**CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

Okay our Legislators are here. Welcome to the committee. I apologize, I'm dealing with some pollen issues, so hopefully I'll get through this. Please rise for the Pledge of Allegiance led by Legislator Legislator Gonzalez.

***Salutation***

Please remain standing for a moment of silent prayer and meditation as we think of those that have lost, in particular those in our military.

***Moment of Silence Observed***

Thank you.

Okay, I do not have correspondence; however, we do have some cards for public comment. And if I could have the speakers go to the podium over here. I have Anthony Cibelli, please come to the podium. You have three minutes for public comment

**MR. CIBELLI:**

Good morning. As a former paratrooper and two-time combat veteran, I'm completely disgusted with regard to how this tragedy of Thomas Valva has kick-started an initiative to further protect those who are responsible for the death of this eight-year old boy.

If any of you truly cared about the death of this young boy, you would use our subpoena power to launch a true investigation instead of proposing these nonsensical bills. From what I've lived through so far, these bills do not protect families from false allegations and malicious acts. These -- they only further empower those who do these things day-in/day-out claiming that they are working in the best interest of children. When I say that, CPS, judges, lawyers, guardian ad litem.

As it stands, New York State is a one-party consent state to record. While that sounds great and many people do take advantage of that, our evidence of nefarious acts, lies and more are never looked at and brushed under the table. Why would anyone consent not to record CPS when they are present? All of you up here are protecting the criminal enterprise of Suffolk County which has been well-known for quite some time.

Suffolk County has one of the highest paid police forces in the nation, and what they -- and what have they ever done to combat these criminals that are contracted by the County, that lie to steal children, or aid and abet attorneys to award a narcissistic or abusive parent full custody? This is all to protect the County's Title IV-D & E funding. Who are you kidding?

All these bills, including the Inspector General, are more ways to cover up corruption. And if that does pass, one of the first people that it should investigate is Gregory Blass who got to speak

1 in advocating for it. Anyone, anyone associated with a past of  
2 being in contract with Title IV funded agencies should not be doing  
3 any talking here. You can start by investigating all these  
4 individuals for fraud, waste and abuse of Federal funding, but who  
5 would have the fortitude to do that here? These Title IV funded  
6 courts, along with CPS, are directly to blame for the suicide rate  
7 amongst veterans; and the number of veterans taking their lives is  
8 a lot closer to 32, not 22. The following is from Steve Vanderbol,  
9 a veteran like myself and a former Recon Marine.

11 As statistically shown, the most substantial cause of veteran  
12 suicide due to loss of support systems is attributed to violations  
13 of law within the individual states' Family Court System.  
14 Directly, two distinct factors arise from one root cause. The  
15 first factor is the individual states abuse of the Title IV Social  
16 Security Act Program System. These abuses of Federal programs  
17 cause primary violations of Federal law with one violation solely  
18 classed to the veteran community itself.

20 The second factor, the illegal appropriation of disability benefits  
21 as "*income*". Despite several Federal laws prohibiting these  
22 fraudulent activities, the prime actors in these criminal  
23 enterprises falsely declare absolute immunity when confronted with  
24 the direct violations of Federal statute and the attached  
25 substantive due process violations. The abusers are blatant and  
26 the abusers deem themselves impervious to prosecution. Therefore,  
27 their enterprises are inherently collusive and illegal under  
28 Federal law.

31  
32 Title IV of the Social Security Act Constitutes a major  
33 governmental attempt at social reengineering. Objectively,  
34 Title IV is purported to assist the stability of the family when,  
35 in fact, it is often abused to destroy the American family.

38 Thank you, Anthony. If you could wrap up, please?

40 **MR. CIBELLI:**

41 Okay. As I've stated in the past and in front of Nassau County  
42 legislation (*sic*) as well, by applying the Corrupt Motive Doctrine  
43 or Powell Doctrine to the current CPS/Title IV funding, equitable  
44 fake court child trafficking crisis, by applying the Corrupt  
45 Motive, any perjured testimony and acts done in bad faith  
46 demonstrate illegitimate and fraudulent acts thus rendering  
47 everything done to us as fruit of the poisonous tree and that they  
48 were done knowingly seeking a pre-ordained result, most of the time  
49 in ex-parte fashion.

52 Anthony.

54 **MR. CIBELLI:**

55 These courts pray on families and rake in massive Federal funding.  
56 I'll end with this question; what is your motive here? To protect

1 children and families or use the media to exploit tragedies in  
2 hopes of furthering Legislative acts against people to oppress them  
3 in hopes of raking in massive Federal funding. Thank you.

4  
5 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

6 All right. Our next speaker is Sherry Kretsch. Sherry, can you  
7 come to the podium, please? Go ahead.

8  
9 **MS. KRETSCH:**

09:44AM 10 Good morning, everyone. My name is Sherry Kretsch, I am an  
11 involved community member of the Center Moriches/East Moriches  
12 area. I am the Sunday School Superintendent of a local church, I  
13 am involved in the school as a volunteer advisor for the Interact  
14 Club, a student-run forum of the globally-recognized Rotary Club.  
15 But most importantly, I am here as a Mom of four children, all of  
16 which brought me here.

17  
18 So, I'm here in support of the legislation to make April Child  
19 Abuse Awareness & Prevention Month. So what had happened during  
09:44AM 20 Interact Club, our very first meeting after the whole incident with  
21 Thomas Valva, was that the children in the room were not allowed to  
22 speak about what had happened at school. I'm not part of the  
23 school as far as a teacher, so we had a little bit of leeway here  
24 and allowed the children to speak. What they did not know what to  
25 do was where to call or who to be with or who to talk to, which was  
26 really, really sitting very hard on my heart; that they did not  
27 know if there was a real emergency in regards to being abused, that  
28 they could also use the number 911.

29  
09:45AM 30 So it's heartbreaking what happened to Thomas, but even more  
31 heartbreaking that our children have no idea what to do. There  
32 aren't any programs in the school to inform them. There are  
33 limited resources put towards anything for child abuse awareness,  
34 yet these same students participate in activities for the American  
35 Heart Association, breast cancer awareness, and even raise money  
36 for our local animal shelters. I am advocating for our children  
37 that this legislation is designed with our children in mind. It  
38 will help educate, make them aware and empower them to do  
39 something.

41 The yearly Child Abuse Awareness Month will keep our teachers  
42 abreast of the new resources, developments and help outlets.  
43 Giving this to our teachers will improve the lives of our children.  
44 They are our future, they are important, they are worthy and they  
45 are loved no matter what their situation. So please approve the  
46 Child Abuse Awareness Month for April and all of Suffolk County, as  
47 the nation already has a similar agency that works on this. Our  
48 children are just as important as all other children; we need to be  
49 the ones to make sure they know it.

51 And just for you to know, the Interact Club of East Moriches  
52 children created an event called *Paint the Town Blue*. They're  
53 working on this for the end of April with a walk, festivities,  
54 all designed to bring attention to child abuse awareness and  
55 prevention. They have set this forward, it has been on their own  
56 hearts and we are working to do this for them just in our school.

1 It is open to all of the community, all of Long Island. The  
2 legislation set forth today is a start to becoming proactive for  
3 our children, otherwise we're not showing them the love they need  
4 either. Thank you.

5  
6 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

7 Thank you, Sherry. We appreciate it.

8  
9 *Applause*

10  
11 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

12 Can I just ask a question?

13  
14 **LEG. CILMI:**

15 Can I say something?

16  
17 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

18 Yeah. Legislator Hahn and then Legislator Cilmi.

19  
20 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

21 I just have one question for you.

22  
23 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

24 Come back to the podium, please. You have a question.

25  
26 **MS. KRETSCH:**

27 Hi.

28  
29 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

30 So the children that didn't know what to do, were they suggesting  
31 that they were already victims and they wanted to know how they  
32 reported for themselves or what if it should happen in the future?

33  
34 **MS. KRETSCH:**

35 What if. So the question that was presented to the children, it  
36 was a group of 5th to 8th-grade students, there was over 20  
37 children in the room at the time when we addressed the question  
38 *what to do if you or a friend comes to you in such a dire emergency*  
39 *that they're hurting and something's going to happen today and*  
40 *they're not going to make it through the day.* Their answer was --

41  
42 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

43 Yeah, there's no question in my mind.

44  
45 **MS. KRETSCH:**

46 Their answers were call child abuse awareness prevention. You  
47 know, they really didn't know what to do, and they didn't know the  
48 number for that either.

49  
50 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

51 Right.

52  
53 **MS. KRETSCH:**

54 Okay, so they didn't know a number for that. I said, *Well, now you*  
55 *don't know the number for that. Now what are you going to do?* So  
56 they still didn't know. I asked them, *What are you going to do if*

1 *a fire arises in your home?* Call 911. So they know what to do in  
2 an emergency, just not in an emergency that concerns their welfare.

3  
4 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

5 Right. No, I think that's a really important element, you know,  
6 making sure --

7  
8 **MS. KRETSCH:**

9 They need to be empowered.

10  
11 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

12 Yeah, they need to be empowered. Because who knows --

13  
14 **MS. KRETSCH:**

15 And we need to advocate for them to do that.

16  
17 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

18 -- if Thomas had told a friend; you know, who knows?

19  
20 **MS. KRETSCH:**

21 Thomas lived right down the block from us.

22  
23 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

24 Yeah.

25  
26 **MS. KRETSCH:**

27 And it really hit every single one of my children hard, as there  
28 were multiple children the house and my children went to school  
29 with many of the grades of those children.

31 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

32 Yes. Thank you.

33  
34 **LEG. ANKER:**

35 Legislator Cilmi has a question for you.

36  
37 **LEG. CILMI:**

38 Hi. How are you?

39  
40 **MS. KRETSCH:**

41 Hi. How are you?

42  
43 **LEG. CILMI:**

44 Fine, thanks. So I'm an Islip Rotary member. Thank you for the  
45 work that you do with Interact. And I would just ask you if you  
46 could share perhaps with the district what your Interact Club is  
47 doing so that perhaps they could spread the word among all of the  
48 district clubs and maybe make it a bigger effort than what it is in  
49 your area.

51 **MS. KRETSCH:**

52 We certainly could do that.

53  
54 **LEG. CILMI:**

55 That would be great.

56

1 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
2 And we could do that on-line. And if you can share with yours.

3  
4 **LEG. CILMI:**  
5 I will.

6  
7 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
8 Our Interact Club, we're a small district, but those students,  
9 to come up with an idea like that, they really are making a  
10 difference. They help the community monthly by giving donations  
11 and standing out for stuff of us and, you know, helping wherever  
12 they can. So I'll definitely share that.

13  
14 **LEG. CILMI:**  
15 I'll give you a business card; if you could just shoot me a quick  
16 e-mail describing --

17  
18 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
19 Yes, certainly.

20  
21 **LEG. CILMI:**  
22 All right? Thank you.

23  
24 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
25 Thank you.

26  
27 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**  
28 Legislator Gonzalez.

29  
30 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
31 Good morning.

32  
33 **LEG. GONZALEZ:**  
34 Good morning. How are you?

35  
36 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
37 Good.

38  
39 **LEG. GONZALEZ:**  
40 I also share with what Legislator Cilmi is saying. When you're  
41 trying to reach out maybe to all the other organizations within the  
42 district, I also feel that maybe we could even branch out more and  
43 not just go to one district, but through other legislation to the  
44 different districts out there so that we can, you know, put this  
45 forth. This is just not one area, this is all of Suffolk County --

46  
47 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
48 Yes.

49  
50 **LEG. GONZALEZ:**  
51 -- that should be educated on this. I think it's something that is  
52 absolutely wonderful. I'm also -- would like to ask if it can come  
53 before the Education Committee as well so that we can try to put  
54 something forth and bring it to the schools and bring it to -- so  
55 that we can bring this awareness forward.

1 **LEG. CILMI:**  
2 So the Rotary District is all of Long Island.

3  
4 **LEG. GONZALEZ:**  
5 Okay.

6  
7 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
8 Yeah.

9  
09:50AM 10 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**  
11 So, again, I'll make the suggestion again; if we can bring your  
12 presentation in front of the Education Committee which is chaired  
13 by Legislator Gonzalez. So maybe -- again, Rudy, if you're working  
14 with a group we can get you that information --

15  
16 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
17 That would be awesome.

18  
19 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**  
09:50AM 20 -- to get the word out, because this is how we're going to be able  
21 to, you know, make the situation better is working together.

22  
23 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
24 I appreciate all of your help. Thank you.

25  
26 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**  
27 And we appreciate all of what you're doing. So again, thank you.

28  
29 **MS. KRETSCH:**  
30 Thank you so much.

31  
32 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**  
33 Thank you for coming here.

34  
35 Okay, our next speaker is Marie Tooker, if Marie is here.

36  
37 **MS. TOOKER:**  
38 Good morning, everybody. I have a question. A couple of years ago  
39 you made April the Awareness for Animal Cruelty Month. Are we  
09:51AM 40 changing that now to child abuse? I'm just curious.

41  
42 The resolutions that you've been writing is pretty much evidence of  
43 you guys still covering things. There's nothing in there to go  
44 after immunity, perjury, filing false instruments, nothing at all  
45 states about a corrupt judge or a false allegation. Although we do  
46 need awareness, writing resolutions to make days of the month or a  
47 month under this is not -- what is it doing? What is it doing, if  
48 you don't go and prosecute for perjury or false instruments filed?

49  
09:52AM 50 So there are other ways of writing resolutions, and this resolution  
51 should be directing the County Executive Steve Bellone, the  
52 District Attorney Tim Sini, and the Administrative Judge Hindrichs  
53 to resign for theft of service, causing a State-created danger,  
54 obstruction of justice, corruption and bribery. Directing this  
55 Legislator (*sic*) to file a complaint against Tim Sini, the County  
56 Executive and Judge Hindrichs whereas, Suffolk County District

1 Attorney's Office is responsible for investigating crimes under New  
2 York State Penal Law involving perjury and filing false  
3 instruments, falsifying records, tampering with evidence, tampering  
4 with a witness has been ignored with thousands of complaints from  
5 we the people of Suffolk County, New York. How? Tell me, how are  
6 you having Tim Sini convene a Grand Jury to protect himself, cover  
7 up more? He was well aware of what happened, he was told and he  
8 did nothing.

10 Whereas, Suffolk County Child Protective Services Bureau, a  
11 subdivision of the Suffolk County Department of Social Services,  
12 does not provide critical services to children and families who are  
13 in crisis across the County, and uses their office to alarm,  
14 threaten and instill fear into parents under false allegations.  
15 When CPS is called for a real crisis they leave the child with the  
16 abuser. Where 90% of CPS reports are alleged child abuse and  
17 maltreatment are false and still CPS arranges for ongoing  
18 harassment to the child and their family causing irreparable harm.

21  
22 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

23 Okay, Marie, your time is up. Thank you.

24  
25 **MS. TOOKER:**

26 I'll leave you with one thing; how is it that Tim Sini has William  
27 Ferris under him who his secretary, on recording, stated that he  
28 does favors for Judge Leis? How do we work with people like that?  
29 How do you give us our trust?

31 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

32 Marie, I'm going to have to ask you to wrap up, please.

33  
34 **MS. TOOKER:**

35 I know. Anker, you don't even know that you have jurisdiction over  
36 Family Court matters, do you? Did you even know?

37  
38 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

39 Marie, this is not the time to ask --

40  
41 **MS. TOOKER:**

42 I know it's not.

43  
44 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

45 -- questions. If Legislators have a question for you --

46  
47 **MS. TOOKER:**

48 One more thing. Instead of firing and charging --

49  
50 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

51 I'm going to have to ask you to please leave.

52  
53 **MS. TOOKER:**

54 -- Judge Spinner, Family Court Judge Spinner gets reassigned.  
55 That's what you guys do. Seven bills and nothing to protect the  
56 children, nothing. And here is a box filled with evidence proving

1 that you knew --

2

3 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

4 We're going to have to ask you to move away from the podium.

5

6 **MS. TOOKER:**

7 Shut the mic off. You knew. See this? A box filled with  
8 evidence.

9

10 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

11 I'm sorry, I don't have the ability to shut the mic off.

12

13 **MS. TOOKER:**

14 I let you know. So I'd really like to know what investigation  
15 you're doing.

16

17 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

18 Could I ask you to please move away from the podium. Marie, I  
19 appreciate your passion, I really do.

21 **MS. TOOKER:**

22 This is not about passion on this, it's about evidence.

23

24 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

25 Okay. Glenn? Glenn Svoboda, would you please come?

26

27 **MS. TOOKER:**

28 That's what the Court does, right?

29

30 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

31 We have an agenda here, we have quite a few presentations here.  
32 So if you could please cooperate, we'd greatly appreciate it. This  
33 is a very sensitive matter and it's something we're taking very  
34 seriously, so let's, you know, all work together here. Thank you.  
35 Hi, Glenn.

36

37 **MR. SVOBODA:**

38 Good morning, Mrs. Anker. My name's Glenn Svoboda, I'm with the  
39 study for the Federal abuse of the Title IV-D and IV-E. Suffolk  
09:56AM 40 County is on the market. Basically it's bankrolling Title IV-D and  
41 IV-E monies; that's how it's balancing its budget. We're going to  
42 bring that up in the corruption trial. These are on the look out  
43 in the Federal government.

44

45 So we're going to just get into it right now. It's non-negotiable  
46 with Steve Bellone and Gregory Blass. Gregory Blass has no  
47 business being up there, so I'm not going to get into that right  
48 now. But we're going to go back to the Michael Valva trial. On  
49 the 30th I was there at Judge William J. Condon's courtroom on the  
09:56AM 50 2nd Floor in Riverhead. I would like to know the double standards  
51 of why the media was sitting ten feet parallel to the Judge's  
52 bench, while when we try to go into Family Court where it all  
53 starts, where the Federal funding dollars begin to steal from the  
54 Federal government by abusing its techniques from the child  
55 support, violence against women, for which Gregory Blass was in  
56 charge of handing out orders of protection like candy canes back in

1 the late 90s and 2000s. But when we go to Family Court, you know  
2 what they tell us, the Randall Administration? They used to make  
3 us wait in the hallway; now they're making us wait out front of the  
4 outside of the building. Now they're making us stay 250 feet from  
5 the building, we had to go there and measure. See the media?  
6 Because we know News 12 is not going to print it, because we knew  
7 Newsday needed to boost their lagging sales to get the legal  
8 notices, that's why they printed the Valva case. This is nothing  
9 new that's going on in Suffolk County. But all the dots are  
09:57AM 10 connected how Suffolk County intentionally overcharges the Federal  
11 government by implementing these abusive techniques on victims of  
12 Suffolk County in the Family Court and the divorce industry.

13  
14 So I know how it work, Mrs. Anker. I know Dorothy Cavalier, your  
15 aide, has spoke to Social Services on my behalf. On behalf of the  
16 Social Security Administration, your office already told me there's  
17 something wrong. So if you don't go against the system and pass  
18 for the corruption bill, I know they're going to run the primary  
19 against you. That's how it works in Suffolk County; I worked on  
09:58AM 20 the Mark Lesko campaign and Tom Schiliro campaign, so I know how  
21 dirty this County is. We don't expect any of yous to veto this  
22 corruption bill and we want Steve Bellone removed, he knows all  
23 about this stuff. Thank you very much.

24  
25 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

26 Okay. Thank you, Glenn. Celina Ceo, if you would please come to  
27 the podium.

28  
29 **MS. CEO:**

09:58AM 30 Hi. Thank you. I have a question; why do judges get away with  
31 lying? A judge is supposed to take into account of your pro se or  
32 you have a lawyer and actually look out for you in the proceedings  
33 to make sure you're not taken advantage of, to make sure you are  
34 given due process, to make sure that you are given all of your  
35 rights. Because I'm not a lawyer and none of the other citizens of  
36 this County are. The 6th Amendment doesn't apply. Most counsel is  
37 ineffective because they're looking for revenue; they're looking to  
38 force plea deals, they're looking to push false allegations,  
39 they're looking to push orders of protection.

41 My children were removed from this County and brought to another  
42 state. The person that brought them to that state did not receive  
43 felony kidnapping. My case is still up in the air, despite the  
44 fact that I had CPS at my house three times in September. Children  
45 raised in single-parent homes-are four times more likely to live in  
46 poverty. Seven times more likely to live in poverty, seven times  
47 more likely to be pregnant as a teenager, two times more likely to  
48 drop out of high school.

10:00AM 49  
50 I was also given a statement by one of your Legislators that said  
51 we know that it's a horrible system riddled with corruption, it's a  
52 joke that has been in place and every one is signed by a supervisor  
53 or magistrate. False allegations are something that ruined my  
54 child's life. My child is now 22-years old. Where is my justice  
55 for my child?  
56

1 The next thing I want to say is the devil doesn't mean to be evil,  
2 he just regrettably regrets to -- forgets to exceed expectations.  
3 Another thing that I was told is this case is not unique. Filicide  
4 occurs roughly 500 times a year in this country, most often due to  
5 the screw-up as a result of -- screw-ups due to CPS, Family Court  
6 and not in investigations into allegations. How many more children  
7 must die before the system is changed? Does anyone have an answer?  
8

9 **UNKNOWN AUDIENCE MEMBER:**

10 It's getting worse.  
11

12 **MS. CEO:**

13 It's getting worse. And most lawyers, most guardian ad litem,  
14 most judges, they lack integrity, ethics and morals. I hope that  
15 you on this panel today are not morally bankrupt and corrupt of my  
16 situation and my children's situation. And I implore you to please  
17 investigate all claims.  
18

19 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

20 Thank you, Celina.  
21

22 **MS. CEO:**

23 Thank you.  
24

25 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

26 Okay. We're going to continue with this meeting. We have a  
27 **presentation**. Do we have any questions? Are there any more cards,  
28 any more people that would like to speak? Okay, I see none. We  
29 will move forward with the presentation. Amy, you want to come  
30 forward?  
31

32 Okay. So this afternoon we have **Amy Angelone**, she is a Licensed  
33 Social Worker and she is with **Response Crisis Center Services**.  
34 We have a presentation; again, if you guys want to check out the  
35 screen over here, she will discuss an overview of that amazing  
36 organization.  
37

38 Now, over 45 years ago, in recognition of the need for people in  
39 crisis to have access, empathetic human contact any time, day or  
40 night, the Response Crisis Center was born. Today we have a  
41 presentation by Amy Angelone who is the Director of Training for  
42 Response Crisis Center. Her main role is to recruit and train new  
43 volunteer crisis counselors to work on the hotlines. Now, she is  
44 also a crisis counselor, an on-line chat counselor and community  
45 educator at Response. Welcome, Amy.  
46

47 **MS. ANGELONE:**

48 Thank you, everybody, for having me. Good morning. And thank you,  
49 Legislator Anker and Dorothy for inviting me to come speak. I will  
50 make this brief as I know you have an agenda ahead of you, but I do  
51 want to just share about our services here at Response.  
52

53 As in the past 45 years we have truly expanded from a 24/7 hotline  
54 to many more programs, so I do want to let the Senior & Human  
55 Service Committee know about them, as these are for anybody of any  
56 age. We have children who use our services, adults, older adults

1 from every single community and demographic you can think of across  
2 Suffolk County and beyond.

3  
4 So we are most known for a 24/7 hotline that is free and it is  
5 available 24/7; and when I say 24/7, it never closes. You can call  
6 us on a holiday, in the middle of the night; even if there's a  
7 blizzard, we have the capability of working from home to take calls  
8 and chats, so as long as there's power we are able to provide help  
9 to people who need it. We also have an online chat that's  
10 available through our own website.

11  
12 We also take National Suicide Prevention Lifeline calls and chats.  
13 So the Lifeline, believe it or not, is not one building and one  
14 organization that covers all 50 states for crisis calls and suicide  
15 related calls. It is actually composed of over 150 local crisis  
16 centers and we at Response are Suffolk County's lifeline. So  
17 anybody with a 516 or 631 area code will have their call, if they  
18 call the Lifeline, come to either us or our Nassau counterpart,  
19 Long Island Crisis Center. We do have these as 24/7 on-line chats  
20 and the Lifeline is available 24/7 as well.

21  
22 Many of us know that the FCC has been working towards making the  
23 Lifeline hotline number a three-digit number, they're proposing for  
24 it to be three digits for people to remember it so it's easier to  
25 dial in, although we are still waiting for the Senate to be voting  
26 on that. We do have -- through New York State, we are one of the  
27 five crisis centers in all of New York State who will be taking  
28 more Lifeline calls.

29  
30 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

31 I want to also when you -- you're talking about the Lifeline number  
32 or Response.

33  
34 **MS. ANGELONE:**

35 Uh-huh.

36  
37 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

38 631-751-7500.

39  
40 **MS. ANGELONE:**

41 Yes.

42  
43 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

44 Feel free to repeat that throughout your presentation. I'll say it  
45 again, I see our audience; 631-751-7500.

46  
47 **MS. ANGELONE:**

48 Thank you.

49  
50 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

51 Oh, you're welcome.

52  
53 **MS. ANGELONE:**

54 And I'll repeat it at the end again, too. And with that said,  
55 we do also provide ample community communication and professional  
56 training. We go to schools, middle schools, high schools,

1 colleges, any sort of civic group, any sort of non-profit  
2 organization that is looking for more information on mental health,  
3 mental health coping, along with suicide and suicide prevention.  
4 We do also provide professional trainings to those who work, you  
5 know, with people in any capacity on helping counsel people who are  
6 feeling suicidal and helping them get to safety.

7  
8 We do also have an internal line called the Support Line, so we  
9 have many times where people on our hotlines are calling and they  
10 might be calling once or twice a day, they could be calling a few  
11 times a day and it's because, for whatever reason they are truly  
12 isolated and alone. They may not have family or friends around  
13 during their lives, they may be home-bound due to some sort of  
14 physical or mental health struggle and they need support and we  
15 will give them an internal number, and they have to agree to this  
16 service, that they can call that number and our volunteer  
17 counselors can also call them as well to check in to see how  
18 they're doing.

19  
20 We do also have a Lifeline partner -- or pardon me, a Long Island  
21 Railroad partnership where our posters are available throughout  
22 Suffolk County at the major train stations for people to use if  
23 they're in need. We also in the past year have also -- our  
24 Executive Director has served on the Suffolk County Task Force in  
25 which she, along with other stakeholders in the County, review  
26 autopsies where it was labeled as a possible suicide and they will  
27 look over the case, look over what was going on in the individual's  
28 life, so that way we as a community can better know preventive  
29 services could interfere so suicide does not happen.

30  
31 And I think to mention, I know speakers from before who spoke  
32 regarding abuse, veteran issues. We do receive many calls from  
33 both children, concerned professionals, parents about abuse, the  
34 same thing with veterans who are having difficulty returning home,  
35 adjusting, having mental health struggles. We do also talk with  
36 students in schools about ways that they can cope with difficult  
37 emotions and things that are going on. And on our own hotlines and  
38 chat lines we do have an internal resource guide, and if anybody  
39 wants this I am happy to give it to your offices. We update it  
40 every year, it is all the resources available in the County for  
41 people, so that ranges from abuse, financial help, legal help,  
42 veterans services, medical services, psychiatric services, anything  
43 that people might be calling or chatting with us about that could  
44 help them directly in their situation. So that is always  
45 available.

46  
47 And with that said, you know, in the past year we received over  
48 44,000 calls and chats from individuals, many of them are within  
49 the County as we do also some collaborations with local mental  
50 health agencies where we provide structured follow-up to care  
51 management clients who are either adults or adolescents and the  
52 adolescents' parents, so we do that. We also do community  
53 education at several hospitals to their in-patient and out-patient  
54 psychiatric units about our services and about ways to cope with,  
55 you know, difficult times.

1 But we are always here for the community, so we just want to make  
2 this known, again, that this is for everybody. Especially in  
3 today's times where a lot is going on and there's a lot of fear,  
4 anxiety, sadness, concern for the future and we are here to help in  
5 any way possible. So thank you for your time.  
6

7 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

8 And again, Amy, thank you for your services. You're absolutely  
9 right, these -- you know, these times, millennials, even younger  
10 kids, their brains are wired differently than, you know, my  
11 generation, you know, has experienced and your generation, and  
12 they're looking for answers very quickly. And if they can pick up  
13 a phone, you know, and call someone that has expertise in  
14 understanding mental health, we don't put enough effort, our  
15 society does not put enough effort in dealing with mental health  
16 and you are providing that way for the County, the government, to  
17 have that available to them.  
18

19 So again, it's been wonderful partnering with your organization.  
20 Legislators, any questions? Nope. Thank you so much, we  
21 appreciate you coming.  
22

23 **MS. ANGELONE:**

24 Thank you, everybody.  
25

26 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

27 Thank you.  
28

29 Okay. We're going to move on to the **Introductory Resolutions.**

30  
31 We have ***IR 1258(-2020) - Directing the Suffolk County Department of***  
32 ***Social Services to study the feasibility of securely videotaping***

17 special committee that the County Executive set up, the external  
18 task force, and working through issues here in your committee;  
19 you're doing a fine job and we appreciate that very much.

21 And I know that there were a number of speakers here today about a  
22 number of the bills that are before us. And last night the  
23 District Attorney announced he'll be forming a special Grand Jury  
24 to investigate the Valva case and issues involving around it. We  
25 wanted to let everybody know that as of this morning I issued a  
26 memo that's creating a special committee of the County Legislature  
27 to do a fact-finding of the Valva case as well. Our mission will  
28 be to try to determine all of the issues involved around the  
29 families of Valva, Subko-Valva Family and the Polina Family and at  
10:14AM 30 different points and when and how they had contact with the County,  
31 be it through CPS or the Police Department or other agencies, and  
32 to try to just determine the timeline and the facts of the case so  
33 that we can help make recommendations as to the appropriate changes  
34 to the system that need to be made to try to make sure that we  
35 prevent any future tragedies.

36  
37 That committee is going to be comprised of myself and Legislator  
38 Hahn, our Deputy Presiding Officer, and Tom Cilmi, our Minority  
39 Leader. And we will be moving forward a number of Procedural  
10:15AM 40 Motions on Tuesday that will give the committee the powers it needs  
41 to do that investigation so that we are able to make sure that we  
42 are doing our due diligence, as the oversight body of the County,  
43 to ensure that we know what our departments did as it pertains to  
44 this case and if there are shortcomings in the system that we can  
45 make any recommendations, be it shortcomings that the County can  
46 address or, for that matter, shortcomings that we may have to ask  
47 the State for assistance on, as much of the work that happens in  
48 CPS is done under the rules and guidance of New York State. But we  
49 wanted to make sure people are aware that we take this case very  
10:15AM 50 seriously and we want to make sure that we are understanding all of  
51 the aspects involved.

52  
53 So thank you very much for that moment to put that on the record,  
54 Madam Chair.

1 **CHAIRPERSON ANKER:**

2 Thank you. Thank you, Presiding Officer Calarco.

3  
4 And I also want to thank all the Legislators here that are  
5 participating and have and will continue to participate in the many  
6 committees, panels, investigations. We have I think probably six,  
7 I think we're up to six so far, if not more, maybe seven, between  
8 New York State Office of Child & Family Services, Suffolk County  
9 Executive has an external committee and he has an internal  
10 committee. We now have a Legislative investigation and, as was  
11 mentioned, Tim Sini, our District Attorney, is also moving forward  
12 with an internal investigation, so -- and I think there's an  
13 investigation within CPS itself.

14  
15 So we are not going to stop looking at this in with the intensity  
16 that we are looking at it right now, and we will make changes for  
17 the better. We appreciate everyone's participation in this so we  
18 better understand how we can make government work better and  
19 protect the lives of our residents, especially our children.

20  
21 So, again, I have no cards, no other public comment and I see no  
22 further business. This committee is adjourned. Thank you.
