1 **THE MEETING WAS CALLED TO ORDER AT 10:02 AM**

2
3 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

4 Good morning, everyone. Welcome to the Legislature's Environment,
5 Parks and Agriculture Committee. This is the first committee back
6 here in the horseshoe in the Legislature building. So please bear
7 with us as we speak through our masks into the microphone. If we
8 could all rise for a salute to the flag led by Legislator Fleming.
9

10 **SALUTATION**

11
12 I have to say I'm really grateful to see all my colleagues here
13 today. And, Tom, we're glad to have you there on the phone. And
14 Legislator Piccirillo has requested an excused absence today.
15

16 We will not be having public portion because in person public
17 comments are not permitted during this meeting right now.

35 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**
36 Motion to approve.
37

38 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
39 Motion to approve from Legislator Krupski.
40

41 **LEG. FLEMING:**
42 Second.
43

44 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
45 Second by Legislator Fleming. On the motion, do we have anyone
46 here from the -- is that Frank I see behind a mask? Hello, Mr.
47 Castelli. So genuinely pleased to see you, good to see you.
48

49 **MR. CASTELLI:**
50 Thank you.
51

52 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
53 Legislator Krupski, did you -- I thought I saw your hand out of the
54 corner of my eye.
55
56

1 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

2 Thank you.

3
4 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

5 Do you have some questions or comments?

6
7 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

8 I do. So this has been a -- this a longstanding project here and I
9 know everyone's been super conscious of how we fund our capital
10 projects, and this is also a capital project that has changed a
11 great deal. And because there's two capital projects at Indian
12 Island I think there's been quite a bit of confusion as to which is
13 which and to what the status is on these.

14
15 So, Frank, if you could give us a rundown on this one and are there
16 plans and does it have to go through CEQ? And then if you could
17 also give us the funding sources, because that's going to be -- I
18 think the bottom line is going to be the bottom line here.

19
20 **MR. CASTELLI:**

21 Thank you. I just wanted to make sure that everyone is clear that
22 this isn't a shoreline stabilization project. This is a wetland --

23
24 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

25 Frank, if you could just speak -- you might have to move your face
26 closer to the microphone. And you do have some protection there,
27 so.

28
29 **MR. CASTELLI:**

30 Yeah, that's fine. Can you hear me now?

31
32 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

33 Speak as loud as you can, please.

34
35 **MR. CASTELLI:**

36 This is a wetland restoration project. We've been working on this
37 project for several years. This is a -- this is being funded by a
38 \$788,000 DEC Water Quality Improvement Grant. The -- I can just
39 go, you know, I'll quickly rundown the specifics of the project.
40 The project is -- will restore tidal connectivity from Terry Creek
41 into the site. The site is a former dredge spoil site where
42 thousands of cubic yards of sediment were deposited from dredging
43 the nearby Terry Creek and it leads right into the Peconic Estuary.

44
45 The project is proposing to reconnect tidal connectivity by
46 removing -- by removing some of the sediment and also digging
47 channels to bring back tidal connectivity to Terry Creek, which
48 would restore this site to what it was. Back in the 1930's this
49 was a well-functioning marsh, and we have proof from aerial
50 photography from back then, and because of the dredge spoil being
51 deposited there, the tidal connectivity was lost. So now you
52 have --

53
54 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

55 I think one of the main questions has to do with the funding. You
56 said this was entirely DEC funded?

1 **MR. CASTELLI:**

2 Well, not entirely. There is a \$788,000 DEC grant and there is
3 also an additional \$300,000 that was appropriated several years ago
4 out of the Quarter Percent Water Quality, Fund 477. That money has
5 all been put aside, like I said, for several years.

6
7 The project was redesigned, as Legislator Krupski mentioned,
8 several times. Originally, the project was going to -- was going
9 to remove a lot more sediment than what we have now with the
10 redesigned project. The numbers are -- I think originally there
11 was 19,000 cubic yards of sediment proposed to be removed. We
12 reduced that to 11,100 cubic yards to be removed. And this was
13 done because of cost constraints and also we feel that it would be
14 prudent to try to relocate as much of the dredge sediment on the
15 site without having to truck it offsite, which would pretty much be
16 prohibitively expensive.

17
18 There was quite a bit of sediment testing done and the project was
19 also redesigned to avoid the areas that have the greatest amount of
20 toxicity. So we're planning on now we'd only be removing sediment
21 in areas that are relatively clean. And this has all been -- we
22 met with the DEC several times, this has all been approved. In
23 fact, I was surprised that they allowed this grant to go on this
24 long. It shows that the DEC wants us to have it.

25
26 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

27 Yeah, I think it's a good project. I just think the committee, you
28 know, this committee needs to hear the details again. And the
29 spoils are going to -- from this dredging that's happening or
30 cleaning out is going to be put where? You said on-site, but.

31
32 **MR. CASTELLI:**

33 The plan is that most of the dredged -- the excavated --

34
35 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

36 Yes.

37
38 **MR. CASTELLI:**

39 -- sediment will be placed on northwest. There's a northwest
40 portion of the project area, to build up that area, and also along
41 the tidal -- the tidal -- the channels that are going to be
42 excavated. They're going to build up the berms alongside the
43 channels so that they have a proper slope for stabilization of the
44 channels. And it is felt that with, you know, reducing the
45 sediment being excavating to 11,100 cubic yards that we would be
46 okay with -- we'd have -- there would be provision so that that
47 amount of sediment could be relocated onsite, and we have the
48 approval of the Parks Department is agreeable to allowing that to
49 be on-site.

50
51 Hopefully -- there may be some more testing required by the DEC. I
52 mean, like I said, we've done extensive testing. We know where the
53 areas are to stay away from, and the DEC does require testing now
54 where when you're depositing sediment on-site you not only have to
55 test what you're excavating, you have to the test the area that the
56 sediment is going to be relocated to. So there may be some

1 additional testing. The permit applications have not even been
2 submitted yet. And Legislator Krupski asked about CEQ. This
3 project was brought to CEQ, I think twice, in fact, and it was
4 approved. We obtained a negative declaration to an unlisted action
5 at CEQ. That was done, you know.

6
7 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

8 And as you know, we're giving extra scrutiny to all spending right
9 now because of COVID. These funds, neither the grant from the DEC
10 nor the 477 Water Quality Funds could be repurposed, so they can
11 only be spent for this purpose.

12
13 **MR. CASTELLI:**

14 Yeah. The legislation put for the quarter percent money approved
15 that \$300,000 and it has been put aside. It's been out of the fund
16 --

17
18 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

19 Yes.

20
21 **MR. CASTELLI:**

22 -- for many years. We're not taking additional money out of that
23 fund.

24
25 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

26 Right.

27
28 **MR. CASTELLI:**

29 And the DEC wants to -- they want to see this project go --

30
31 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

32 Right.

33
34 **MR. CASTELLI:**

35 -- so that money's there.

36
37 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

38 Legislator Kennedy.

39
40 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

41 Thank you for clarifying some information. I just want to know
42 what toxins have been found in the dredge spoil.

43
44 **MR. CASTELLI:**

45 What toxins?

46
47 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

48 (Shaking head yes).

49
50 **MR. CASTELLI:**

51 There was some arsenic from primarily generally from the
52 agricultural activity. There is -- there was also --

53
54 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

55 The DDT.

1 **MR. CASTELLI:**

2 Excuse me?

3
4 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

5 DDT.

6
7 **MR. CASTELLI:**

8 Yeah, DDT, that's what I was looking for. There were some --
9 generally things that you would expect from agricultural pesticide
10 application that worked its way into Terrys Creek and then would
11 become part of the material that was dredged out and deposited
12 here.

13
14 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

15 So once we complete this project, will we continue to dump dredge
16 spoils onto the new area?

17
18 **MR. CASTELLI:**

19 No, no, no. The dredge spoils are not -- they're no longer being
20 -- they haven't been deposited in this area for many years. What
21 we're -- the new area, we're going to deposit some of the excavated
22 sediment, some of the excavated sediment in order to build up to
23 proper elevations. This will be -- it's a well-designed project.
24 It'll restore -- once the tidal connectivity is restored you'll
25 have a functioning saltwater wetland, a marsh. And there will be
26 different elevations for high marsh, there will be some areas that
27 would be low marsh that get wet twice per day versus some of the
28 high marsh. They only get wet during storm times. But it's all
29 been planned out very well and it is felt that, you know, there's
30 clearly advantages. First of all, it would reduce the need for
31 larvicide because right now you have a mosquito breeding ground
32 there. Once you restore the tidal connectivity you'll bring in
33 some of the predators and the little fish that eat the mosquito
34 larvae. So we're looking for a reduction of larviciding.

35
36 We are also going to design the project so that you have a range of
37 elevations so that the marsh can keep up pace with rising sea level
38 over the years. It won't just be the lowest elevation. There will
39 be some medium and higher marsh in there which can keep up with sea
40 level rising. All this has been planned out. Like I said, the DEC
41 is continuously encouraging us to move forward with this project.

42
43 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

44 Legislator Krupski.

45
46 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

47 Thank you. Just a couple of more questions. To go along with one
48 of the questions that was asked to me by a community member goes
49 along with what Legislator Kennedy was asking about the
50 contaminants in the spoil. So the DDT also was used heavily by
51 Suffolk County Vector Control for a long time to control
52 mosquitoes, so that is in every sediment in every creek because
53 that's where it was used, right there at the creek. So that is
54 also -- I was told that it is the same concentration that exists in
55 the creek today anyway because that's where it was used.

1 So I do have a couple of other questions. Will there be plans so
2 the public can review? Do you have a set of plans that we can
3 distribute?
4

5 **MR. CASTELLI:**

6 Right. We have a redesign, a plan redesign --
7

8 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

9 Okay.
10

11 **MR. CASTELLI:**

12 -- that is available.
13

14 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

15 Thank you. All right. The question was who designed the plan?
16

17 **MR. CASTELLI:**

18 The contractor is L.K. McClean --
19

20 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

21 Okay.
22

23 **MR. CASTELLI:**

24 -- that's been doing the planning and engineering. In fact, this
25 resolution that we're proposing is merely to transfer some of the
26 money, I think \$21,500, from construction into planning, and that's
27 because the -- because of the redesign of the project we need
28 additional planning money.
29

30 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

31 Okay.
32

33 **MR. CASTELLI:**

34 That's all this does.
35

36 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

37 So this goes through your department.
38

39 **MR. CASTELLI:**

40 Right.
41

42 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

43 That was one of the questions, that's fine. The CEQ question, I
44 mean, one of the questions was are you going to dump it on
45 freshwater wetlands, but you're not going to.
46

47 **MR. CASTELLI:**

48 No.
49

50 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

51 Right. I know you'd be -- between you and Parks and DEC that
52 wouldn't be allowed --
53

54 **MR. CASTELLI:**

55 No.
56

1 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

2 -- to fill any more wetlands.

3
4 **MR. CASTELLI:**

5 No, I'm sure it would not be.

6
7 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

8 The other one, is it going back to CEQ because it's been
9 redesigned?

10
11 **MR. CASTELLI:**

12 At this point there's no intention to bring it back. You see, the
13 project is less than what was already received in negative
14 declaration. Like I said, we're removing far less sediment and
15 it's basically the same project. The purpose of the project is the
16 same, so right now there's no intention of needing to bring it back
17 to CEQ.

18
19 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

20 Thank you. Now, I know, and this project goes back for years, just
21 refresh my memory. The contamination in the spoil, it came out of
22 a creek bed, so it's the same level of contamination in the creek
23 bed currently as exists in the spoil.

24
25 **MR. CASTELLI:**

26 Yes, exactly.

27
28 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

29 Okay, thank you. Thank you, Madam Chair.

30
31 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

32 Thank you, Legislator Krupski. Legislator Kennedy had another
33 question.

34
35 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

36 Just a quick question for Lance and for everyone. I know the
37 788,000 is from the DEC. Do we have that money on hand or will we
38 have to bond out and then get paid back?

39
40 **MR. REINHEIMER:**

41 I'm not sure on whether we bond that or not when we get the funds.
42 I'm not sure how long or how delayed the funds would be, but
43 ultimately, if we do receive the funds, it would be used and
44 applied towards the bond payment. So if we have to bond in the
45 meantime, we get the funds two years later, we would use those
46 funds to pay the balance of that bond.

47
48 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

49 It's just that we're not bonding out right now.

50
51 **MR. REINHEIMER:**

52 I'm not sure if we're going to bond that or use existing cash.

53
54 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

55 I guess to that question, who in the State are we working with so
56 that they would say okay, now you're shovel ready, here's the

1 money. How does the State -- I guess a plan for State
2 reimbursement of the money. Is that what you're asking, Legislator
3 Kennedy?

4
5 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

6 No, I know -- I trust that we will be paid back by the DEC. It's
7 just that we're not bonding out right now. So do we have to or do
8 we have it sitting in a pot. I don't know.

9
10 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

11 I know with our grants they wait a long time to get paid. We have
12 a motion and a second. We're going to have to do a roll call. So
13 all those in favor? I guess you'll roll, call the roll.

14

49 to start with questions from Legislators? Can we bring them both
50 up at the same time?

8 Okay, so we'll start with some Legislator questions and we'll point
9 them to whoever is the appropriate answerer. I am going to step up
10 for a moment. Al, you're my Vice-Chair. I do have to take a quick
11 break myself, so if you can -- you want to start with your
12 questions and then run the meeting until I return?

13
14 **VICE CHAIR KRUPSKI:**

15 Thank you. I was just asked to read some comments. I got a
16 letter. It's actually addressed to Legislator Hahn as Chair from
17 Long Island Farm Bureau. And it was just a -- sort of -- it just
18 speaks to, and he asked me to speak about the high points of the
19 letter, just about describing how farmers, you know, farming is a
20 unique business. Less than 2% of the population is involved in
21 producing food and fiber worldwide. And it goes through the Ag
22 District Program and it describes how important the Ag District
23 program is and how parcels are considered for inclusion, and how
24 AML Section 303-B outlines the responsibility for the creation,
25 review and management of Ag districts lies with the authority of
26 the County Legislative body, so a landowner must submit to such
27 body a request for inclusion of lands which is predominately viable
28 agricultural land. This means that each application for inclusion
29 of land into the Ag District Program is intended to be based solely
30 upon whether the land is viable for production of agriculture, and
31 the County Legislature should make its decision solely based upon
32 that discussion.

33
34 So that's a -- it goes on about other criteria and other parts of
35 it, but that's the basis of the letter which he asked me to read
36 into the, you know, to the committee.

37
38 Is there any other comment or question, because I think we can
39 start here with us, with the committee, and then we can listen to
40 everybody else, then we might have other questions.

41
42 **LEG. FLEMING:**

43 I do have a question.

44
45 **VICE CHAIR KRUPSKI:**

46 Legislator Fleming.

47
48 **LEG. FLEMING:**

49 Thank you, Legislator Krupski. I have a question for the lawyers.
50 I don't know if it's Mr. Braun or Ms. Simpson, but I don't
51 understand what a reaffirmed inclusion of a parcel is from a legal
52 perspective. What is the legal effect of this? Is there any
53 precedent for it? Is it setting a precedent for the future? Are
54 we going to be doing everything twice if we do it this way?

1 I guess my understanding so far is that the inclusion was
2 authorized, there was a legal challenge, that challenge is pending
3 and now the applicant is asking us to reaffirm the inclusion as
4 sort of a belt and suspenders in case they lose in court. Is that
5 accurate?

6
7 **MR. BRAUN:**

8 That's pretty close.

9
10 **LEG. FLEMING:**

11 And is there any precedent for it? Is there a legal authority
12 under which we can even do that?

13
14 **MR. BRAUN:**

15 I wasn't familiar with one, so I called Ag and Markets and I spoke
16 to their lawyers and they said that it's not common, but it's
17 certainly permissible.

18
19 **LEG. FLEMING:**

20 And I guess other than the applicant, who's asked us to consider
21 this, is there anyone else in the discussion who feels that it's
22 necessary to reaffirm the inclusion that we've already authorized?
23 Is there any reason for this? Practical effect I guess is my
24 question.

25
26 **MR. BRAUN:**

27 An application was made and the staff reviewed it and they asked
28 the Law Department if this was an appropriate application, and we
29 checked with Ag and Markets and they said we could entertain it,
30 so.

31
32 **LEG. FLEMING:**

33 But what do you anticipate the practical effect of this, today's
34 action, to be should we -- well, Tuesday's action, should the
35 Legislature authorize this reaffirmation. What the practical
36 effect?

37
38 **MR. BRAUN:**

39 It doesn't change anything insofar as we're concerned. But if the
40 applicant or the Village, who seems to be opposed to this
41 application, wants to make some sort of record as a result, they
42 have the opportunity to do that.

43
44 **VICE CHAIR KRUPSKI:**

45 So this went through the Farmland Protection Board, which I sit on.
46 That was back in April, and they felt that this wouldn't do any
47 harm to the Ag Districts as they stand, and so they approved it out
48 of that board.

49
50 **LEG. FLEMING:**

51 My concern is just is it going to do any harm to the process in
52 that now every time there's a legal challenge there's going to be a
53 doubled up process for the Farm Committee, for CEQ, for our body.
54 I just don't understand if it's not necessary why we're now -- from
55 now on every time there's a legal challenge then there's going to
56 be a reaffirm of the inclusion.

1 **MR. BRAUN:**

2 Well, I'm not confident that this application necessarily cures
3 anything. The Village still has its position, the applicant still
4 has its position. CEQ determined in this instance all -- however
5 many of these 20-odd applications individually rather than in one
6 presentation, which is the way it had previously been done. Maybe
7 that changes something. I think it's an unusual circumstance that
8 we're here on this question, and I don't see this as being
9 something that's going to happen frequently.

10

23 last meeting I think the Village said that they were challenging
24 the SEQRA because all of the parcels were put in together, and now
25 the parcels are separated, so that's why they're putting a new
26 application to protect themselves as a separate entity. But what
27 happens if they win on the court level. Will all the other
28 applications that were put in as one SEQRA now no good anymore if
29 they win?

30
31 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

32 There is that possibility, yes.

33
34 **LEG. BERLAND:**

35 Okay. So then -- so then it is necessary for them to do this in
36 anticipation, you know, I assume that Pal-O-Mine is assuming that
37 they're going to win, the Village is going to assume it's going to
38 win. So if the -- if Pal-O-Mine loses, it's ahead of the game with
39 the rest of them in that they, you know, then all the other
40 applications are going to have to do the same thing, will they not?

41
42 **MR. BRAUN:**

43 Well, none of the other, that I'm aware of at least, none of the
44 other properties that were included in that particular go around a
45 few years ago is -- has made a new application or is here. So I'm
46 not clear on what effect it will have on them if the court rules in
47 favor of Pal-O-Mine or rather in favor of the Village. It could
48 very well be that the court limits its decision to the one
49 applicant before it, not throw out the babies with the bath water.

50
51 **LEG. BERLAND:**

52 Yeah, but is there -- I mean, in a perfect world that would be
53 fine, assuming that the Village prevails, but I thought their
54 argument was that Pal-O-Mine can't be a good Ag District because it
55 was lumped in with everything else.

1 **MR. BRAUN:**

2 Well, what the -- I believe what the argument is, and the attorneys
3 for both sides in that litigation are here if you want to ask them,
4 but I believe that the argument in that litigation was that CEQ and
5 the Legislature and Ag and Markets didn't take a close look at the
6 effect of the inclusion on this parcel independently other than
7 just to say well, it's a no big deal type of SEQRA, you know, and
8 that they should have looked harder. Again, what that does to the
9 other properties included at the same time is --

10
11 **LEG. BERLAND:**

12 Right, remains to be seen, yeah. All right. Thank you. Madam
13 Chair, can I ask Counsel for the Village a question?

14
15 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

16 Yes, we can bring forward one at a time, as Mr. Prokop is the
17 Village attorney. I recognize Joe. Thank you for being here.
18 It's really -- it's good to know we're making progress in Suffolk
19 County that we're back here at the Legislature building.
20 Legislator Berland, thank you. And then if we need --

21
22 **LEG. BERLAND:**

23 Thank you, Madam Chair.

24
25 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

26 -- the other attorney we will bring them forward as well.

27
28 **LEG. BERLAND:**

29 So given the questions I was just asking, I guess are you as the
30 Village's attorney willing to stipulate in your action against
31 Pal-O-Mine that you would ask the court to only apply it to
32 Pal-O-Mine and not the rest of the parcels, or is this going to
33 open up a Pandora's Box if you prevail.

34
35 **MR. PROKOP:**

36 The action -- the basis of the action, or one of the basis was that
37 only one SEQRA review was done or one resolution that covered all
38 of the properties involved, and that resolution was subject to
39 challenge by the Village. So the position of the Village was that
40 there was no proper SEQRA done for any of the properties. It's my
41 understanding that Judge Lynch, in the decision that was rendered
42 in January, which gave the guidance for the rest of the case
43 basically, said that the Village did not have standing. He said
44 more or less that the SEQRA was defective but that the Village did
45 not have standing to challenge the SEQRA as to the other
46 properties. And so that basically dealt with that. So we're
47 moving ahead with, you know, with that decision as a frame to
48 litigation.

49
50 **LEG. BERLAND:**

51 Okay. That did not come out at the other hearing, so that's good.
52 You don't have standing, nobody else is challenging anybody else's,
53 so. Okay.

54
55 **MR. PROKOP:**

56 I'm not saying that the Village considers that to be a final

1 result, respectfully, but for the time being that's the result.

2
3 **LEG. BERLAND:**

4 Okay. All right, thank you.

5
6 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

7 Okay. Please, Mr. Prokop, stay there. Legislator Kennedy, did you
8 have a question for Mr. Prokop?

9
10 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

11 No.

12
13 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

14 And then -- okay. And then I want to say we're going to take time
15 in between speakers to clean the microphone and to clean the
16 podium, so don't rush forward. We will get you in. Anyone else
17 have any questions for Mr. Prokop while he's here at the podium?
18 One more, Legislator Berland? Sure.

19
20 **LEG. BERLAND:**

21 I don't quite understand why if you feel that Pal-0-Mine is not in
22 compliance with the Village regulations that you have not served
23 them with any kind of Notice of Violation during this entire
24 process.

25
26 **MR. PROKOP:**

27 We -- there were representations made in 2017 and then also in 2019
28 as far as, but particularly 2017, with regard to these properties
29 and an application had been made or would be made, and we were
30 looking forward to that. One of the most important things that we
31 feel that we need to do as the enforcement agency of the Uniform
32 Code, which basically provides for the safety of all the residents
33 in the State, is to perform inspections of the property and, you
34 know, determine the safety as far as the people that are occupy --
35 that come to the property. We have been focusing on trying to get
36 those inspections, so far frustrated by Pal-0-Mine.

37
38 **LEG. BERLAND:**

39 But you didn't answer my question.

40
41 **MR. PROKOP:**

42 We have not -- as of now, we have not served violations, no.

43
44 **LEG. BERLAND:**

45 But why wouldn't you go that route? Why wouldn't you go to the
46 Zoning Board or Planning Board or whoever in your Village deals
47 with, you know, violations of proper zoning of this property as far
48 as you see it and come at them at both sides. I just don't quite
49 get it.

50
51 **MR. PROKOP:**

52 We may still. We're considering all of our options. I wanted to
53 make sure, there was some confusion at the full Legislature
54 meeting, there was a couple of comments and I just want to make
55 sure that everybody respectfully understands that this discussion
56 has nothing to do with the use at 829. There were a couple of

1 comments by Legislators that they were familiar with the Pal-0-Mine
2 operation and, you know, the work that it does. That work is at a
3 completely different property which is down the road from these
4 properties, and that's the equestrian operation. We're talking
5 about residential properties, homes, that were acquired by
6 Pal-0-Mine in a neighborhood and the impacts of those acquisitions.

7
8 The Village as of now has -- we're considering our options. We
9 haven't -- we did serve violations at one time because the owner of
10 record was -- we noticed that the use had changed. We went into
11 the system that we use to identify the owner of record and it ended
12 up that the owner that -- the person that we served, I believe, I
13 wasn't the attorney that prosecuted, I believe that we ended up
14 serving and naming a prior owner because we weren't aware that the
15 owner of record had changed. And those tickets were withdrawn
16 because we realized that it was a prior owner. We haven't -- other
17 than trying to basically try to ensure the safety of the people
18 that are there, because it's now a place of public assembly, the
19 homes that they've converted we haven't pursued the zoning or
20 violation course at this time.

21
22 **LEG. BERLAND:**

23 Right. I guess that's as, you know, a former town board member and
24 former Assistant Town Attorney, that's the part that just doesn't
25 ring true to me, because to attack -- to go after on your attack on
26 the Ag and Markets designation as opposed to going through the, you
27 know, zoning and/or planning route through your Village, doesn't
28 make sense. Because if you're talking safety, it would seem to me
29 that the best way to be able to ensure getting in to inspect is to
30 serve a Notice of Violation and go after their zoning and, you
31 know, have them in District Court in order of, you know, an
32 inspection. So, you know, it seems a little disingenuous to me
33 what the Village is trying to do if it's not pursuing all of its
34 available remedies simultaneously. I just, you know, I guess you
35 can't answer as to why. It doesn't make sense to me.

36
37 **MR. PROKOP:**

38 Could I respond?

39
40 **LEG. BERLAND:**

41 Sure.

42
43 **MR. PROKOP:**

44 Well, I mean, it's a Village. It's not the town, one of the major
45 towns, so we, you know, we have resources that we're dealing with,
46 limited resources. But the -- what we're more concerned --

47
48 **LEG. BERLAND:**

49 Do you not have a zoning --

50
51 **MR. PROKOP:**

52 Yes, we do.

53
54 **LEG. BERLAND:**

55 Right, so what resources are you limited by, you have a Zoning
56 Board or, you know, there are lots of villages that have, you know,

1 Zoning Boards. If you have the capability of -- how can you say
2 you don't have the capability to bring that action but you have the
3 capability and you want the capability to inspect the buildings.
4 How do you reconcile those two?
5

6 **MR. PROKOP:**

7 I didn't say that we don't have the resources. I made a comment
8 about our resources. We are considering all of our options and
9 that is one of the options that we're considering. What we're more
10 concerned -- what the Village is more concerned about is that
11 there's been a representation by Pal-0-Mine, which has been
12 affirmed by the County, that this property can legally be used for
13 the uses that exist. It cannot. The specific section, 157-57 of
14 our Code, has been repeatedly cited, does not say that these uses
15 are legal uses. We're more concerned about the sovereignty of the
16 Village versus the imposition of the County of uses that we believe
17 are illegal, and that's what we're dealing with now. Whether we
18 pursue the violation course today, next week, I'm not sure, but
19 that is something that the Village is considering.
20

21 **LEG. BERLAND:**

22 But if they're illegal uses then you should serve a Notice of
23 Violation for them using the property illegally. That seems to me
24 the most expeditious way to do it as opposed to going into, you
25 know, Supreme Court and taking the route that you're taking against
26 the Ag and Markets, which is why the County's involved in the first
27 place. If you would have just filed Notice of Violation that
28 they're, you know, using that and have them go to the Zoning Board
29 for a variance, which they can do, if it's not a legal use under
30 your zoning they can file for a variance. And then if their Zoning
31 Board denies their variance, for whatever reason, then they can
32 file an Article 78 and challenge it. Then you have a whole other,
33 you know, course of remedies which makes sense in this, not to, you
34 know, go after it in an Ag and Markets. It just seems a roundabout
35 way to me. You know, maybe the Village doesn't really feel that it
36 has the capability of winning on a Notice of Violation, you know,
37 or that the Zoning Board won't grant them the right to do it. I
38 don't know. It just doesn't ring true to me. But, thank you.
39

40 **MR. PROKOP:**

41 Thank you for the opportunity to respond.
42

43 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

44 Okay. Were there any other questions for Mr. Prokop? Thank you
45 very much. And then if we can just give the Clerk some time to
46 clean off the podium and the microphone we'll call up Mr. Snead.
47 Oh, did you want to say one more thing?
48

49 **MR. PROKOP:**

50 Thank you for the opportunity address the committee today. I --
51 the Village really appreciates it. There is no comments period
52 other than the -- I did -- I want to make sure that you're aware
53 that I did submit written comment, and if there is an opportunity
54 to give comments rather than -- as compared to answering questions,
55 I would appreciate that.
56

1 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
2 Thank you. We have the written comments and then this will, if it
3 passes out of this committee, there will be additional opportunity
4 for comment before the General Meeting as well.

5
6 **MR. PROKOP:**
7 Thank you.

8
9 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
10 Although, Presiding Officer Calarco, we will not have public --
11 will we have public portion during the General Meeting?

12
13 **P.O. CALARCO:**
14 We will have public portion at the General Meeting.

15
16 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
17 Will that be a Zoom meeting?

18
19 **P.O. CALARCO:**
20 The General Meeting will be by Zoom and the public portion will be
21 by Zoom, so certainly anybody can speak. But, remember, during our
22 public portion we don't allow questioning.

23
24 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
25 Yes.

26
27 **P.O. CALARCO:**
28 If at the General Meeting there is a desire by colleagues to hear
29 from Mr. Prokop or Mr. Snead we'll accommodate that and make
30 appropriate accommodations.

31
32 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**
33 Thank you.

34
35 **P.O. CALARCO:**
36 But that would come during the course of --

37
38 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
39 It will all be via Zoom as previously. For the public portion we
40 will have that, but it will be via zoom and the Clerk, we have that
41 information on the website, you know, how to sign up for that.

42
43 **MR. PROKOP:**
44 Thank you.

45
46 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
47 Thank you. So just one moment, Mr. Snead, and we'll take the time.

48
49 Thank you. Okay, we'll let him come forward. So, Legislator
50 Krupski, did you have any questions for Mr. Snead?

51
52 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**
53 No, thank you.

54
55 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
56 No? Legislator Berland?

1 **LEG. BERLAND:**

2 No.

3
4 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

5 No. Legislator Kennedy?

6
7 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

8 No.

9
10 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

11 Was there anything -- I don't want a statement. If there's
12 anything in particular you need to, you know, clarify or correct,
13 you know, or put your point of view on the record based on what has
14 been said thus far now is the time.

15
16 **MR. SNEAD:**

17 Well, I think the only thing that probably needs an address is
18 Legislator Fleming asked what the practical effect of us making
19 this application. Is that better? Legislator Fleming has asked
20 about the practical effect of our application here, and we have an
21 ongoing operation. It's not-for-profit. You guys probably know
22 what we do there, but we assist people who have special needs
23 through the use of horses and equine therapy. That takes in a lot
24 of different aspects, everything from riding the horses in a ring
25 to caring for the horses in a barn, to learning about horses, to
26 learning about agriculture. And on the particular properties we're
27 talking about we grow plants, we have a greenhouse. The students
28 grow those plants and learn how to do that. We do have a residence
29 on both of these properties and that residence is used. They're
30 both single family -- basically single occupancy. We have interns
31 who use them.

32
33 But with regard to the 899 property, we also use that first floor
34 as a meeting area for our students. If it's raining, we'll go in
35 and deal with things. If we want to sit them down in a class-like
36 atmosphere, not necessarily with tables and blackboards and things
37 like that, but to sit down and talk to them that's where we do
38 that, and we've been open and aboveboard with the Village about
39 that. But we do have an going operation.

40
41 The process we followed, the SEQRA process that was followed in
42 2017, was the process that was dictated by the County, and we were
43 happy to do that. And the allegation now by the Village is that
44 because the County had done it the same way they had done it every
45 year previous and included everybody on one SEQRA determination,
46 that that violated the process of SEQRA. Not that there was any
47 actual significant impact, not that there was a problem with what
48 we're doing, not that there was -- that we weren't agriculture, but
49 that because our application didn't have a separate EAF that
50 somehow we were in violation. So a lawsuit was filed. We then get
51 to this year and the judge says we think that -- I think that this
52 may be an issue and -- but we're going to let out everybody else in
53 this case because the Village had -- did not have standing to bring
54 an action against them.

1 So to your point, those entities, all of the other entities in 2017
2 are in effect shielded from whatever the decision is that happens
3 in this case. But I have to manage risk, that's my job as an
4 attorney. And were this judge to come down against us, we would be
5 out of the district. And as soon as that happens we lose the
6 protections of the district.

7
8 One of those protections, aside from the zoning protection which
9 the Village seems to be concerned about, is that we can be
10 condemned upon. Said another way, the law provides us a shield
11 from condemnation so long as we are in the district. Once that is
12 gone, we face the real potential that the Village could come in and
13 condemn our property.

14
15 Now, this is not a pie in the sky idea. The Village has sought
16 every year since 2014 to keep our operation out of the district.
17 In 2018, they purchased two piece of property right across the
18 street from these properties you're talking about. They did that
19 in a residential neighborhood of five or six houses.

20
21 **LEG. FLEMING:**

22 I'm not sure -- my question was what's the practical effect of the
23 procedure. It was a procedural question and I understand the
24 merits are very important to you and there's a lot of passion here.
25 I just wanted to know the procedural -- that practical effect.

26
27 **MR. SNEAD:**

28 You mean the practical effect of going through it here or the
29 impact on us if we -- why we did it.

30
31 **LEG. FLEMING:**

32 No, no. I was talking about the process. Thank you.

33
34 **MR. SNEAD:**

35 I apologize. I took the question a different way. All that being
36 said, we are agriculture. We believe that we are important as
37 agriculture to the community and to Long Island. The other issues
38 that are raised by the Village will be dealt with in front of the
39 court, but the singular issue that they've raised, which is that we
40 were part of a 20 some odd or 18 some odd packet on a SEQRA review,
41 we brought a new application. This application is going through
42 with the full review as every other application is receiving. We
43 are having a single EAF dealt with and a single SEQRA review on us,
44 and it is our position that once that is done we would be worthy as
45 a -- we would be worthy for inclusion as anybody else would into
46 District No. 3. We just happen to have the unique situation that
47 we're involved in a litigation on a past application that was
48 approved by this Legislature.

49
50 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

51 Thank you. Were there any other questions? Legislator Berland.

52
53 **LEG. BERLAND:**

54 I'm sorry. You said you think the Village will condemn the
55 property?

1 **MR. SNEAD:**

2 Well, I was stopped in the middle of that. They have in many
3 instances tried to stop our operation.

4
5 **LEG. BERLAND:**

6 Right. But why do you -- I have a specific question as why you
7 think --

8
9 **MR. SNEAD:**

10 By condemnation.

11
12 **LEG. BERLAND:**

13 -- right to condemnation. That seems a bit extreme.

14
15 **MR. SNEAD:**

16 Well, yes, except that across the street they condemned the
17 property from us. That's across from our main facility. Not that
18 we had any intention of buying that, but that's what they've done.
19 So they're clearly capable and willing to use condemnation. More
20 importantly, the property that sits between these two properties
21 and our main facility is another residential property. We now own
22 that. But at the time we were in contract to buy it the Village
23 came in and made a higher offer to the applicant, to the owner, to
24 buy that out from under us and to put themselves right in the
25 middle of our operation with a supposed highway yard. Now, the
26 owner, the wonderful person that she was, took our lesser offer and
27 conveyed it to us rather than conveying it to the Village.

28
29 **LEG. BERLAND:**

30 Did you go after the Village for that? Did you file --

31
32 **MR. SNEAD:**

33 There was no need to.

34
35 **LEG. BERLAND:**

36 -- a litigious action --

37
38 **MR. SNEAD:**

39 There was no need to. We ultimately got the property, so there was
40 no need to go after the Village. But what I'm --

41
42 **LEG. BERLAND:**

43 I guess what I'm trying to understand is that your condemnation
44 issue -- did they purchase the property across the street or did
45 they condemn the property?

46
47 **MR. SNEAD:**

48 I'm not sure what they've done with it.

49
50 **LEG. BERLAND:**

51 But you said it both ways, so.

52
53 **MR. SNEAD:**

54 It went through the condemnation process. I am not sure whether
55 that's culminated. The point then is, is that they actually tried
56 to buy out a chunk of our property right between us.

1 **LEG. BERLAND:**

2 Okay. That's a different thing. I'm done.

3
4 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

5 It's kind of off-topic. We're getting a little bit off-topic, so
6 let's -- I apologize, Mr. Snead and Mr. Prokop, but we've kind of
7 heard exhaustive testimony on this --

8
9 **MR. SNEAD:**

10 I understand.

11
12 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

13 -- from each side. Legislator Kennedy, did you have another
14 question?

15
16 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

17 Basically it's along the lines with what you just said. Reading
18 the full letter from Rob Carpenter of the Farm Bureau, everything
19 we've just discussed with both of you is not inclusive of what
20 we're voting on. We're voting on is this land capable of being
21 included in a farm district and it specifically says what to avoid,
22 such as issues have included the site plan review use of property
23 for educational programs, the intensity of the property use,
24 residential characteristics of surrounding area, potential
25 increases in traffic, aesthetics and the Village's opinion of the
26 use or the parcels related to parkland. So none of that counts
27 here. This is just are these pieces of land capable of being added
28 into parkland. That's it.

29
30 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

31 Into the Ag District, right. Okay. Legislator Anker.

32
33 **LEG. ANKER:**

34 Yeah, but I think the problem is that once it's added into the Ag
35 District, as Legislator Krupski would understand, is that it
36 negates a lot of the control and authority that the local
37 municipalities have. Is that -- how does that effect the local
38 municipality?

39
40 **MR. SNEAD:**

41 It doesn't negate their authority one iota. What it says is
42 there's a process they have to go through to impose -- if they want
43 to impose an unreasonable restriction of agriculture. And the only
44 unreasonable restrictions -- if they have a restriction it has to
45 be a health and safety related restriction. So when you start
46 talking about things like building permits and, you know, how you
47 build something out, whether or not you have to sprinkler a
48 property, whether it has to be ADA compliant, that all applies
49 because that's health and safety.

50
51 The question then is, is the decision they're applying -- they want
52 to make on our property unreasonably restricted, and there's a
53 process set up and they go through the Zoning Board. That then
54 would to the Department of Agriculture for a comment, then the
55 Village can make its decision. And if somehow the Commissioner
56 overrode the Village's zoning issues, finding that it wasn't health

1 and safety, then the Village has a right to right to do an Article
2 78. So there's a whole process here and nothing immediately
3 truncates Village zoning by you putting this property into
4 district.

5
6 **LEG. ANKER:**

7 It reminds me of a particular situation I had in my district where
8 there's a farm, a garden store and then the farm. And there was an
9 individual that didn't like the crows on his flowers and, you know,
10 the vegetation that they were selling, and so he had the ability to
11 use his firearm to scare -- or cannon, it was an actual cannon, and
12 there was really nothing, I guess, the Town of Brookhaven could do
13 because it was in an Ag District. It's an unusual situation but,
14 again, I don't know, again, Al, if you wanted to comment on that as
15 far as, you know, the restrictions that, you know, these folks, the
16 farmers have that are -- in a designated Ag District and then, you
17 know, dealing with the surrounding residential community.

18
19 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

20 All right. I think we're getting a little bit off the topic here
21 on this.

22
23 **LEG. ANKER:**

24 No, because this is an important issue.

25
26 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

27 That's a good question. I could answer that.

28
29 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

30 Legislator Krupski.

31
32 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

33 Sure. So because it does -- it does relate to how much local
34 control there is versus how much control Ag and Markets has. But
35 the Ag Districts have been around for how many decades?

36
37 **MR. SNEAD:**

38 I think from the 80's.

39
40 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

41 At least from the 80's. Yeah, I think it goes back before the
42 80's. They've been around for a long time. So there is, as was
43 mentioned, a process in place where a local municipality can exert
44 control, and if the landowner thinks that it's too much control it
45 can appeal to Ag and Markets. Then Ag and Markets -- then they
46 have to render a decision. So there is this process in place.
47 This is not the first time this has come up. It does give the
48 landowner some piece of mind if there's unfair -- you know, and a
49 lot of it is noise generated, and it's not just -- crows are a
50 problem, we all agree, but it's not just the noise candidates like,
51 you know, you can't run an irrigation motor in the evening, that
52 sort of thing, where some things are really essential to ag
53 production.

54
55 However, as was discussed, and it's absolutely true, there's no
56 relief from New York State Building Code or anything like that, you

1 know, property line setbacks. They still have to follow all those
2 rules if you're in the Ag District, I know that. You still have to
3 get building permits.

4
5 **LEG. ANKER:**

6 Okay, good to know. And, again, the particular situation was so --
7 it really overwhelmed the community, you know, and it was said --
8 so the bottom line was well, it's an Ag District, there's nothing
9 anyone can do, and that's concerning. But, you know, I support
10 horse farms. We've had horses for decades and I think it's
11 wonderful what they're doing, you know, again, with the therapy,
12 the horse therapy. So, you know, again, I'll be in support of
13 this. Thank you.

14
15 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

16 So did anyone else have a question for Mr. Snead? Okay, so we're
17 going to let them clean the microphone. Did anyone have any
18 questions for Bob Braun, our attorney.

19
20 **MR. SNEAD:**

21 Thank you.

22
23 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

24 Thank you. Anyone have any questions for Bob Braun? How about
25 Augie? Is that Augie in the back? Anyone have any questions for
26 Augie Ruckdeschel? No, all right. So we have a motion and a
27 second. Roll call.

28
29 (*Roll call by Ms. Ellis, Clerk of the Legislature*)

30

6 public portion, and so you should be able to do that if you need

8

10
11 Moving on to Introductory Resolutions. **Introductory Resolution**

13 **Island by Long Island Abate, Inc. Or its LI Abate Campout**
14 **Fundraiser. (Co. Exec.).** Oh, that should be for its LI Abate
15 Campout Fundraiser.

16
17 I'll make a motion for the purpose of discussion; seconded by
18 Legislator Krupski. On the motion. Is the Commissioner here?
19 We're going to get the Commissioner. Okay, thank you. The room
20 was too full. We've already cleaned the microphone; can you
21 confirm that? Yes, okay. Microphone and the podium are clean.
22 Mr. Smagin, thank you. How are you?

23
24 **ACTING COMMISSIONER SMAGIN:**

25 Good. How are you?

26

29 progress in Suffolk County. A lot of hard work by our residents

31

45 put it on the record today at today's meeting, that obviously if
46 we're not in a phase that allows this kind of event or the numbers
47 that we're talking about or the camping is not open or yada, yada,
48 we would -- this would not happen.

49
50 **ACTING COMMISSIONER SMAGIN:**

51 Yes, we would make sure to restrict anything that wouldn't be
52 allowable under whether it's the State guidance or the local
53 municipality.

54
55 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

42 Arts Council, Inc. For its Jerry Jam Music Festival Fundraiser.
43 (Co. Exec.). Motion by myself; seconded by Presiding Officer
44 Calarco. Same questions, same answers?

45
46 **ACTING COMMISSIONER SMAGIN:**

47 Yes.

48
49 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

50 Anyone else have any questions? Okay. All those in favor? Roll
51 call. Oh, I missed -- I apologize, Legislator Kennedy.

52
53 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

54 No, no. You said same question, same answer, so I thought he was
55 going to answer the date and whatever.

23
24 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

25 This is a little bit different than like a beach, you know, where
26 it's like okay, well, as long as they're spreading out. This is
27 actually an assembly of people, you know, so it's different. There
28 would be different rules I imagine.

29
30 **ACTING COMMISSIONER SMAGIN:**

31 Yeah, and, you know, depending on what phase we are in --

32
33 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

34 Right.

35
36 **ACTING COMMISSIONER SMAGIN:**

37 -- will have to be interpreted at that time whether what their plan
38 would be would fall in line.

39
40 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

41 Okay. Legislator Krupski has a question.

42
43 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

44 So I have to have faith in Mr. Smagin because what he did there to
45 help at Cedar Beach to bring some order to what was really a pretty
46 rough situation so -- and he did it quickly and efficiently. So I
47 would think that he would follow the same sort of protocols and
48 good judgement that he used there, and that was quite the scenario.
49 So thank you for that.

50
51 **ACTING COMMISSIONER SMAGIN:**

52 Thank you.

53
54 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

55 I also, you know, if we do consider having music, live music type
56 activities on large lawn areas, I have -- I actually have a Girl

1 Scout Gold candidate, Courtney, who is working on picnic circles on
2 different green areas. You know, so chalking circles on a grassy
3 area to keep people far enough distance away could, you know, could
4 help these kinds of scenarios. Lot of other cities are doing it
5 and it's been successful. So hopefully any plan they submit would
6 include that kind of idea.

7
8 **ACTING COMMISSIONER SMAGIN:**

9 Yes, I mean, I can tell you that the amount of plans that we've
10 been receiving from our different vendors and everything else,
11 there's been a lot of unique kind of fixes to the issues to make
12 sure people are socially distancing, and we sent a lot of plans
13 back, you know, the goal is to make sure that it fits the
14 standards.

15
16 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

17 And, obviously, you know, no one's asking for us to accelerate the
18 phases to meet their events. They recognize we have to be in Phase
19 4 at least.

20
21 **ACTING COMMISSIONER SMAGIN:**

22 We've had, you know, organizations taking steps and cancelling
23 things because of that, so.

24

43 Enhanced Suffolk County Drinking Water Protection Program 2014
44 Referendum land purchases for Open Space Preservation (CP
45 8732.210) - for the Forcina and Horan property Pine Barrens Core
46 Town of Southampton (SCTM Nos. 0900-280.00-02.00-014.000 and
47 0900-306.00-02.00-004.000). (Co. Exec.). Motion by Legislator
48 Fleming; seconded by Legislator Krupski. On the motion. We are
49 cleaning the microphone and the podium. This is an acquisition.
50 Director Lansdale, I don't imagine that there's much to say. If
51 you want to maybe give us the rating as per usual. This is the
52 last piece of the process.

53

54 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

55 Sure. So this is -- can you hear me?

56

1 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

2 Yes, thank you.

3
4 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

5 Is a total of 2.02 acres in size. It's located within the Pine
6 Barrens Core within the Dwarf Pine Plains the County needs to
7 preserve.

8
9 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

10 Thank you. We have a motion and a second. Roll call.

11
12 (*Roll call by Ms. Ellis, Clerk of the Legislature*)

43 Director Lansdale, we might need you -- so don't clean because I'm
44 just going to keep her at the podium if you all don't mind that and
45 save an extra wipe.

46
47 So this is Introductory Resolution 1521, To extend the deadline
48 directing the Division of Planning in the Department of Economic
49 Development and Planning to update the boundary of the "Narrow Bay
50 Floodplain & Hazard Mitigation Plan" in the Mastic/Shirley area.
51 (Sunderman).

52
53 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

54 So motion by Legislator Kennedy.

1 **LEG. MURATORE:**

2 Motion to approve.

3
4 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

5 Oh -- seconded by Legislator Muratore. So on the motion,
6 Legislator Krupski.

7
8 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

9 So what is the plan and why are we updating it?

10
11 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

12 So this resolution was previously approved by the Legislature
13 allowing us to work closely with Legislator Sunderman as well as
14 groups like the Nature Conservancy and the Town of Brookhaven. We
15 learned earlier this year that the Town of Brookhaven has a
16 different Mastic/Shirley Conservation Area than the County, so we
17 wanted to look at their boundary and our boundary, as well as the
18 latest science that is out there regarding sea level rise and
19 wanted to reconcile all of those factors.

20
21 So we started and initiated in good faith earlier this year, had
22 several meetings with both the Town Planner, Luke Ormand, as well
23 as Alison Branco from the Nature Conservancy and had planned a
24 series of in person meetings that had to be canceled due to
25 COVID-19. So we're requesting at this time an extension.

26
27 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

28 And if you reconcile the differences on the map, what will that
29 mean now?

30
31 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

32 We may come back to the Legislature depending on what is found, you
33 know, with these differences and adjust the boundary for the
34 County.

35
36 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

37 But what does it mean if you're in that area, that designated area?

38
39 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

40 So if you're in the Mastic/Shirley Conservation Area, as per
41 resolution that was previously approved by this Legislature, it
42 allows then tax delinquent properties to be transferred to parks or
43 to -- or to a local municipality, the Town of Brookhaven, for
44 conservation.

45
46 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

47 Great. Thank you.

48
49 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

50 Legislator Kennedy.

51
52 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

53 Will this affect the ability of the homeowners to get flood
54 insurance if they're in the plain? If they're in the map itself
55 will they be able to get flood insurance? Federal?

1 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**

2 I think so.

3
4 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

5 I think so, too.

6
7 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

8 Okay. We have a motion and a second. Roll call.

9

39 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

40 Okay. Thank you, Director Lansdale. Okay, we will go back to
41 **Introductory Resolution 1508, Appropriating funds for the purchase**
42 **of equipment for the Environmental Health Laboratory (CP 4079).**
43 **(Co. Exec.).** I imagine this is why Walter is here. Hello. Thank
44 you for being here. I'll make a motion; seconded by Legislator
45 Krupski. On the motion, anyone?

46

47 **LEG. FLEMING:**

48 I just would like to know what equipment we're talking about.

49

50 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

51 Great. Mr. Dawydiak, come on down. Good to see you. Thank you
52 for all your work during these very tough times.

53

54 **MR. DAWYDIAK:**

55 Thank you, Legislator Hahn; you as well. Walter Dawydiak, Director
56 of Environmental Quality. Today we're requesting the appropriation

1 of a previously authorized \$270,000 in Capital Project 4079. The
2 equipment list that we're submitting matches what the Legislature
3 approved for the authorization. It includes a number of pieces of
4 equipment, most of which are quite old and at the end of their
5 useful life. Repairs are not guaranteed, they're costly and they
6 can send methods down for periods of time which make operations
7 difficult.

8
9 The equipment list includes five pieces. One of them is an
10 automated multiparameter system, 17 years old, for PH conductivity
11 and alkalinity. We have a gas chromatograph mass spectrometer
12 that's almost ten years old and used for pesticides. It's got a
13 faulty electron capture detector, which despite multiple repairs,
14 continues to leak. So it's not unsafe yet, but it's not something
15 we want to use and let it become unsafe. A reverse osmosis system
16 for distilled water which is used in virtually all methods of the
17 laboratory, again, over ten years old, beyond its useful life,
18 needs to be replaced. A glassware dishwasher for VOC's and
19 pesticides, and then oil and grease extraction system to remove oil
20 and grease sampling, which is required by DEC for our SPEDES
21 sampling.

22
23 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

24 Okay, thank you. Legislator Krupski.

25
26 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

27 How many samples are you running, like per month or per year?

28
29 **MR. DAWYDIAK:**

30 So right now our sample quota is down. We're running full scale
31 beach sampling. We never stopped doing industrial sampling.
32 During the pandemic we've been doing water samples only on an
33 emergency basis, so right now I don't have the exact numbers in
34 front of me, but it's significantly lower than historically over
35 the last two or three months.

36
37 Overall in the course of a year our typical output is over 10,000
38 samples a year. It's about 5,000 for water resources, it's about
39 3,000 for public water supply, about 1,000 for groundwater and
40 about 1,000 for private wells. We run 500 sewage treatment plant
41 samples, we run about 1,000 industrial samples, about 3,000 beach
42 samples, and I'm sure I'm forgetting something, but that all adds
43 up to about 10,000.

44
45 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

46 Great. Thank you.

47
48 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

49 Okay. Legislator Kennedy.

50
51 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

52 I have to ask a question. What's the difference on number four
53 between a mid-size glassware washer and a commercial dishwasher,
54 other than --

1 **MR. DAWYDIAK:**

2 I believe that this is a commercial grade dishwasher. It's a
3 specialty unit because it has to operate at certain extended high
4 temperatures for periods of time. It also has a deionized water
5 rinse. This is a little bit smaller than the ones in the
6 Bacteriology Lab, but it's also portable. It can be moved from
7 room to room as needed.

8
9 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

10 Okay, thank you.

11
12 **MR. DAWYDIAK:**

13 Thank you.

14
15 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

16 Okay. Any other questions? We have a motion and a second. Roll
17 call.

18

55 So there was a little bit maybe -- if you don't mind cleaning that
56 again. I might have to call back -- I apologize. I am having some

1 confusion about whether we have a need for an Executive Session for
2 the Triple A items that were tabled but we tabled, if I'm being
3 reminded, I apologize. We tabled them to a date -- to a later date
4 to give time and so there's no need at this point, Director
5 Lansdale, correct?

6
7 **DIRECTOR LANSDALE:**
8 That's correct.

9
10 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
11 Okay. So, seeing nothing further on the agenda, anyone -- any
12 Legislators have any questions for any of the staff that's here?
13 No? Seeing none, we are adjourned.
