5 All right, thank you. Welcome to the regular Committee meeting of
6 Department of Public Works, Transportation & Energy. All rise for
7 the Pledge of Allegiance led by Legislator Gonzalez.

39 Yeah, what piece of property is this?
40

41 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

42 Well, no, that's what -- that's a good question. And because it
43 references a certain -- it has a tax map but it's a certain
44 property adjacent to that referenced property. So I'm gonna ask --
45 I'm looking on the screen. I'll start with Sarah. Sarah, could we
46 get a -- could we get a -- who do we talk to to get --

48 **MS. SIMPSON:**

49 I was gonna punt to either Bob Braun or somebody in Public Works.
50

51 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

52 So, I don't see the Commissioner here. Bob Braun.
53

54 **MR. BRAUN:**

55 Yes, sir.

1 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

2 You're up, get a bat and a helmet. Why don't we have a -- an
3 actual tax map number for the parcel?
4

5 **MR. BRAUN:**

6 I think this -- I have a vague memory of having discussed this. I
7 don't want to -- what I'm saying is is just what I think I
8 remember. But I think this is, like, was a part of a road or
9 something that didn't have a tax map number, something like that.
10 I'll look into it.
11

12 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

13 Okay. I did see a map and I know there's ongoing discussions. And
14 I don't think there's any objection to tabling it. And I don't see
15 anyone else on the meeting that could answer that.
16

18 If I may, Legislator Krupski?

20 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

21 Please.

24 Yeah, if I recall correctly, Bob is right, this a -- an abandoned
25 roadway. It is in Legislator's Anker's district and I think she's
26 been trying to sort this out and is working with the Administration
27 and I think they were all agreement to table it for the cycle.

16 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

17 Thank you, Amy.

19 **INTRODUCTORY RESOLUTIONS**

20
21 **Introductory Resolutions, 1991, Directing the Department of Public**
22 **Works to establish a plan to support pollinators along roadsides in**
23 **Suffolk County. (Hahn). Is that a motion to approve, Legislator**
24 **Berland?**

25
26 **LEG. BERLAND:**

27 Motion to approve. Yes, absolutely.

28
29 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

30 Second by Legislator Trotta.

31
32 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

33 On the motion, Mr. Chairman.

34
35 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

36 Legislator Piccirillo.

37
38 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

39 Can I just get an explanation of what these pollinators are and
40 what they do and how much they are.

41
42 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

43 I would like to defer to -- supporting pollinators, I assume would
44 be signs saying we support our pollinators.

45
46 *(*Laughter*)*

47
48 I would like to defer to Legislator Hahn. I see she's joined us.

49
50 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

51 Oh, my goodness.

52
53 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

54 Yes, yes; give me 20 seconds.

1 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

2 Go ahead, Kara, no problem.

3
4 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

5 Let me pull over.

6
7 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

8 Yes, please.

9
10 **LEG. GONZALEZ:**

11 Legislator Piccirillo, maybe you would want to ask what are these
12 pollinators do and how they do it.

13
14 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

15 Okay, so I think I have to have my video going.

16
17 **P.O. CALARCO:**

18 The old birds and the bees talk.

19
20 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

21 Be appropriate on live stream.

22
23 **LEG. BERLAND:**

24 He's a little young for that, you know.

25
26 *(*Laughter*)*

27
28 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

29 So, I mean, and I will ask Counsel to jump in if I get it wrong
30 about what the legislation says, but we just want the Department of
31 Public Works Highways to look into the possibility of encouraging
32 along our highways in areas, where appropriate, where there's large
33 enough space to encourage pollinator-friendly native species; so
34 pollinators being bees, pollinators being different types of birds,
35 butterflies and, you know, that are able to help to spread pollen
36 on flowers and native plants. And it's important for the whole
37 ecosystem, migratory birds and other species around that we have,
38 you know, that we encourage them. We've been losing bees and birds
39 and butterflies and moths at an unprecedented rate. And so
40 sometimes it's just a matter of the cost of seed, but I'm not sure
41 if a fiscal impact statement has been generated yet. But right now
42 this just calls for the planning for such.

43
44 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

45 Thank you so much. Appreciate it.

46
47 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

48 Thank you, Legislator Hahn.

49
50 **LEG. FLEMING:**

51 On the motion.

52
53 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

54 Legislator Berland first.

1 **LEG. BERLAND:**

2 Thank you. And also there's another aspect to this. There are,
3 you know, roadways where there are no plantings but you can plant
4 then, you know, it's not necessarily has to be planted by the
5 County, it could be sponsored by, you know, a local, you know,
6 business that wants to sponsor it and put something up and help pay
7 for that, too. But I think it's important because there are lots
8 of stretches that don't have any plants that we -- that we, you
9 know, can add to the whole pollinating, you know, issue by planting
10 them. So that's why I support this.

11
12 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

13 Thank you.

14
15 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

16 There are some areas where you don't want to encourage birds, like
17 sometimes the median is not safe, you know, but we would have
18 experts weigh in on that for sure.

19
20 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

21 Legislator Fleming.

22
23 **LEG. FLEMING:**

24 Yes, thank you. I haven't had a chance to speak with the sponsor
25 about this yet but -- well, first of all I'd like to say Rob
26 Calarco made the funny club just now with the birds and the bees
27 talk comment. Very, very, funny. Don't want to let that go
28 without noting it.

29 *(*Laughter*)*

30
31 But I actually have been working with a group here called the
32 Perfect Earth Project on something that's called Two Thirds for the
33 Birds and we're drafting resolution to require that native plants,
34 two-thirds native plants be planted in County facilities. But I'm
35 not, you know, we haven't finished the drafting of it yet. I don't
36 know if that -- if it should be done separately. I initially
37 thought it would be, but then I just hear Legislator Hahn mention
38 native plantings and, you know, birds. So maybe it makes sense to
39 do this together.

40
41 But if this were to be done just separately I think that there's a
42 -- I would ask that, you know, there be some additional aspects to
43 it including -- you know, that would make it resilient so that you
44 have some sort of maintenance program, that you would have some
45 kind of sponsorship program. I think Legislator Berland may just
46 have mentioned it, that, you know, we can engage citizen scientists
47 plan for educating because it is very important. And I just think
48 it could probably be strengthened. I do have suggestions on that.
49 Happy to support it as is, but I think there's a lot more that
50 could be done maybe by combining what we're already working on or
51 at least looking at these other aspects that might make it a little
52 bit of a stronger program.

53
54 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

55 Thank you, Legislator Fleming. Legislator Gonzalez.

1 **LEG. GONZALEZ:**

2 Yeah, I just wanted to add to Kara, I support this, especially
3 coming from, you know, we think about this thing right now it's
4 kind of like funny and everything else. But when Hurricane Maria
5 hit the Island of Puerto Rico, it devastated the entire island. It
6 devastated everything on that Island there. And a million bees
7 were transported to the Island. And today because of that, the
8 vegetation and the greenery is back. It took a while. But this
9 polinización -- this polinización is important. That's why, Kara,
10 listening to me is a little on the personal side and going there
11 and seeing everything destroyed, everything was brown, everything
12 was dying. And after this shipment of over a million bees were
13 there, it just helped the Island. And now it's just beautiful.
14 It's green; its flowers are back. And I support it a thousand
15 percent, Kara. Very, very, nice. And, yes, I just hope that other
16 agencies and scientists come aboard and add to this wonderful
17 measure. Thank you.

18
19 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

20 Thank you, Legislator Gonzalez. So I just have a question for
21 Commissioner Brown. When I saw this, I reached out to Dan Gilrein
22 who's the entomologist for Cornell. And I know this is more than
23 just honey bees. Honey bees get the press because they make the
24 honey and we make the money. But there's a lot of other
25 pollinators out there that are native. Honey bees aren't native.
26 And so there's a lot of pollinators that are different kind of
27 wasps and different kind of solitary bees. They're not colonizers.
28 And there's different lifecycles, different mediums have to be
29 managed, you know, differently for different species. So I reached
30 out to Cornell Cooperative Extension and I just wanted to offer
31 that -- that help to Commissioner Brown. I don't know if you have
32 any experience on -- on the State level on trying to support, you
33 know, changing your management strategies to support pollinators or
34 not.

35
36 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

37 Yes. And I want to apologize for not being on. We were told we
38 wouldn't be needed but to stand by, so. When you asked me to jump
39 in, I jumped in as quickly as I could.

40
41 Yeah, Legislator, I -- a lot of program -- there's actually a
42 statewide program for roadside maintenance at DOT. And one of the
43 things that we experimented with was, you know, flower planting
44 that was pollinator planting along like Sunken Meadow Parkway,
45 places where there are wide right-of-ways where you can you do it
46 where it wasn't too close to traffic and it could still be
47 maintained.

48
49 They do overgrow; in about two years become very unsightly with
50 weeds and it's a -- it's a very labor-intensive process to weed
51 them. So, you know, my recommendation would be if the County wants
52 to go forward with something like this, that they just be replaced
53 every two years or so because they're almost impossible to maintain
54 or very expensive to maintain.

55
56 And the other, you know, question we had, which was raised was, you

1 know, perhaps they're better suited at some park territory where
2 they have some space out of the way, you know. We don't have a lot
3 of highways with wide right-of-ways where it would be easy to do
4 this. But I am a supporter. I used to have an engineer that is a
5 beekeeper on the North Fork that worked for me and was a big
6 proponent of this and she led the effort with DOT; so I'm very
7 familiar with it.

8
9 The other thing is this group more than half of the employees from
10 the group that will be handling this at DPW are currently case
11 investigators with COVID. So they're stretched a little thin just
12 to keep our projects going on and keep up with our permits and
13 everything. So, you know, they were suggesting perhaps a year
14 process would be more --

15
16 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

17 We amended it to do that.

18
19 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

20 Oh, you did?

21
22 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

23 Yes.

24
25 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

26 Perfect. And that would be perfect timing for getting something
27 out, say, this part of next year to be planted, you know,
28 Legislator, if that were possible. So that's my --

29
30 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

31 Thank you, Commissioner.

32
33 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

34 And it should be -- it should include parks. So we'll, you know,
35 the intention has been to expand to that. So certainly maybe
36 that'll be -- that is a separate piece for sure.

37
38 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

39 I like the idea. We just want to keep the bees away from cars.

40
41 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

42 Yep.

43
44 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

45 And keep it maintained. And, you know, Legislator Anker could tell
46 you a lot about trying wildflowers in medians, you know, it becomes
47 very unsightly after a couple of years. And we had to remove all
48 those at Route 25A median. So it would be something you'd wanna
49 have controlled well and maybe to keep maintenance down just to
50 replant.

51
52 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

53 Thank you.

54
55 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

56 Well, Cornell -- Cornell may be able to help, you know, really get

1 the fine details of exactly what goes in prevent that maintenance
2 or make the period that it has to be turned over longer or
3 something. So, Cornell, I think, will be critical in that piece.
4 Thank you, Al.

5
6 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

7 Thank you.

8
9 **CHAIRPERSON KRUPSKI:**

10 All right, so, thank you. So, we have a motion and a second. Amy,
11 could you call the roll?

23 Yes, hi, this is John Turner, I serve as a Conservation Policy
24 Advocate for the Seatuck Environmental Association and I wanted to
25 provide supportive comments for Introductory Resolution 1991, which
26 has been introduced by Legislator Kara Hahn that would direct the
27 Department of Public Works to establish a plan to support
28 pollinators along roadsides in Suffolk County.

29
30 I also am Conservation Chair of the Four Harbors Audubon Society
31 and so these comments, supportive comments, are really on behalf of
32 both organizations. I did submit via e-mail written comments on
33 behalf of Seatuck that I hope could be distributed to the members
34 of the committee. Basically, just want to say that we -- wearing
35 both those organizations hats, we strongly support the adoption of
36 this resolution because it'll provide an opportunity to increase
37 wildlife habitat for pollinators throughout the County. Any
38 research or any real media counts we know that pollinators are
39 declining rapidly and actually it's fairly foreboding in terms of
40 future if this trend continues given their exceptional economic
41 value, again, which I do mention a little bit in the written
42 testimony, we think this legislation makes a great deal of sense.
43 It ultimately could perhaps save the County a little bit of money
44 in terms of reduced gasoline and mowing costs, places that won't
45 need to be mowed and just habitat becomes productive for wildlife.

46
47 So really for a variety of reasons we strongly endorse its adoption
48 being signed by the County Executive.

49
50 Again, John Turner, Seatuck Environmental Association and Four
