1 THE MEETING WAS CALLED TO ORDER AT 2:02 PM

2
3 **P.O. CALARCO:**

4 Okay, folks, welcome to the Public Works, Transportation and Energy
5 Committee. If we can all please rise for the Pledge of Allegiance
6 led by Legislator Krupski.

7
8 **SALUTATION**

02:03PM 10 Okay, thank you, everyone and welcome to the Public Works,
11 Transportation and Energy Committee today. We are conducting our
12 meeting via Zoom for one last time. And then starting in two weeks
13 at our next committee cycle, we should be resuming our committees
14 in person from the Legislative building. But to that, I will be
15 chairing today's committee for one last time and I thank Legislator
16 Krupski's for his indulgence for these last few cycles.

17
18 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

19 Thank you for doing it and making it work very smoothly and
02:03PM 20 effectively.

21
22 **P.O. CALARCO:**

23 I appreciate that, Legislator Krupski. You're the only Chair to
24 tell me that, but I appreciate.

25
26 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

27 Thank you.

28
29 **P.O. CALARCO:**

02:03PM 30 I'm not making a joke. Thank you, everyone. So we are going to
31 get into our Committee here. I do actually have a number of people
32 I'll be bringing into the room on a couple of these resolution we
33 have regarding some of the SIP grants. So work with me here.

34
35 We have no public portion, which has been suspended. And we will
36 still continue to have it suspended in two weeks when we return to
37 the building, until we can facilitate an appropriate mechanism to
38 have the public come into the building and provide testimony. We
39 have no presentations and no appointments today.

40
41 **TABLED RESOLUTIONS**

42
43 So, we'll go into Tabled Resolutions. I'm going to admit
44 Commissioner Brown at this point in time. **IR 1384, Amending the**
45 **2020 Capital Budget and Program and appropriating funds in**
46 **connection with Engineering, Planning, and Design of MacArthur**
47 **Industrial (CP 8102). (Co. Exec.).**

48
49 **LEG. TROTТА:**

02:04PM 50 Motion to table.

51
52 **P.O. CALARCO:**

53 Motion to table by Legislator Trotta. Any other motions?

54
55 **LEG. MURATORE:**

56 I'll second it.

1
2 **P.O. CALARCO:**

3 The tabling motion is seconded by Legislator Muratore. On the
4 issue, Commissioner Brown, you're now with us. Does anybody have
5 any questions? Can you hear us, Commissioner?
6

7 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

8 Yes. Can you hear me?
9

10 **P.O. CALARCO:**

11 Yes. So, we are on IR 1384. I know there was quite a bit of
12 discussion about this resolution last time. I have a motion and a
13 second to table. Does anybody have any questions for the
14 Commissioner on this particular resolution? Legislator Berland, go
15 ahead.
16

17 **LEG. BERLAND:**

18 Yes. Has the timing changed in this; do we lose money, do we need
19 to do this? Do we need to approve this now or is it okay for it to
20 be tabled?
21

22 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

23 No, the timing hasn't changed. There were questions raised as to
24 Ronkonkoma Vision, which you took an analysis -- we did an analysis
25 of the need for these equalizer tanks, which are needed regardless
26 of what happens with Ronkonkoma Vision. So even if nothing happens
27 there, it's needed to meter out the flow coming out of the
28 MacArthur Airport area, the MacArthur industrial area.
29

30 **LEG. BERLAND:**

31 Right. But is this time is of the essence on this or no?
32

33 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

34 Yes, to continue with the work. I forget the exact amount that was
35 needed for the equalizer tanks before the flow gets to the
36 Ronkonkoma pumping station.
37

38 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER TYSON:**

39 It's 250,000.
40

41 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

42 It's already working. And it's 250,000 to continue with the work.
43

44 **LEG. BERLAND:**

45 I mean, it's not my district, but I don't know whose district it
46 is. I mean, is this -- you know -- I mean, you kind of have to
47 tell us on this instance, whether this is something that you think
48 is okay to be tabled or it needs to go through; kind of not getting
49 that.
50

51 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

52 Yeah, if you're asking me, it needs to go through so that the
53 design can continue.
54

55 **LEG. BERLAND:**

56 Whose district is this?

LEG. PICCIRILLO:
I have a couple of questions.

P.O. CALARCO:
All right. I got you next, Legislator Piccirillo.

LEG. PICCIRILLO:
Sorry, I didn't mean to -- thank you.

P.O. CALARCO:
Yep. Legislator Berland, are you done with your line of questioning?

LEG. BERLAND:
Sure.

P.O. CALARCO:
Legislator Piccirillo.

LEG. PICCIRILLO:
Yeah. Okay, so when is the Ronkonkoma Hub supposed to hook up to the sewer line, Commissioner?

COMMISSIONER BROWN:
I don't know the answer to that question but I can find out.

LEG. PICCIRILLO:
So if they're going to hook up to a sewer line, why do they need extra capacity for tanks?

02:08PM

COMMISSIONER BROWN:
The flow alone in the MacArthur industrial area is 2200 gallons per minute. That's the peak flow. The Ronkonkoma Hub area, which is all, you know, current need is 1,300 gallons per minute. So it brings it up to about 3600 gallons per minute, which is more than the system can handle during peak flow. So these are equalizer tanks. They're big tanks for the flow to go into during the peak volume. And then when the volume is lower in the middle of the night, the tanks can empty out. The peak flow is reduced to 2300. So this is about one third of the peak flow.

LEG. PICCIRILLO:
Okay. Thank you for that, but my question was more along the lines are these tanks necessary once you hook up to the sewers; do you still use these tanks?

1 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**
2 Yes, oh, absolutely, yeah, yeah. Every time that you -- every time
3 that you exceed that 2300 gallons per minute, everyday that that
4 happens, you need these tanks.
5
6 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**
7 So it's exceeding it now and you don't have the tanks?
8
9 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**
02:09PM 10 Well, I can find out exactly when it's going to be exceeding it.
11 But, again, this is design work, so you're not going to do the
12 design in advance of the need.
13
14 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**
15 Okay. Okay. I'll yield back. I'll ask another question in a
16 minute. Thank you.
17
18 **P.O. CALARCO:**
19 Legislator Krupski.

21 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
22 Is this part of a sewer district that's formed or one that will be
23 formed?
24
25 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**
26 It's part of one that will be formed.
27
28 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
29 Thank you.

31 **P.O. CALARCO:**
32 Legislator Trotta.
33
34 **LEG. TROTТА:**
35 Where is the effluent from the Ronkonkoma Hub going now?
36
37 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**
38 It's going to the pumping station. And it goes along Johnson
39 Avenue; eventually goes to Sewer District Number Three.

41 **LEG. TROTТА:**
42 We've hooked up -- Ronkonkoma Hub is hooked up to that already?
43
44 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**
45 It's my understanding, yeah, but I can verify that as well.
46
47 **LEG. TROTТА:**
48 That's something we should know. That was quick if they did that
49 already.
02:10PM 50
51 **P.O. CALARCO:**
52 It's been several years since that was first pitched. Bill Lindsay
53 was still the Presiding Officer.
54
55 **LEG. TROTТА:**
56 Like I said, government works very slowly. I'm shocked. Took you

1 five years or more to get rid of Burke. (Laughter) Next question
2 is, so this is the design work. And what kind of work -- is this
3 an additional or in addition to the design or an add on?
4

5 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

6 My understanding was when they were doing the original design, they
7 did not anticipate this volume of flow. So, later on it was
8 discovered that it would be needed to accommodate everything. They
9 did not anticipate this amount of flow coming from the Long Island
02:11PM 10 MacArthur Airport area, the MacArthur industrial area in addition
11 to the Ronkonkoma Hub.
12

13 **LEG. TROTТА:**

14 There's not a lot of flow coming from the airport right now, I can
15 tell you that. I think we should table it so we can find out if
16 they're hooked up and if we really need this; because, you know,
17 \$250,000 is \$250,000 we don't have.
18

19 **P.O. CALARCO:**

02:11PM 20 Okay, Legislator Fleming.
21

22 **LEG. FLEMING:**

23 Thank you. If I can just inquire, maybe Roz as well as the
24 Commissioner with regard to the funding source; so, we've already
25 appropriated a million dollars for this planning effort but have
26 encountered additional costs and so the Department is requesting an
27 additional quarter million; is that accurate?
28

29 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

02:12PM 30 Yes.
31

32 **LEG. FLEMING:**

33 So I do have a question with regard to what underlies the
34 additional costs; what led to the additional costs for a project
35 that we've already given a million dollars for.
36

37 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

38 There were a number of --
39

40 **LEG. FLEMING:**

41 The other question I have is sort of related, is it looks like this
42 is being shifted from the Riverhead sewer district and there is --
43 there is language in the resolution that indicates that it's not
44 needed in the Riverhead sewer district. And so I just wanted --
45 those are my two big questions, why the extra money and what's the
46 impact on the Riverhead Sewer District if we were to move it.
47

48 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

02:13PM 49 They've underestimated the volume from the MacArthur industrial
50 area. It was much higher than they thought it would be. I know
51 there was a switch from the Riverhead District to Sewer District
52 number three. My understanding was that was also a volume issue in
53 Riverhead, but I can get a more specific answer to that question.
54

55 **LEG. FLEMING:**

56 Commissioner, wasn't the original design and plan funding requested

1 because of the underestimation of the flow, but that we already
2 appropriated a million dollars to address that underestimate. And
3 now the request is that it's going to cost more than that to do
4 what was originally anticipated in addressing the underestimation
5 of the flow; is that right?
6

7 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

8 I can't speak to the original million dollars and why that was
9 requested. When it was explained to me, that did not come up; that
02:14PM 10 there was an original underestimation; just that there was an
11 underestimation of the flow, you know, meaning the tanks to filter,
12 you know, to filter out the flow so our peak volumes are not as
13 high.
14

15 **LEG. FLEMING:**

16 But there was a resolution in 2017 that brought the million dollars
17 over. Are you saying that it takes a quarter million more to plan
18 and design something that the equalization tank because of the
19 additional flow? I thought the equalization tank was there
02:14PM 20 initially being planned because of an additional flow. Is it more
21 expensive when the flow is higher than when it was originally
22 considered? Is that why it's more expensive and more expensive at
23 25 percent of the original price tag?
24

25 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

26 I'd have to get back to you on that specific question. I mean, the
27 million dollars, I don't know that that was for tanks to begin
28 with as opposed to the pumping station.
29

30 **LEG. FLEMING:**

31 I personally feel that I would like more information on that. So
32 I'll support the tabling motion. Thank you.
33

34 **P.O. CALARCO:**

35 Thank you, Legislator Fleming. Legislator Trotta.
36

37 **LEG. TROTТА:**

38 What company is doing this?
39

40 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

41 Yeah, I do recall being told the company but I don't have it here
42 with me.
43

44 **LEG. TROTТА:**

45 Okay. So maybe next time. We'll table it this cycle. Maybe you
46 can get those answers. Thank you.
47

48 **P.O. CALARCO:**

49 Okay, anybody else?
02:15PM 50

51 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

52 Yeah, just one more question, Mr. Chair.
53

54 **P.O. CALARCO:**

55 Yeah, go ahead, Legislator Piccirillo.
56

1 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

2 I just want to make it clear, this doesn't affect either way the
3 proposal of the stadium at the south side of the Ronkonkoma
4 railroad tracks?

5
6 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

7 No, the stadium -- Legislator, if the stadium does not go forward,
8 we still have the same need.

9
10 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

11 You still have the same need. Okay. I just want to get it on the
12 record. Thank you.

13
14 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

15 The flow from the stadium was a small fraction of that difference.
16 So I asked specifically for an analysis based on no further
17 development of Ronkonkoma Vision.

18
19 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

02:16PM 20 Okay. And if there is further this development, I mean, are we
21 going to need more money to get more tanks? It seems like that's
22 the issue.

23
24 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

25 Yeah, the numbers they gave me were very small. You're talking
26 about a total without the future development, a total of 3600
27 gallons per minute; with the future development about 3800 gallons
28 per minute. So it would be less than like a 5 percent increase so
29 the system would still be able to handle it.

02:16PM 30
31 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

32 It seems like a very conservative number considering there could be
33 2000 people in the stadium trying to use the bathroom, I don't
34 know. It seems like a lot of flushes to me.

35
36 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

02:17PM 37 Yeah, I mean I specifically asked for those numbers because I
38 wanted to make sure -- I didn't want to make a statement, you know,
39 that it was needed, you know, only -- only, you know, if the
40 stadium and the rest of the Ronkonkoma Vision were being built, so.

41
42 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

43 Right.

44
45 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

46 You know, roughly 287 gallons per minute for Ronkonkoma Vision
47 projects.

48
49 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

02:17PM 50 Okay, thanks so much. Thanks, Mr. Chair.

51
52 **P.O. CALARCO:**

53 Thank you. Anybody else? All right, unfortunately, Commissioner,
54 looks like there's still quite a bit of questions that people are
55 looking for you to be able to respond to. So I have a motion and a
56 second to table, roll call.

22 MS. ELLIS:
23 Six. (VOTE: 6-0-0-0)
24

25 P.O. CALARCO:
26 Okay, it's tabled. Okay, folks, let me do this quick. We're going
27 to bring in Commissioner Lansdale. We'll start with Sister Karen.
28

29 INTRODUCTORY RESOLUTIONS

30
31 All right. Introductory Resolutions, IR 1438, Amending the 2020
32 Operating Budget and amending the 2020 Capital Budget and Program
33 and appropriating funds in connection with the Sewer Infrastructure
34 Program to provide funding for the Design of Innovative and
35 Alternative Onsite Wastewater Treatment Systems (I/A OWTS) for
36 Sisters of St. Joseph Brentwood Campus and Hampton Bays Retreat
37 House (CP 8725.110). (Co. Exec.).
38

39 LEG. MURATORE:
40 Motion.

41
42 P.O. CALARCO:
43 Motion from Legislator Muratore; second by Legislator Berland.
44 Anybody on the issue?
45

46 LEG. TROTTA:
47 Motion to table.
48

49 P.O. CALARCO:
50 Motion to table by Legislator Trotta. Anybody want to second that
51 tabling motion? No? Legislator Krupski, go ahead you have a
52 question.
53

54 CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:
55 Director Lansdale, could you give us a run down of the progress
56 here? I thought we approved this funding years ago and that

1 systems were either being built or being used. So, can you give us
2 a progress report?

3
4 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

5 Sure. In 2018 the Sisters of St. Joseph received a \$200,000 water
6 quality grant from the County for the engineering and design of a
7 innovative alternative wastewater system at their Brentwood campus.
8 And it also connects the Maria Regina's Skilled Living or Skilled
9 Nursing Center. There are 11 houses that are on that campus, that
02:19PM 10 212-acre campus that are not connected to that new IA system. So
11 they're looking to design IA systems for those 11 homes that are on
12 the campus and not connected. In addition, they're looking to
13 install an IA system at the retreat house in Hampton Bays. So it's
14 to design 12 IA systems; 11 on their campus in Brentwood and one in
15 Hampton Bays.

16
17 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

18 So why wouldn't they have tied these 11 residences into one of
19 their current systems that we just funded?

02:20PM 20
21 **SISTER KAREN:**

22 Hi, Sister Karen Burke, Sisters of St. Joseph's. Each one of those
23 houses has an independent system. They're not located -- it would
24 have been massive amount of piping to go to the other side of the
25 200-acre campus. You're tying into each of those houses. Each one
26 is an independent residential house with its own currently
27 cesspools for each house. So there was never the design or the
28 intention that those would be tied into the main system there.
29 Right now they each just have individual cesspools. We are
02:21PM 30 applying for the Reclaim our Water for the actual system. So the
31 monies that we're asking for right now through this grant is just
32 for the engineering and the design phase of it. And then we will
33 be applying to the Reclaim our Water money for each of the
34 residential systems.

35
36 We've already been in contact with Justin Jobin from Suffolk
37 County, the Environmental Project Coordinator regarding these. And
38 we haven't received verbal approval that we are eligible for the
39 Reclaim our Water monies for the actual system. But that money
02:21PM 40 does not include any engineering costs; anything related to the
41 engineering part of it. So it's a massive project to try to do 11
42 residential houses on all different parts. Most of them are along
43 Brentwood Road so they face out onto Brentwood Road. They're just
44 regular one-family homes. Currently four or five sisters are
45 living in each one of those residential houses. But they were
46 never, ever connected to the main system.

47
48 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

49 Director Lansdale, is there a possibility for sharing -- the
02:22PM 50 residences sharing a system or two?

51
52 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

53 It would depend on how close they are together. I defer to Sister
54 Burke. Karen.

1 **SISTER KAREN:**

2 Yes. When we did look at that, we already had some preliminary --
3 you know, just to find out, we did a feasibility study just to see
4 what actually exists there right now. Currently each one does have
5 independent cesspools. Looking toward the future, some of these
6 are on separate tax lots. So looking toward the future and the
7 possibility of subdivision or whatever it might be 30, 40 years
8 from now, it was advised that we don't tie them in together. It
9 limits the possibilities of what could be done with each individual
10 house if they're tied together to one system.

12 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

13 What do you mean what could be done. Like, you could sell them?
14

15 **SISTER KAREN:**

16 Yeah, yeah. I guess in the future if they were going to be used by
17 other non-profits, you know, each house is probably on its own
18 budget system; so not to have them tied together was what was
19 recommended.

21 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

22 Director Lansdale, when people apply for the grant money for the
23 alternative systems, are they compelled to pay for their own
24 engineering costs?
25

26 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

27 I thought that engineering was included in the grant itself. And
28 then at least a portion of it.
29

30 **SISTER KAREN:**

31 Actually, I did just check the Reclaim our Water website. And it
32 does specifically say it on the website that engineering costs are
33 not included in the Reclaim our Water. That it's only -- it's only
34 for the actual system and the installation, is the only thing that
35 you can apply to for those monies.
36

37 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

38 And this would be money that is coming from what source?
39

40 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

41 So this funding would come from fund 406, which is outlined in the
42 Charter C 12-2-d 4. And I have a fund balance if you'd like that.
43

44 **P.O. CALARCO:**

45 Give that balance because a number of these resolutions are going
46 to be for the SIP grant amount -- SIP fund. So, it's useful.
47

48 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

49 Okay. So I checked with the County Exec's Budget Office this
50 morning. The balance before these four resolutions -- I'll give
51 you the balance before and after. The balance before is 4,254,000.
52 And then the balance after these are approved would be 3,742,638.
53

02:24PM

54 **P.O. CALARCO:**

55 And, Director Lansdale, this funding is dedicated specifically for
56 these purposes?

1
2 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

3 Yes. If you'd like, I can read the Charter language.
4

5 **P.O. CALARCO:**

6 I don't necessarily think that's necessary, but I have a list. So,
7 Legislator Krupski, are you --
8

9 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

10 I'm done. Thank you.
11

12 **P.O. CALARCO:**

13 Okay, Legislator Trotta.
14

15 **LEG. TROTТА:**

16 I just checked with someone who had one put in. I just made a
17 phone call. And they had the person they bought it from design it
18 for free. They came to them and had a system design and they
19 brought it to the town, the County Health Department and they
20 approved it. So why are we paying \$50,000 for this?
21

22 **SISTER KAREN:**

23 I think from our point, from the Sisters' that the complication of
24 11 different residential houses on one Campus there with over the
25 different -- it's much more complicated.
26

27 **LEG. TROTТА:**

28 More the reason that someone who's going to buy -- sell you 11 of
29 these would do the design for free. I mean, you don't know what's
30 going on in the County and maybe you do; we're flat busted broke
31 and the County Executive actually wants to raid this very fund that
32 we're talking about, take money out of it. So what I'm concerned
33 with is this money should be used actually to put systems in in
34 low-lying areas on the south shore and on the north shore that need
35 it. Because, you know, where you are, you're in the middle of the
36 Island, it's sandy, there are millions of houses. I think the
37 money would be better spent in a low-lying area like Oakdale or
38 Sayville where it's being used and not being used for design. So
39 that's why -- my tabling motion. It's nothing against you, Sister.
40 It's just that --
41

42 **SISTER KAREN:**

43 From our point, I think, most of you know the projects that we've
44 been doing, what I've been coordinating here on the campus; you
45 know, we're just trying to model best practices and doing this --
46

48 Nothing -- nothing against you. It's just that I'm looking to do
49 it efficiently, not wasting money, millions of dollars, you weren't
50 on the last call, another \$250,000 to design something we screwed
51 up on earlier. So this is a limited pot and the limited pot's
52 going to get smaller, you know. And I think the money should be
53 used where it's actually going to be putting the system in near the
54 water that's leaching into the Bay or the Sound. So, I mean, I
55 think that is just logical common sense.
56

1 And that if you went to that company and said, "look, give me a
2 price for 11, design them," bring that design to the Department of
3 Health, now you give the guy 11 jobs and he designs them. Because
4 they're all going to be very similar, I'm assuming. Because
5 they're on the same road, they're probably very close to each
6 other, the soil's probably the same, the cesspool location is
7 probably the same. It's just, you know, we gotta to be more
8 efficient here. And while it's only \$50,000, we're about \$350
9 million short this year.

10
11 **SISTER KAREN:**

12 Yeah, I think without the \$50,000 because we've already been told
13 that it wouldn't be included in the grant, we probably at this
14 point knowing the situation that we're all in including the Sisters
15 of St. Joseph, we would not be able to go forward with the project
16 at this time. So I think that -- and because -- I know, you know,
17 you're saying that they should do it, but I'm telling you, I've
18 spent months on this, they're not going to include the engineering
19 costs.

02:28PM

20
21 **LEG. TROTТА:**

22 I made one phone to a guy who had one put in, he said they just did
23 -- the company gave him the design and he gave to the Health
24 Department and they approved it. So maybe you should shop around.

25
26 **SISTER KAREN:**

27 From our point we wouldn't be able to go forward with this at this
28 time without --

29
30 **LEG. TROTТА:**

31 If you did the extra step and called some companies and asked them
32 to design it and brought it to the Health Department, you might be
33 able to eliminate this \$50,000. And as a representative of the
34 taxpayers, we have an obligation to look after their money and make
35 sure it's being used effective. Now, I made a phone call, one
36 phone call within the last 45 seconds and this gentleman had them
37 design it, brought it to the Department of Health and they approved
38 it. So I think maybe you should go back to this company -- maybe I
39 can get you the number of the company who designed his and you
40 should talk to him about putting 11 in.

02:29PM

41
42 **SISTER KAREN:**

43 Okay, I'd be glad for that information if this is not going to
44 pass.

45
46 **LEG. TROTТА:**

47 I'm not saying it's not going to pass. I use logic and reason.
48 And it's the logical thing to do.

49
50 **SISTER KAREN:**

51 Yes.

52
53 **P.O. CALARCO:**

54 I have a list here. Thank you, Legislator Trotta. Legislator
55 Fleming.

1 **LEG. FLEMING:**
2 Thank you. Welcome, Sister Karen, and thank you for all the vision
3 that you are applying to our world with your mission there at your
4 Brentwood Campus. I know this is part of a holistic approach to
5 treating the environment correctly and fixing some of the things
6 that you found to be lacking in terms of how you and the Sisters
7 interact with the environment, the natural environment. I think
8 it's a remarkable undertaking and I wish you all the best with it
9 as I always do. What is the current wastewater treatment at these
02:30PM 10 11 homes -- these eleven sites that you're planning to upgrade? Is
11 it cesspools?
12
13 **SISTER KAREN:**
14 Just cesspools.
15
16 **LEG. FLEMING:**
17 Cesspools. So just basically burying the waste.
18
19 **SISTER KAREN:**
02:30PM 20 Yeah, yeah.
21
22 **LEG. FLEMING:**
23 Okay. And can I ask, Sarah, the -- so the Assessment Stabilization
24 Reserve Fund is where fund 406 comes from; is that correct?
25
26 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
27 Yes.
28
29 **LEG. FLEMING:**
02:31PM 30 So it's surplus monies from the ASRF that have created this fund
31 406; is that right?
32
33 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
34 That's right, yes.
35
36 **LEG. FLEMING:**
37 And that 406 is -- is the language, is it very lengthy, the
38 language from the Charter? I think it's important that we have a
39 precise understanding of the restrictions on that funding.
02:31PM 40
41 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
42 No, it's just --
43
44 **LEG. FLEMING:**
45 Why don't you just tell us what it is.
46
47 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
48 Sure. So I'm ready C 12-2 D 2 C, which is in fiscal year 2014 or
49 in any subsequent fiscal year through 2021, the excess assessments
02:31PM 50 stabilization reserve fund balance may be used for the duly
51 approved resolutions of the County of Suffolk as follows: For
52 payment to a reserve fund, for bonded indebtedness, established
53 pursuant to 6 H of the General Municipal Law or such successor
54 fund, payment to a retirement contribution reserve fund. And then
55 C, this is the operative language, for installation, improvements,
56 maintenance and operation of sewer infrastructure and sewage

1 treatment plants and for the installation of residential and
2 commercial enhanced nitrogen removal septic systems. These monies
3 may be used for projects outside the boundaries of County sewer
4 districts.

5
6 **LEG. FLEMING:**

7 What's the vetting process? What have the Sisters gone through in
8 order to get to this point being considered at committee?
9

10 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

11 So, first they applied pursuant to a call for applications through
12 the WQPRP fund, which is fund 477. And that was issued October
13 4th, 2019. And there was a number of resolutions that were
14 received -- or applications, rather, received for advanced septic
15 systems. And it was decided that the funding was oversubscribed
16 for fund 477. So there was a decision made on February 13th of
17 2020 by the WQPRP Committee to transfer -- the four applications
18 that pertain specifically to IA systems, innovative alternative
19 septic systems to go to the Sewer Infrastructure Committee.
20

21 So these four applications that are before this Committee today
22 were vetted first by the WQPRP Committee on February 13th and then
23 moved to the Sewer Infrastructure Committee on March 5th. And on
24 -- I'm sorry -- on March 5th the Sewer Infrastructure Committee
25 reviewed them and approved them.
26

27 **LEG. FLEMING:**

28 For what reasons did you move it from 477 to the Sewer
29 Infrastructure Committee? Why didn't you just say, "you're done,
02:34PM 30 you know, we don't have enough money, come back next time." Were
31 there reasons that you felt you needed to continue to look for
32 funding for this project?
33

34 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

35 Sure. The committee felt that these projects were important enough
36 to advance to be funded, but not with the 477 funds at the time.
37 And this is not the first time that we have funded non-profits out
38 of fund 406, the Assessment Stabilization Reserve Fund. We did
02:34PM 39 that previously in 20 -- I think it was 2015 for two projects;
40 Sylvester Manor was one of them for innovative alternative septic
41 system there on Shelter Island as well as Uplands Farm, the Nature
42 Conservancy's IA system over in Legislator Spencer's District.
43

44 **LEG. FLEMING:**

45 And just very briefly, for what reason do you find that these
46 projects are so important that you wanted to continue to look for a
47 funding source even though 477 wasn't available for them?
48

49 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

02:35PM 50 We felt that these projects all have merits. Many of them are in
51 priority area one areas that are mentioned in the subwatershed, the
52 recently released County's Subwatershed Wastewater Plan. And they
53 all have matching funds. These are dollar for dollar matches. So
54 these are leveraging whether it's private investment or municipal
55 investments. This is not the County fully funding the systems.
56

1 **LEG. FLEMING:**

2 Thank you. And considering that it's -- we're going from 11
3 cesspools to 11 IA systems, I think it's extremely important to
4 keep our eye on that fact and the fact that Sister Karen is telling
5 us that we're not able to fund this, that the Sisters won't be able
6 to go forward with it within the context of their very
7 environmentally-sensitive approach to the campus in general.
8

9 Sister Karen, can I just ask you, you mentioned in response to Mr.
02:36PM 10 Trotta's question that you had spent quite sometime on this. Did
11 you vet a number of vendors or how did you approach this and did
12 you -- it sounded like you may have had some conversations with
13 them about whether they would be willing to design the -- whether,
14 you know, we could avoid this \$50,000 expenditure. What were your
15 efforts like and what did you find when you looked into that?
16

17 **SISTER KAREN:**

18 Yes. So, as you know, we've been working with Cameron Engineering
02:37PM 19 Company. They have been the engineers that have overseeing the
20 other two projects that we're doing here. So, I mean, I've had
21 work with engineering with other projects and things like that.
22 But the three companies -- we did look at three different companies
23 that do the actual IA systems. They were the companies that Justin
24 Jobin and John Sohngen had recommended -- well, not recommending
25 but I asked them about the systems. They're not allowed to
26 actually recommend one system, but I did ask them for information
27 regarding which companies we should look at and begin some
28 conversation with them.
29

02:37PM 30 So we did start with that. We had two companies that have actually
31 come on-site, go into each one of the buildings just to see where
32 the lines coming out, you know, how complicated it is, the
33 buildings. For the most part these residences sit -- most of them
34 were built in the early 1930s. One residence is actually -- was on
35 the campus when we purchased the campus in 1896. Another building
36 was 1890s or so, also. So there are some complications there as
37 they talked to us. It's not your easy, just walk into, you know, a
38 ranch-style home here on Long Island. You know, they saw a lot of
02:38PM 39 other complications there. So it was recommended that we would
40 have somebody oversee the engineering process for it. And that
41 came directly from the companies.
42

43 So, you know, of course, they recommend that they could do the
44 engineering part it, but it's not included in the grant; it would
45 have to be separate. I'm not sure what company does include it. I
46 know it's right on the Reclaim our Water site that says engineering
47 costs are not included. So that's new information that I couldn't
48 include engineering costs in the Reclaim our Water but I know, you
02:39PM 49 know, that's what we've been told. And Justin Jobin said the same
50 thing to me; would not include the engineering costs, so.
51

52 **LEG. FLEMING:**

53 I know actually the discussions when -- that we were working on the
54 revisions to the Sanitary Code, it was very important to the County
55 Executive that individuals have skin in the game, which is why they
56 explicitly excluded engineering costs, but that was for private

1 individuals. So what is your not-for-profit status at the
2 Brentwood campus; the Sisters?

3
4 **SISTER KAREN:**

5 We are not-for-profit, yes.

6
7 **LEG. FLEMING:**

8 All right, so I think that's a little distinct from Mr. Trotta's
9 example. But thank you for your efforts and thank you, Sarah, for
10 your answers. And I'm happy to support this. Thank you.

11
12 **P.O. CALARCO:**

13 Thank you, Legislator Fleming. Legislator Trotta, you're back up.
14 Go a little easier. St. Peter will hold it against you.

15
16 **LEG. TROTТА:**

17 Yeah, it's all right. I just talked to Peter Scully. Peter Scully
18 said that that does not sound right for residential houses; to give
19 him a call and that he would direct you in the right direction.

20 Because Peter was one of the guys who helped me help that guy who
21 got the design done and approved by the Health Department. So I
22 think that we should table this one cycle. It's a very short
23 cycle. If Peter Scully can help you and save the County \$50,000 in
24 two weeks, I think it's money well saved. So I would appreciate
25 someone, you know, support this because we don't have any more
26 money and County Executive wants to take what we have. So we need
27 to be looking out for the taxpayer at this point. So I don't think
28 two or three weeks is going to hurt anyone. Peter's expecting your
29 call.

30
31 **SISTER KAREN:**

32 Yeah, and Peter -- Mr. Scully knows me and we've had a number of
33 conversations about this. So this is new information coming. It's
34 confusing.

35
36 **LEG. TROTТА:**

37 Cameron Engineering is in it for one reason; to make money. That's
38 their job, is to make money.

39
40 **P.O. CALARCO:**

41 If I can ask a quick follow-up question here, because I'm reading
42 this is for two locations, Sister Karen. Are we talking about
43 Hampton Bays as well?

44
45 **SISTER KAREN:**

46 Yes. We are just doing -- the engineering would be covered under
47 both, yes.

48
49 **P.O. CALARCO:**

50 And Hampton Bays is exactly what; is that just a small single
51 family, is that a complex?

52
53 **SISTER KAREN:**

54 No, that's much more complex system there, but there's also money
55 from the Town of Southampton for the system there because that
56 would be a larger system.

1
2 **P.O. CALARCO:**
3 Fifty thousand is supposed to cover the 11 single families on your
4 parcel in Brentwood as well as the campus in Hampton Bays.
5
6 **SISTER KAREN:**
7 That's correct, yes, just for the engineering there. But for the
8 cost of the system for Hampton Bays, it would be monies from
9 various places including the Town of Southampton.

02:42PM 10
11 **P.O. CALARCO:**
12 Okay.
13
14 **SISTER KAREN:**
15 It's a commercial site system there.
16
17 **P.O. CALARCO:**
18 Okay.
19
20 **SISTER KAREN:**
21 As opposed to residential.
22
23 **P.O. CALARCO:**
24 Legislator Krupski.
25
26 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
27 Yeah, there's three other resolutions here for sewer infrastructure
28 wastewater treatment systems. Are they all -- are they all for
29 installations of systems? Director Lansdale?

02:42PM 30
31 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
32 You're asking me? Yeah. They are a mix of engineering and
33 construction. And I can give you the breakdown of each of them.
34
35 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
36 And is that part of the SIP program, the next three or not?
37
38 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
39 Yes, it's the same funding source, fund 406.

02:42PM 40
41 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
42 I'm just trying to sort it out because I was under the impression
43 that if you applied for SIP funding, the skin in the game you had
44 was that you would be paying for the design part yourself.
45
46 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
47 Oh, I'm sorry, I'm sorry. It's not for the SIP, which is a
48 residential program. This is fund 406.
49
50 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
51 Okay, because Sister Burke said in this case they were going to
52 apply for the SIP money.
53
54 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
55 Right. I didn't see that on her application.
56

1 **P.O. CALARCO:**
2 I think there is a confusion here.
3
4 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
5 There is, yes.
6
7 **P.O. CALARCO:**
8 This is talking about the 406 commercial properties versus the
9 alternative wastewater system Save Our Waters Grant Program.
02:43PM 10 That's for residential. Correct, Director Lansdale?
11
12 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
13 Yes.
14
15 **P.O. CALARCO:**
16 And all four of these are for the Sewer Infrastructure Grant
17 Program.
18
19 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
02:43PM 20 That's right.
21
22 **P.O. CALARCO:**
23 Which we've also used some of that funding to do things like
24 improvements at Northport's sewer infrastructure, sewer district
25 out in Riverhead -- did we do Riverhead?
26
27 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
28 We did Riverhead, Patchogue and Northport.
29
30 **P.O. CALARCO:**
31 Okay.
32
33 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
34 I'm willing to move this today out of committee but I'd like to get
35 more information, make sure that we're consistent on how we fund,
36 what funds we use and how we fund things. I don't want to get into
37 a situation where we're funding something on a residence there and
38 it doesn't matter who owns it, it's a privately-owned residence
39 that could be sold versus a regular taxpayer not being able to
02:44PM 40 source that same funding for the same thing. That's my concern,
41 that we're consistent with the public money.
42
43 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
44 Understood.
45
46 **P.O. CALARCO:**
47 Why don't we -- on this one particularly because this is -- if you
48 want, we can do a discharge without recommendation and let Sister
49 Karen speak to Mr. Scully between now and Tuesday and see if they
02:44PM 50 can't sort it out.
51
52 **LEG. TROTТА:**
53 That's great.
54
55 **P.O. CALARCO:**
56 Okay, is that a fair compromise?

Okay, it is discharged. And Sister Karen will talk to Pete Scully and see if we can't figure out a way to reduce that total amount.

13 I do.
14
15 **P.O. CALARCO:**
16 Yep, go ahead, Legislator Trotta.
17
18 **LEG. TROTТА:**
19 What is the Vets Place?
02:46PM 20
21 **MR. STOLTZ:**
22 This is a emergency shelter started in 1990 under the name Suffolk
23 County United Veterans. There are 23 homeless people who serve
24 there generally. Right now we're a little bit lower because of the
25 safe distancing under COVID. It's mostly veterans. There are also
26 others who come by way of our relationship with the County's
27 Department of Social Services.
28
29 **LEG. TROTТА:**
02:47PM 30 Where is this located?
31
32 **MR. STOLTZ:**
33 32 Mill Road in Yaphank right along the Carman River, which is
34 what's partly dictating the need for IA system.
35
36 **LEG. TROTТА:**
37 Okay. And you have like a cesspool system now?
38
39 **MR. STOLTZ:**
02:47PM 40 It let Chris talk to kind of what's the existing conditions are.
41 Chris Butkos is our engineer on this.
42
43 **MR. BUTKOS:**
44 Thank you. Yeah, currently the system -- the building is served by
45 very shallow cesspools. There's no septic tanks at all and --
46
47 **LEG. TROTТА:**
48 How far are you from the river?
49
50 **MR. BUTKOS:**
51 Come again?
52
53 **P.O. CALARCO:**
54 How far are you from the river?
55
56

1 **MR. BUTKOS:**
2 Oh -- (inaudible) -- it's very --
3
4 **LEG. TROTТА:**
5 I have no more questions.
6
7 **P.O. CALARCO:**
8 Okay. Anybody else? Legislator Krupski, I thought your hand was
9 up. Did you have a question on this one?
02:47PM 10
11 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
12 Yes. Yeah, just a general -- you know, general IA -- we try to be
13 consistent, so what's the funding source here? And what's the time
14 line for installation, also?
15
16 **MR. STOLTZ:**
17 Chris, on the timeline?
18
19 **MR. BUTKOS:**
02:48PM 20 Well, we're looking at, once we make an application to the Health
21 Department a couple of months for approval there. If we're lucky,
22 maybe less than that. And then we can start construction pretty
23 shortly after. They don't take all that long to put in; a couple
24 months there. Within the year, I would say.
25
26 **P.O. CALARCO:**
27 This is construction; the money's going to be used for
28 construction? Director Lansdale.
29
30 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
31 Yes, it's for 20,000 -- 20,000 for engineering approximately and
32 125,000 for construction.
33
34 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
35 And the flow is how much greater than a single family?
36
37 **MR. BUTKOS:**
38 A single family is typically 300 gallons per day. This site is
39 1,850. So it's the largest Fuji system that they make. It's
02:49PM 40 fairly large flow.
41
42 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**
43 Thank you.
44
45 **LEG. TROTТА:**
46 It's 20,000 for design. Is that what you said?
47
48 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
49 Yep, approximately 20,000.
02:49PM 50
51 **LEG. TROTТА:**
52 And, Chris, you called it a Fuji system, is that what you said?
53
54 **MR. BUTKOS:**
55 That is correct.
56

1 **LEG. TROTТА:**

2 Okay, so we know what it is already. I want to get to the bottom
3 of why we're spending \$20,000 to design something that we know what
4 we're putting in the ground.

5
6 **MR. BUTKOS:**

7 I believe that part of that money is engineering during
8 construction. So that's inspections in the field, making sure
9 everything is installed correctly. It's not strictly just the
10 design of the unit.

11
12 **LEG. TROTТА:**

13 All right.

14
15 **MR. BUTKOS:**

16 Also, you know, when we're talking about design, we're not
17 designing the box that all of the stuff is happening in. There's
18 site constraints which have to be engineered and figured out; so
19 that's where most of that money comes from.

20
21 **P.O. CALARCO:**

22 Okay, Legislator Fleming.

23
24 **LEG. FLEMING:**

25 This is a question -- thank you for being here and for your efforts
26 at the home. Is this -- are you a not-for-profit?

27
28 **MR. STOLTZ:**

29 Suffolk County United Veterans is the initial organization. About
30 five years ago we had a merger. The organization -- the broad
31 organization was called the Association for Mental Health and
32 Wellness. Some of you also know and Legislator Berland knows our
33 Dwyer Project, which is under also Suffolk County United Veterans.
34 And we have some permanent housing and outreach for veterans.
35 That's a part of MHAW.

36
37 **LEG. FLEMING:**

38 What's the not-for-profit status?

39
40 **MR. STOLTZ:**

41 501c3.

42
43 **LEG. FLEMING:**

44 Okay. So, if you were unable to get funding for the design here,
45 what would happen? Where would the -- do you have a source from
46 which the funding -- first of all, let me say I support this. I
47 think all these are very, very meritorious not-for-profit
48 organizations who are trying to do the right things. This is right
49 on the Carmans River, which is a dead river to a certain extent
50 because of nitrogen pollution. I applaud you for making the effort
51 because I'm sure it's not easy to go through all this.

52
53 But I want to ask so the record is clear, you're not-for-profit,
54 you serve veterans. What happens if we don't give you the funding?
55 Do you have another funding source or is this, like the Sisters
56 before you, you would not be able to go forward if you didn't have

1 this design assistance.

2
3 **MR. STOLTZ:**

4 We would not be able to go forward if we didn't have these funds.
5 This is part of a broader plan to improve that property. That's a
6 very old property. We've raised money since this merger five years
7 ago. My agency has raised money to -- already to two stages of
8 improvements to the property. We have been raising money for
9 additional -- for the next stage, which will make a little larger
10 and have a little bit more congregate area for some of our veterans
11 services. It will be allowing us to no longer have to rent an
12 office down the road. And so we basically are raising dollars for
13 the construction, but it's certainly -- when we started to put this
14 plan together, we didn't realize the sewage needs here. And this
15 is a rather huge "not" that will, you know, delays us for years.

16
17 **LEG. FLEMING:**

18 And so if we move it forward, we'll avoid that delay. But, good.
19 And also, to what extent will this help you to ensure that the
20 facility is sustainable for the long-term to serve veterans in
21 need?

22
23 **MR. STOLTZ:**

24 Absolutely it's sustainable. And it's making a better environment
25 for the people we serve; for the veterans we serve.

26
27 **LEG. FLEMING:**

28 And if you're unable to make these upgrades, is it fair to say that
29 we could run a risk of losing the opportunity -- you know, not --
30 you're not able to house the programs that you have, accepting this
31 old fashion cesspool system that is nonfunctional?

32
33 **MR. STOLTZ:**

34 That would be absolutely accurate, thank you.

35

52 Shouldn't they be paying for it themselves? Through Counsel, are
53 we allowed to do this?

55 **MS. SIMPSON:**

56 I mean, from a legal perspective I don't see a -- I believe they

1 applied for the grant program, correct?

2

3 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

4 They did, yes.

5

6 **P.O. CALARCO:**

7 They went through the program like everybody else.

8

9 **MS. SIMPSON:**

02:58PM 10 Right. So, since they came through the program like everybody
11 else, I'm not sure that there's an issue per se just because
12 they're a library and not a non-profit.

13

14 **P.O. CALARCO:**

15 This is not the alternative wastewater system program for
16 homeowners. This is the commercial --

17

18 **MS. SIMPSON:**

19 Yes.

20

21 **P.O. CALARCO:**

22 -- similar to what we gave for the Village of Northport and their
23 sewage treatment plant and the Town of Riverhead and their sewage
24 treatment plant and the Village of Patchogue and their sewage
25 treatment expansion.

26

27 **LEG. TROTТА:**

28 But this is not a sewage treatment. It's a small system.

29

30 **MS. SIMPSON:**

31 It's a similar concept. It's an alternative wastewater treatment
32 system.

33

34 **P.O. CALARCO:**

35 It's a commercial system. It's a commercialized size IA system.

36

37 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

38 It's a Septitech Star Treatment System.

39

40 **LEG. TROTТА:**

41 And where is it located? Is it near the water?

42

43 **P.O. CALARCO:**

44 Yeah, I'll let Mike Firestone answer it, but it's the old St.
45 Ursula Center on Middle Road in Blue Point. It's, I don't know,
46 half a mile from the Bay and it's got wetlands all along the
47 western and southern edge of the property. It's actually
48 Legislator Piccirillo's district. It's just across the street.

51 And this money comes from the Quarter Cent Sales Tax ultimately?

12 know, is a wealthy town. I'm sure they can afford this themselves.

15 they don't have the money. I'm just missing why we're subsidizing,

21 these projects. These four projects are dollar for dollar matches

25 No, it doesn't help because I mean if it was a -- I'd rather
26 subsidize somebody close to the water that doesn't have money than
27 a wealthy community. All right. Whatever. Unless Bridget can
28 give me an answer. She's got an answer for everything. Bridget?

30 **LEG. FLEMING:**
31 Cheap and unnecessary shot.

32
33 **LEG. BERLAND:**
34 I actually think he was right; you do have an answer for
35 everything. There you go.

41 That's like having a guy for everything, right?

51 with regard to the other discussion and the answer that you offered

2 come out of the East End because The East End has been most active

43 **LEG. TROTТА:**

44 I just have one question for Sarah. Is there -- how many people
45 are applying for this? Is there a lot of applications for a system
46 like this? Is there five, ten, a hundred?

47
48 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

49 Well, in the last round I believe there were 20 or more
50 applications in total for the 477 Fund. And we couldn't support
51 all of the viable applications, the 477 applications. So, we took
52 out the applications that were specifically dedicated to or
53 requesting funds for IA systems and moved it to this specific
54 committee, the Sewer Infrastructure Fund, a different funding
55 source. So there were four in this round that were viable.

6 the October 4th that were -- round for applications that were not
