42 eyes and give me your picture of a veteran, I would hope you'd all
43 be honest, raise your hand and say that you pictured a male. And
44 that's okay, it's honest. Yes, most of the veterans are male,
45 granted, it's just not all of them.

45

46 So when we're talking about Women's Appreciation Day, listen, it's
47 not that we want a cake (clapping) and somebody to cheer for us,
48 and, you know, \$10 off of our bill somewhere, it's not about that.
49 What it is about is women getting the services that they need and
50 being recognized to get them. I will give you very real life
51 examples.

53 Last week, couldn't figure out why my car insurance was going up.
54 Called. After a very long, drawn-out conversation, I found out
55 that they dropped my military service off my record. Why? They
56 said, "*Well, we dropped your husband off your service*" -- "of

1 *the* -- *"off the policy."* Husband never served. He's a wonderful
2 man, but he never served. We've never said he served, we never
3 claimed he served. For an entire year I paid extra insurance. I
4 should have had a different driver discount. That's a small
5 problem.

6
7 This weekend, I talked to a woman in Upstate New York. Granted,
8 it's not Suffolk. She has no heat, she's living in a trailer. She
9 went to the V.A. to -- for help. They said, *"Let me see your*
01:25PM 10 *DD-214."* She doesn't have it. Okay. Six to eight weeks to get
11 it, six to eight weeks in a trailer Upstate. She went home, came
12 back with her cover and her jacket, figuring that might help. They
13 said, *"Well, you could have got that from Good Will, could have got*
14 *it from somebody else, could be your husband's."* She went home
15 again, got pictures of herself in the uniform, brought them back,
16 then they referred her for other service. Why? Why? We have to
17 go through all that? This woman's in the freezing cold. Just do
18 the right thing. It's about recognizing women as veterans.

19
01:26PM 20 I had another woman tell me that kids on her block came running
21 down to her, knocking on her door, because a cat got hit in the
22 road. So she's like, "All right, I'll help you." They thought she
23 was a veterinarian.

24
25 **LEG. KENNEDY:**
26 Oh.

27
28 (*Laughter*)

29
01:26PM 30 **MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:**
31 We need some help, please, and this is how we're going to do it.
32 So thank you.

33
34 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
35 Thank you, Stacey. Thank you for your service and everything
36 you're doing for the Women's Veterans Advisory Board, too. Like
37 you're -- it's just invaluable what you bring to the table.

38
01:26PM 39 Any questions or anything? Legislator Kennedy has a question for
40 you.

41
42 **LEG. KENNEDY:**
43 Hi, Stacey.

44
45 **MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:**
46 Good morning.

47
48 **LEG. KENNEDY:**
01:26PM 49 Thank you and Cathie for coming out to speak again, we appreciate
50 it. I am taking everything Cathie said to heart.

51
52 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**
53 I don't think your mic's on.

54
55 **LEG. KENNEDY:**
56 What?

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01:27PM

01:27PM

MS. SIMPSON:

Your mic's not on.

LEG. KENNEDY:

Okay, it's on. I just want to make sure that you're aware that Concern For Independent Living has veterans housing on Portion Road in Ronkonkoma. I don't know if they're all filled. I have met some wonderful male and female veterans there. It's clean, it's beautiful, it's up to date, they offer services onsite.

MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:

They do.

LEG. KENNEDY:

Yeah.

MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:

And I am aware of it. So on my day job hat is -- I'm a Supportive Services For Veteran's Families Representative.

LEG. KENNEDY:

Oh, okay.

MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:

So I work for EOC of Suffolk.

LEG. KENNEDY:

Okay.

MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:

I actually speak to veterans who are homeless or in jeopardy of being homeless every single day.

LEG. KENNEDY:

Good.

MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:

I am aware of concern. I'm aware of the Beacon House houses.

LEG. KENNEDY:

Yeah.

MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:

I'm aware of the Association for Mental Health and Wellness. I'm aware of the house in Riverhead. I've got the gamut. I've actually toured a lot of these houses. I am very familiar with the services, and the services are extensive and great.

LEG. KENNEDY:

Right.

MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:

However, they're for veterans that have mental health issues and/or substance abuse. I have healthy women, 100% healthy women that are going into substance abuse houses. So you're taking a healthy

1 woman who has never seen a crack addict before, never seen any of
2 these things, never seen anything. Recently this happened. She
3 was put into a substance abuse house where her roommate committed
4 suicide, overdosed, and she had to clean it up, healthy veteran
5 woman.

6
7 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

8 With no substance abuse issue whatsoever?

9
01:28PM 10

MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:

11 Nothing. She didn't even know what it looked like.

12
13 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

14 That's -- that's a -- that's an issue if she was placed there by
15 some agency, that's a huge issue.

16
17 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

18 They have no place to go.

19
20 **MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:**

21 Yes.

22
23 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

24 They have no place to go.

25
26 **MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:**

27 Yes, they have no place to go. So they go to --

28
29 **CHAIRPERSON BERLAND:**

30 It's the only place to go for women, that's the problem.

31
32 **MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:**

33 Yes, it's a -- it's a problem, you know, it's a big problem. They
34 go through the DSS system, which I'm familiar with. And yes, I get
35 the system, it's not that I don't. But when you have a healthy
36 female veteran telling you that "*I would rather commit larceny and
37 go to the County Jail in Riverhead because they have isolation
38 there*" --

39

41 Right.

42
43 **MS. CASTRO-TAPLER:**

44 -- than go to the shelters that are in Bay Shore, we're doing
45 something wrong, we're not doing something right. They need
46 something else. And there are other counties in -- even in New
47 York, actually, Upstate that have less veteran population than we
48 do that have these transitional homes.

49

51 So, in the future, yes, that is where I'd like to see Suffolk
52 County move to. We have healthy women, they may need some
53 counseling, they may have families, but they don't need to be in a
54 substance abuse shelter, they don't need to be in that restrictive
55 of an environment all the time. There are other women. I have
56 women -- a woman right who's living in her car, just so she can go
