1 (**The meeting was called to order at 9:31 a.m.**)
2

3 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

4 Good morning, everyone, and welcome to the Tuesday, February 23rd
5 of 2021 Budget and Finance Committee meeting. If we can all please
6 rise for the salute to the flag, led by Legislator Flotteron.
7

8 (**Salutation**)
9

10 If we can -- thank you, Legislator Flotteron. If we could all
11 please stay -- remain standing for a moment of silent prayer and
12 thoughts for the 500,000 folks who have passed away from this
13 terrible COVID-19 pandemic, for their family and friends, and those
14 who are still battling the after effects of this virus. Please,
15 keep them in your thoughts and prayers.
16

17 (**Moment of Silence**)
18

19 Thank you. I would be remiss if I was not including our Civil
20 Servants, and Police Officers, and Deputy Sheriffs, and Emergency
21 Service personnel, who all have, you know, put their lives on the
22 line for us, especially in this pandemic.
23

24 So, at this moment, we have one public speaker card; is that right?
25 Is that right, to the Clerk's Office?
26

27 **MR. DUBOIS:**

28 We do.
29

30 **P.O. CALARCO:**

31 That's correct.
32

33 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

34 Okay. And it's Amy Menditto?
35

36 **MS. MENDITTO:**

37 Amy.
38

39 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

40 Amy, I see you're here. You have three minutes.
41

42 **MS. MENDITTO:**

43 I'm not sure if I'm at the right committee. I wanted to go to
44 the -- to the Human Services Committee, but I'll speak anyway,
45 because it does have to do with budget.
46

47 First of all, I'm the New York Connects' Director, Independent
48 Living Center Director at SILO, Suffolk Independent Living
49 Organization, which is directly across the street from the CHI
50 homeless shelter that I'm here to question you all about.
51

52 It appears one of my clients, she showed me her budget worksheet,
53 and it says here, and I just need some clarification, that it looks
54 like either the County or the State is paying CHI a monthly bill of
55 \$6,891 for harsh shelter expenses. And I just wanted to see -- get
56 some input from everybody as to how do we justify that monthly fee,

1 which turns out to be about 2 -- over \$2 million a year just for
2 that one shelter of 26. It looks like they have about 26 units.
3 You know -- you know, and not -- I'm not even going to address the
4 situation of the accessibility for people living with disabilities,
5 because it is not an accessible motel or shelter.

6
7 You know, the fair market value for a two bedroom is \$1,600. You
8 have one family living in there that's charging the County or the
9 State over \$6800 a month. I mean, it's just absurd. So I'm just
10 really seeking to understand how you guys came to this, or whoever
11 determined the budget for this. So I was wondering if you can
12 clarify some issues, clarify that for me.

13
14 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

15 So what I can say, and this is the Budget and Finance Committee, so
16 while you can say that you're not in the right place, you are in
17 the right place, right, because we handle that.

18
19 So one -- first thing, is I'm going to ask somebody from my staff
20 to follow up with you about your client in particular, and to make
21 sure that their needs are being met. If they need more
22 accessibility, we need to make sure that that is handled.

23
24 **MS. MENDITTO:**

25 Okay. This is -- excuse me. This is like a systemic issue with
26 the homeless shelters not being accessible. I have to say the
27 Department of Social Services, I'm meeting weekly with Anne Marie
28 Sexton and her DSS and CHI to meet the needs of this one individual
29 that I'm working with. But systemically, we really need to do
30 better with people that are in -- that are living with
31 disabilities.

32
33 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

34 So in follow-up with my comments, I think we should talk about that
35 and figure out what things that you -- that we need to have. Is it
36 more one-floor apartments, is it more -- is it -- what other
37 accessible needs need to be met? So that's the first part.

38
39 **MS. MENDITTO:**

40 Okay.

41
42 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

43 In terms of the CHI contract, I believe that this is, and I'm not
44 sure if I see anybody here who can follow -- who can follow up on
45 me. Maybe Legislator Anker. I believe that these contracts
46 were -- we had to -- we had to get these shelters, I believe it was
47 about five, six years ago. It was a -- I don't remember if there
48 was a lawsuit, or if there was a reason why we had to move to
49 different types of shelters. Does anybody remember that? No,
50 okay. I'm sorry. Legislator Flotteron, I see you have a question.

51
52 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

53 Yes. Ms. Menditto, one is, do you know how many -- the size that
54 family was for that amount? I -- because I think there's a certain
55 dollar amount per family to having a contract. But I totally agree
56 with you, you could -- they can be in a beautiful home with extra

1 services for that for less money. But was it a family like of four
2 or something?

3
4 **MS. MENDITTO:**

5 No, it was a family of three. It was, you know, the mom, the
6 daughter that is 16, and a baby.

7
8 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

9 Okay.

10
11 **MS. MENDITTO:**

12 (Audio malfunction) So a whole bunch of health issues, and that is
13 like a whole 'nother topic.

14
15 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

16 So maybe that's the difference. The only reason I was asking
17 because it's my understanding of the homeless shelters, they get
18 like something like \$50 per head. So if it's a family of four,
19 it's \$200 a day, roughly, to my understanding, which is 6,000 a
20 month. That's why I was questioning that.

21
22 Maybe I'll suggest to our Chairman, maybe in a future meeting,
23 after we look into this a little bit, maybe we should have the
24 Commissioner of Social Services maybe come and explain, you know,
25 maybe the restraints they have, or is there ways we could do things
26 better with -- if this is true, the number, if there's a way we
27 could do things maybe a little bit better with the money that we
28 are spending.

29
30 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

31 Yeah, I think we could definitely have a conversation with the
32 Commissioner. And I think, you know, without -- we don't really
33 want to disclose this individual's situation on the record, so
34 maybe we should have that conversation offline, because you're
35 right, there could be some other contributing factors that could be
36 related to this as well, you know, other housing options, you know,
37 where the person is staying, etcetera. So, I know if -- to the
38 Presiding Officer, if someone could, or the Clerk, could somebody
39 relay this information at least to myself and Legislator Flotteron
40 so we can follow up?

41
42 **MS. MENDITTO:**

43 Okay.

44
45 **MR. DUBOIS:**

46 Will do.

47
48 **MS. MENDITTO:**

49 I mean, I just want to also stress that as far as the budget, a
50 skilled nursing facility is like \$150 a day. That's a skilled --
51 have medical, you know, professional medical staff on hand. And
52 for it to be similar in price point as far as a homeless shelter, I
53 don't see how you can justify. I don't see how you can justify it,
54 quite honestly. We could take that money and put it into low
55 income affordable housing and it would only cost the County
56 \$500,000 for just this one whole complex. So I just wanted to add

1 that.

2
3 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

4 Also, to remind you, the meeting you want to be in was the next one
5 at 10:30, probably.

6
7 **MS. MENDITTO:**

8 And which is that, the Human Services?

9
10 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

11 Seniors, Seniors and Human Service Committee is at 10:30.

12
13 **MR. DUBOIS:**

14 Okay.

15
16 **LEG. ANKER:**

17 Yeah. Yeah, I've reached out to the Commissioner's Office, and,
18 hopefully, we'll have someone there. So, Amy, if you can come to
19 the -- to the meeting, the next meeting, and that starts at 10:30.

20
21 **MS. MENDITTO:**

22 Can I register now and get the Zoom, or is it the same Zoom
23 meeting?

24
25 **P.O. CALARCO:**

26 You could register now and we'll resend you the link.

27
28 **MS. MENDITTO:**

29 Okay. Thank you.

30
31 **LEG. ANKER:**

32 And again, just be aware, I think like one of the Legislators had
33 mentioned, if there, you know, are health issues, we can't talk
34 about that publicly, you know, and just so you know, because
35 there's confidentiality as far as, you know, individuals' health
36 and HIPAA and all that stuff. So -- but we'll get to the bottom of
37 it. But thank you, Amy, for bringing it to our attention.

38
39 **MS. MENDITTO:**

40 Okay, thank you.

41
42 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

43 Thank you very much. Now I'm going to put you back in the waiting
44 room. All right. Thank you all.

45
46 So now we're going to go to our regular agenda. We have no
47 appointments, we have no presentations. We do have Tabled
48 Resolutions.

49
50 **TABLED RESOLUTIONS**

51
52 We're going to start with *I.R. 1762 of 2020 - Amending the 2020*
53 *Operating Budget and placing certain funding into a dedicated*
54 *reserve fund for Cultural Programming Organizations. (Kennedy)* I
55 believe that we have to table this one.

1 **MS. NOWAK:**
2 (Nodded yes)

3
4 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
5 And we have to move forward with the -- the newer version of this
6 resolution; is that correct to Counsel's Office? I see two
7 Counsels. I guess we're twice as special today.

8
9 **MS. SIMPSON:**
10 Yes, that's correct.

11
12 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
13 So we are twice as special and we do have to table this.

14
15 **MS. SIMPSON:**
16 Both of those things, yes.

17
18 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
19 So I'll make a motion to table. Is there a second?

20
21 **LEG. ANKER:**
22 Second.

23
24 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
25 There's a second. It's been tabled and seconded. Is there any
26 discussion? All right. Seeing none, to the Clerk's Office, you
27 can call the roll.

28

30
31 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
32 Yes to table.

33
34 **LEG. ANKER:**
35 Yes.

36
37 **LEG. CILMI:**
38 Yes.

39
40 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
41 Yes.

42
43 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**
44 Yes.

45
46 **LEG. BERLAND:**
47 (Not Present)

48
49 **P.O. CALARCO:**
50 Yes.

51
52 **MR. DUBOIS:**
53 Six. *(Vote Reconsidered on Page 8 & 9)*

54
55 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
56 Thank you. The reso -- I.R. 1762 is tabled. *(Vote: Tabled)*

1 7-0-0-0).

2
3 Yes. I didn't hear who the questions was from. Okay, maybe I
4 heard that wrong.

5
6 All right. *I.R. 2014 - A Local Law, adopting a Local Law to waive*
7 *contract agency requirement in 2021. (Co. Exec.)* The public
8 hearing is closed, so I will make a motion to approve.

9
10 **LEG. CILMI:**
11 Second.

12
13 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
14 There's a second. There's a motion to approve by myself, and
15 second by Legislator Cilmi.

16
17 **LEG. BERLAND:**
18 Oh, gosh, am I back?

19
20 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
21 Yes. Are you okay?

22
23 **LEG. BERLAND:**
24 Yes. So the internet in the house went out, and then I couldn't
25 get the phone thing to work, so sorry.

26
27 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
28 No problem. We could see you. We only -- we've only went through
29 one resolution, and we're on I.R. 2014.

30
31 **LEG. BERLAND:**
32 Can I ask what -- 1762?

33
34 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
35 That was tabled, because there's --

36
37 **LEG. BERLAND:**
38 It was tabled, okay.

39
40 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
41 There's another version of that bill.

42
43 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
44 Do you want to consider it so your vote is counted, Sue?

45
46 **LEG. BERLAND:**
47 Yeah, if you could.

48
49 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
50 All right.

51
52 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
53 Do I make a motion to reconsider?

54
55 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
56 You can do that, yes.

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D.P.O. HAHN:
Motion to reconsider.

CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:
There's a motion to reconsider by Legislator Hahn. Is there a second?

LEG. ANKER:
Second.

LEG. FLOTTERON:
Second.

CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:
Second by Legislator Anker. So there's a reconsidering motion. Mr. Clerk, if you'll please call the roll.

26 *Seven. (Vote: Tabled 7-0-0-0)*

28 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

29 Thank you. I.R. 1762 is tabled.

30
31 **LEG. BERLAND:**

32 Thank you, Mr. Chair. Thank you.

33
34 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

35 No problem. I.R. 20 -- *Introductory Resolution 2014 - Adopting a*
36 *Local Law to waive the contract agency requirement in 2021.*
37 *(Co. Exec.)* I made the motion to approve. I believe, Legislator
38 Cilmi, you were the second.

39
40 **LEG. CILMI:**

41 Yep.

14 **MR. DUBOIS:**

15 *Seven. (Vote: Approved 7-0-0-0)*

16
17 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

18 Okay. I.R. 2014 is approved.

19
20 **INTRODUCTORY RESOLUTIONS**

21
22 Introductory Resolutions: *I.R. 1007 - Amending the 2020 Capital*
23 *Budget -- Program and Budget for 2021 and the Operating Budget and*
24 *transferring Assessment Stabilization Reserve Funds to the Capital*
25 *Fund, and appropriating funds for the improvements of the Suffolk*
26 *County Coastal Resiliency Project - Connetquot River in Oakdale*
27 *(CP 8504). (Piccirillo)*

28
29 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

30 I need a motion to table, Mr. Chairman, if one of my colleagues
31 could help me here.

32
33 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

34 I'll make a motion to table.

35
36 **LEG. CILMI:**

37 Second.

38
39 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

40 Thank you, Tom.

41
42 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

43 Second by Legislator Cilmi. Legislator Piccirillo, do you want to
44 say something on the record or --

45
46 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

47 Yeah, if I could be heard on the bill, Mr. Chair.

48
49 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

50 Anything for you, Mr. Piccirillo.

51
52 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

53 Always a pleasure, Mr. Chairman, thank you. Yeah, I just want to
54 thank my colleagues for giving me the opportunity to speak. I'm
55 not on this committee. I appreciate the deference from the Chair.

1 I would like to say how important this program is. And, you know,
2 you don't have to take my word for it. Legislator Flotteron
3 represented the area as a member of the Islip Town Board for many
4 years. They have one of the highest water tables in Suffolk
5 County. They are flushing and doing dishes, and that water is
6 literally seeping up from the ground back onto their property, and
7 the excess is going to the Connetquot River, which is destroying
8 quality of life, not only for Oakdale residents, but everybody down
9 the stream from Oakdale east.

10
11 So I would really like this project to be considered. I know the
12 County Executive is very high on these coastal resiliency programs.
13 Right now it's a matter of funds. I think the statute is clear in
14 the ASRF, that these funds can be used for construction purposes.
15 That doesn't seem to be the issue here. The issue here seems to be
16 the bidding of the work from the company that's bidding. It seems
17 the prices are way more than we anticipated. And, unfortunately,
18 it feels like there's not enough companies that do this work, so
19 price always seems to go up.

20
21 So I would like to continue to work with my colleagues here in the
22 Legislature and the County Executive's Office, but I really would
23 like to move this project along as fast as possible. Thank you for
24 the time today, Mr. Chairman.

25
26 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

27 No problem. And so I do have a question. So we -- do we have --
28 is this one of those resolutions -- I am not sure. I guess this is
29 to Counsel. This is one of the areas, or this is one of the
30 projects that if we -- was this the one that failed in the -- in
31 the referendum? No or --

32
33 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

34 No. So Great River --

35
36 **MS. SIMPSON:**

37 I think this is the one that passed. This is Oakdale. Great River
38 is the section that did not approve their referendum.

39
40 **LEG. CILMI:**

41 That's correct.

42
43 **LEG. BERLAND:**

44 I thought --

45
46 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

47 And this is the --

48
49 **LEG. BERLAND:**

50 I thought this didn't have a referendum yet.

51
52 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

53 Correct.

54
55 **LEG. CILMI:**

56 But the -- but the -- let me just -- let me just say, the -- Great

1 River is the western -- you know, borders the Connetquot River on
2 the western side. And as Legislator Piccirillo said, the impacts
3 of the water quality for Connetquot River and the impacts of the
4 high water table on the east side of the river, which then impact
5 the water quality on the Connetquot -- in the Connetquot River,
6 also impact the Connetquot River, or also impact, rather,
7 Great River, and points north of Great River and Oakdale as well,
8 all the way up into Connetquot State Park, Islip Terrace, Bohemia
9 to a certain extent. So the water quality of that river is
10 extraordinarily important and very compromised at the moment. So
11 whatever we could do to move this sewer project forward in Oakdale
12 would be -- would be a great help to the environment, and, equally
13 as important, to the quality of life of the residents in particular
14 in Oakdale.

15
16 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**
17 (Raised Hand)

18
19 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

20 So my -- so, Counsel, do we have to do a referendum for this
21 project, for any of these projects? Because I remember Legislator
22 Cilmi, Legislator Donnelly, and I think Presiding Officer Gregory
23 at the time, or I think he was Legislator Gregory at the time,
24 we -- you know, for the areas that were in our districts, they had
25 to do a referendum in order to use the funds.

26
27 **MS. SIMPSON:**
28 Yes.

29
30 **LEG. CILMI:**

31 There will likely be a referendum. Legally, I don't think -- we
32 had these discussions back when we were talking about the Great
33 River project. Legally, I don't think there needed to be a
34 referendum, but there was a desire to have a referendum, because
35 you want the property owners who are going to be paying into the
36 sewer district to -- you know, to authorize -- you know, to
37 authorize it, so.

38
39 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

40 If those conversations are anything like the ones that I have with
41 my mother over this, over sewers, I can only imagine. So maybe,
42 you know, Legislator Piccirillo, I'd like to work with you on this,
43 because if we need to have a referendum, you know, I think we
44 should figure out ways to get that done, you know, posthaste,
45 because I know Legislator Cilmi was upset and he was disappointed
46 that he couldn't -- that his referendum -- I don't want to say
47 upset. He was disappointed that the Great River project didn't go
48 through.

49
50 **LEG. CILMI:**
51 Yeah.

52
53 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

54 And I know -- I know for the folks in my district and Legislator
55 Donnelly's district, and I think it's a little bit of Legislator
56 Berland's district --

1
2 **LEG. BERLAND:**

3 (Nodded yes)

4
5 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

6 -- I know our residents would love this. And I think one of the
7 other things that we could all do is, you know, as we asked in
8 October, with a bipartisan approach, for \$100 million of
9 infrastructure funds to come in this COVID package, because then we
10 could -- then, you know, the issue of sewers in most of our
11 districts wouldn't be a problem, because it would be, you know,
12 more funds. You know, I've had a lot of conversations with Peter
13 Scully over this, over this money issue. So thank you. So there's
14 a motion to table, and a second.

15
16 **LEG. CILMI:**

17 Jason, I see hands up.

18
19 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

20 Oh, I'm sorry.

21
22 **LEG. CILMI:**

23 I'm sorry.

24
25 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

26 No, it's okay. Legislator Flotteron, I apologize.

27
28 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

29 Yeah, no problem. Just, again, bring up what Legislator Piccirillo
30 was talking about. I would say in the whole Township of Islip, you
31 know, there's different areas we need sewerage. But the most
32 important for, I mean, not just environmental, just public health,
33 would be in Oakdale. It has -- you know, it's low-lying area with
34 a very high water table, and it really comes to when I used to,
35 you know, be in the community, hear residents saying they have to
36 determine each day if they're going to flush the toilet or do
37 laundry. It's percolating up on their properties all the time
38 because it's such a high water table. And what I just said,
39 there's not an exaggeration. So it is really needed for the public
40 health, this to hopefully be accomplished for this area, more
41 important than any other area. Other areas we're usually debating
42 about, you know, redevelopment of the downtowns and get some
43 density. Yes, we do need that for the economic, but here it's for
44 public health. I would say it's probably the most important in the
45 Township, so thank you.

46
47 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

48 Well, I mean, to your point, Legislator Flotteron, 70% of our
49 residents do not have sewers, right?

50
51 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

52 Yeah.

53
54 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

55 So I think -- and those conversations don't only happen in Oakdale.
56 I know they happen in parts of Lindenhurst, and they happen in

1 parts of Deer Park, and they happen in parts of Wyandanch and West
2 Babylon. So that's a conversation that goes on all over. So I see
3 Deputy Presiding Officer has a question or a comment, and so does
4 the Presiding Officer. So I'll take the Presiding Officer, and
5 then the Deputy Presiding Officer.

6
7 **P.O. CALARCO:**

8 Thank you, Chairman. And just, first of all, I need to say I fully
9 support this particular project. I used to work for the Legislator
10 who represented the Oakdale area. The Idle Hour community is in
11 dire need of sewerage, probably as much so as any other community,
12 maybe with the exception of the Mastic/Shirleys, probably worse,
13 because they're really in it in Oakdale. And there -- those homes
14 are very close together in that Idle Hour community. So this needs
15 to get done, and I fully support figuring that out.

16
17 I do have -- and I've asked Counsel for this, and since we're
18 tabling this, I think she could do the legal research between now
19 and the next time we have to take it up. I am not certain the 404
20 Fund is the appropriate funding mechanism. I still had questioned
21 the ability to use ASRF money to do sewer expansions. The excess
22 funds that were coming out of ASRF to be made available for sewer
23 expansions goes into the 406 Account, is my understanding. There
24 is \$20 million in the 406 Account. That account is utilized to do
25 the \$2 million a year worth of septic upgrades, but there was also
26 excess money in there. That's the money that was utilized to do
27 the Patchogue River Avenue expansion project. That was the
28 location -- the funds that were used to do the Northport expansion
29 work and the money that was used to do the Riverhead work, and I
30 think that would be the appropriate funding mechanism for any sewer
31 expansion utilizing this particular funding source. But Counsel
32 can look into that, and we can work through that later.

33
34 I thought there was also a committee process, like a screening
35 process, that the code requires all expansion projects to go
36 through. I don't think that committee has met in a long time, but
37 that is something that I think we need to look through and figure
38 this out, because, Legislator Piccirillo, we've got to get this
39 project done, there's no doubt about that.

40
41 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

42 Well, I'm assuming that the reason why the committee hasn't met is
43 because, in the words of Presiding Officer Lindsay, we don't have
44 any money, right? So I'm assuming that's why we haven't --

45
46 **P.O. CALARCO:**

47 There's 20 million in that account. And I know there has been a
48 significant amount sitting there for sewer expansions for some
49 years, and there hasn't been a project that really met the
50 qualifications yet. But I think that should this particular pot
51 need money, especially if there's not funding, I think we'll see
52 some infrastructure coming -- money out of the Federal Government.
53 But if we can't make -- take advantage of that infrastructure
54 money, then, you know, I think it's worth looking at this as an
55 offset to help fund the gap, because there's going to be a gap
56 probably from what the State's given us and what's needed, right,

1 Legislator Piccirillo? I think there's 26 million slated for this
2 project --

3
4 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**
5 Yeah.

6
7 **P.O. CALARCO:**
8 -- from the State. This is probably a \$50 million project.

9
10 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**
11 Yeah. That 5 million, unfortunately, may not even scratch the
12 surface, from the numbers that I had received. I don't really want
13 to make those numbers public in case there's another bid out there.
14 But I thought it was going to cover at least all of it or 95% of
15 it, but the numbers that came back were sky high. So I don't know
16 if we're scratching the surface, really, but it definitely still is
17 a step in the right direction to get this project, at least a
18 referendum.

19
20 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
21 So maybe we should, yeah, at least reach out to the folks and
22 get -- at least get this committee started, you know. So, Nicole,
23 I see you there. Maybe we can have a conversation about sewers
24 later on today and figure out ways to get this committee started.

25
26 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**
27 Mr. Chairman, I do just have a quick question for the Presiding
28 Officer. Presiding Officer Calarco, does the State money, that
29 26 million, are we in jeopardy of losing it if we can't get the
30 wheels moving on this project?

31
32 **P.O. CALARCO:**
33 I think that's like the -- that's in the bundle of the whole
34 400 million or so that is tied to the four -- to the three river
35 watershed areas, the Patchogue, the Connetquot, and the
36 Carlls and -- or, excuse me, the four, because it's Forge River in
37 there as well. I think there's a deadline for some of those
38 dollars. The Federal Government did extend that deadline this year
39 as part of when they were doing some of the COVID relief work.
40 They did give us an extra year to get the money spent, but we are
41 up against it. That's for all four projects in terms of getting
42 the money spent before we lose it.

43
44 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**
45 Thank you so much.

46
47 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
48 Deputy Presiding Officer Hahn.

49
50 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
51 Yes, and I, too, want to preface my comments with I'm supportive
52 of, you know, sewerage in this area. I just want to understand. And
53 I think some of our colleagues may have served in the Town of
54 Islip. There's not any possibility, because, you know, from what
55 I'm hearing, from what I understand, there was incredibly poor
56 planning that happened in the area. It should never have been

1 built on, and, you know, that's neither here nor there, we have to
2 take care of it. But I just -- does anybody know? There's not a
3 possibility that more -- the Town would approve more building in
4 this area moving forward, correct?

5
6 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**
7 I hope not.

8
9 (**Laughter**)

10
11 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
12 Well, I mean, if --

13
14 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**
15 The area is pretty much built. The area is pretty much --

16
17 **LEG. CILMI:**
18 It's built out.

19
20 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**
21 It's built out.

22
23 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
24 Okay.

25
26 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**
27 The only other thing that may become an opportunity is Dowling
28 property, which, you know, needs to be redeveloped in some way to
29 be used before we lose that historic building. But they had their
30 own sewage treatment plant --

31
32 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
33 Yeah, okay.

34
35 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**
36 -- sometimes failing, but they have one of their own.

37
38 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
39 Yeah. No. I just -- what I, you know, would hate to see is that,
40 you know, we make up for the poor plan -- and, listen, my town's
41 just as guilty, Mastic was mentioned, and it's -- and it's
42 historical, goes back decades. But what we can't have is, you
43 know, the County footing the bill for poor planning, but then we
44 keep making the same mistake moving forward.

45
46 So I hope there are some discussions with, you know, the Town of
47 Islip that involve understanding the mistakes that were made and,
48 you know, I don't know if -- again, I don't know how much open
49 available parcels there are in the area, but just make sure that
50 that they can't be built on.

51
52 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
53 I've been down in that area. I mean, they're right, there's a
54 whole bunch of stuff that's built. The only area, the only area of
55 opportunity is Dowling, and I know that's in multiple lawsuits.

1 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

2 Yeah, yeah. And if it has its own sewage treatment plant, it's
3 like a different animal, but yeah.

4
5 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

6 So --

7
8 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

9 Not for today, not needed. We don't need to go and dive into this
10 idea, but I just think we should talk about that.

11
12 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

13 But there's also --

14
15 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

16 We can't keep making the same mistakes.

17
18 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

19 There's also now different rules in the world, such as even from
20 our own County Health Department to sign off on things. What -- if
21 they have to build their own facility, if there was any expansion
22 in the area. It's just that it's more -- like you said,
23 historically, back in the '50s, when they were building Long --
24 Suffolk County, they just didn't really have these rules, everybody
25 had a cesspool, so -- but, again, there's protections nowadays, as
26 you know. If they turn Dowling College, say, into an assisted
27 living facility, they would have their own treatment plant to be
28 able to take care of everything. That's just more of these older
29 homes that are all cesspools in their front and backyards is the
30 problem.

31
32 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

33 Right. But if there's a -- if somebody owns an oversized lot that
34 could have two lots, and, you know, moving forward, you shouldn't
35 be able to split that lot and now put in another home to just add
36 to the problem. You know, like I think -- I hope that, you know,
37 we won't be investing to allow people to keep making the same
38 mistake, especially --

39
40 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

41 Agreed.

42
43 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

44 -- in such a sensitive, close to the -- you know, from a storm
45 resiliency perspective. But that's not for us to decide, but maybe
46 we can begin talks with the different towns on the South Shore as
47 these sewer projects move forward to recognize past mistakes, and
48 have a hand in making sure Towns don't continue to make them.

49
50 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

51 Amen.

52
53 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

54 We have leverage with these sewer dollars.

55
56 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

1 All the more reason to make sure that that, you know, 406 funding
2 is right, and all the more reason to get, you know, at least
3 projects in the pipeline, and all the more reason for all of us to
4 work together to get to some infrastructure dollars, so we can have
5 these discussions, right? So we have a motion to table and a
6 second. Mr. Clerk, could you please call the roll?

7
8 (**Roll Call by Dan Dubois, Chief Deputy Clerk**)
9

10 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

11 Yes to table.

12
13 **LEG. CILMI:**

14 Yes.

15
16 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

17 Yes.

18
19 **LEG. ANKER:**

20 Yes.

21
22 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

23 Yes.

24
25 **LEG. BERLAND:**

26 Yes.

27
28 **P.O. CALARCO:**

29 Yes.

30
31 **MR. DUBOIS:**

32 *Seven. (Vote: Tabled 7-0-0-0)*
33

34 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

35 Thank you, Mr. Chair.
36

37 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

38 No problem. Thank you, sir. So we have *I.R. 1008 -*
39 *Approving County funding for a contract agency (Mastic Beach*
40 *Property Owners Association). (Sunderman)* I'll make a motion to
41 approve.
42

43 **LEG. CILMI:**

44 Second.
45

46 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

47 Second by Legislator Cilmi. Is there any questions? Seeing none,
48 Mr. Clerk, please call the roll.
49

50 (**Roll Call by Dan Dubois, Chief Deputy Clerk**)
51

52 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

53 Yes.
54

55 **LEG. CILMI:**

56 Yes.

1
2 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
3 Yes.
4
5 **LEG. ANKER:**
6 Yes.
7
8 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**
9 Yes.
10
11 **LEG. BERLAND:**
12 Yes.
13
14 **P.O. CALARCO:**
15 Yes.
16
17 **MR. DUBOIS:**
18 *Seven. (Vote: Approved 7-0-0-0)*
19
20 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
21 Thank you. *I.R. 1009 - Approving County funding for a contract*
22 *agency (William Floyd Community Summit). (Sunderman) I'll make a*
23 *motion to approve.*
24
25 **LEG. CILMI:**
26 Second.
27
28 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
29 Second by Legislator Cilmi. Is there any questions? Seeing none,
30 Mr. Clerk, please call the roll.
31
32 *(*Roll Call by Dan Dubois, Chief Deputy Clerk*)*
33
34 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**
35 Yes.
36
37 **LEG. CILMI:**
38 Yes.
39
40 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
41 Yes.
42
43 **LEG. ANKER:**
44 Yes.
45
46 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**
47 Yes.
48
49 **LEG. BERLAND:**
50 Yes.
51
52 **P.O. CALARCO:**
53 Yes.
54
55 **MR. DUBOIS:**
56 *Seven. (Vote: Approved 7-0-0-0)*

1
2 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

3 Thank you. All right. I.R. 10 -- *Introductory Resolution 1013 -*
4 *Amending the 2021 Capital Program and Budget and 2021 Operating*
5 *Budget and transferring Assessment Stabilization Reserve Funds to*
6 *the Capital Fund, and appropriating funds for improvements to Kings*
7 *Park - Downtown Sewers, Capital Project 8145. (Trotta)* I will make
8 a motion to table.

9
10 **LEG. BERLAND:**

11 Second.

12
13 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

14 And there's a second by Legislator Berland. I see Legislator
15 Trotta is here.

16
17 **LEG. TROTТА:**

18 I would just -- I didn't even know it was up. What is it? I don't
19 even have it in front of me.

20
21 **P.O. CALARCO:**

22 It's your bill.

23
24 **LEG. TROTТА:**

25 Oh, the -- oh, the \$10 million. Oh, oh. I'm not even kidding you,
26 I --

27
28 **LEG. BERLAND:**

29 How soon they forget.

30
31 (*Laughter*)

32
33 **LEG. TROTТА:**

34 No, we're already ready. We're SEQRA-approved. And this money
35 could have been used so that it would expand the Kings Park Sewer
36 District, because let me just go over it. The County spent,
37 correct me if I'm wrong, Lance, I think you were here in 2009,
38 \$9 million to expand the sewage treatment plant. I think we spent
39 \$2 million for a downtown plan. We have a sewer pipe running
40 across Main Street. And the County Executive's number one concern
41 is clean water. And guess what, what do we have? Nothing. Since
42 the guy's been in office, we haven't hooked up a toilet bowl to a
43 sewer system. I remember when I first got elected, and even before
44 that, I saw the State of the County, we're going to do Mastic and
45 Shirley, \$385 million. Like for four years afterward he said it
46 over and over again. You know what we got? Nothing. This is what
47 we got, number 62. It's a disgrace. Table it, I don't care.

48
49 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

50 Well, to be fair, Legislator Trotta, I don't know if you heard the
51 discussion on the last piece, but Legislator Piccirillo actually
52 brought up that the bids that came in way higher than was expected,
53 number one, and number two, there is State funding, and I think
54 there's about 20 some-odd million dollars for this project as well.

55
56 **LEG. TROTТА:**

1 Isn't it -- isn't it embarrassing that we had all that money? We
2 had \$250 million that we could have done sewers in Setauket, and
3 Oakdale, and Bohemia, and Smithtown, and Saint James, and Kings
4 Park, but, instead, we pissed it away. We mismanaged the County to
5 no end, not me and Piccirillo, everybody else, just voting for
6 everything.

7
8 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

9 Well --

10
11 **LEG. TROTТА:**

12 Oh, it's great. Look, the day of reckoning is going to come. The
13 best thing that ever happened to this County Executive was the
14 Coronavirus, it bailed us out. It's sad but true. Fiscally, it's
15 the best thing that ever happened to this County.

16
17 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

18 Thank you, Legislator Trotta.

19
20 **LEG. TROTТА:**

21 Embarrassing.

22
23 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

24 I do think we should look at the 406 funding, as we said in our
25 last resolution, as a possible funding source --

26
27 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

28 (Raised Hand)

29
30 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

31 -- for any future projects. I see Legislator Piccirillo.

32
33 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

34 Thank you, Mr. Chair. Actually, through the Chair through Counsel.
35 Sarah, in the statute, is it delineated that the funds are
36 separate, or is it just one fund? I think that's the crux of this
37 conversation.

38
39 **MS. SIMPSON:**

40 So the way 12-2(D)(2)(C) -- (D)(2) is written, it says that, you
41 know, for 2014 through 2021, excess Assessment Stabilization
42 Reserve Fund monies may be used for these purposes. The question
43 on the separation of the two funds would be better answered by
44 Budget Review.

45
46 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

47 Okay. Mr. Chair?

48
49 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

50 Yes.

51
52 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

53 Is that all right?

54
55 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

56 Yeah, sure, to Budget Review, Lance.

1
2 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

3 Okay. I had trouble getting off mute. So, right, we're talking
4 about Funds 404 and 406. So 404 is used for rate stabilization,
5 for the most part. It can be used for capital improvements and
6 sewer expansions, like Legislator Trotta and Piccirillo have
7 discussed. And then there's 406, which is used --

8
9 **MS. GAZES:**

10 The enhanced septic.

11
12 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

13 Enhanced septic and rate stabilization, also.

14
15 **MS. GAZES:**

16 No, no.

17
18 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

19 Not rate stabilization.

20
21 **MS. GAZES:**

22 And Southwest has its own.

23
24 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

25 And, of course, Southwest has its own Assessment Stabilization
26 Reserve Fund separate, apart from the other two.

27
28 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

29 So that's a yes, and a no, and a yes.

30
31 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

32 Yes, no and a yes.

33
34 *(*Laughter*)*

35
36 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

37 Yeah, they're different funds and they have different parameters.

38
39 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

40 Okay.

41
42 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

43 But what I'm saying is, are they specifically separated, or is this
44 just one fund --

45
46 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

47 No, no.

48
49 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

50 -- that other funds flow into?

51
52 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

53 Well, they're one fund.

54
55 **MS. GAZES:**

56 No. 404 and 406 are different funds.

1
2 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

3 That's what I meant, they're one -- they're each separate funds,
4 that's what I mean. And Fund --

5
6 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

7 Right. But what I'm saying is, does the statute specifically say
8 that what I'm trying to do with these funds isn't allowed on 404?
9 Is it just 406? What fund are we pulling from?

10
11 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

12 Your fund is pull -- you are pulling from Fund 404, which is used
13 for rate stabilization, and can be used for capital improvements
14 and expansion, like you're saying.

15
16 **MS. GAZES:**

17 Yes.

18
19 **DIRECTOR REINHEIMER:**

20 Yes.

21
22 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

23 Thank you.

24
25 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

26 So I think this is -- you know, while we made a motion to table, I
27 think what's most important is that we have funding for this
28 project already. So let's see where those funds -- where that fund
29 goes. And if we need to move forward some other funding, we should
30 figure out how we can do that.

31
32 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

33 I agree. Thank you.

34
35 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

36 So there's a motion to table and a second. Mr. Clerk, if you'll
37 please call the roll.

38
39 *(*Roll Call by Dan Dubois, Chief Deputy Clerk*)*

40
41 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

42 Yes.

43
44 **MR. DUBOIS:**

45 Cilmi -- I'm sorry, Legislator Berland.

46
47 **LEG. BERLAND:**

48 Yes.

49
50 **LEG. CILMI:**

51 Yes.

52
53 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

54 Yes.

55
56 **LEG. ANKER:**

1 Yes.

2

3 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

4 Yes.

5

6 **P.O. CALARCO:**

7 Yes.

8

9 **MR. DUBOIS:**

10 *Seven. (Vote: Tabled 7-0-0-0)*

11

12 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

13 Thank you. All right. I.R., *Introductory Resolution 1015 -*
14 *Approving County funding for a Contract Agency (Greater Port*
15 *Jefferson Arts Council). (Hahn)* I'll accept a motion from
16 Legislator Hahn to approve.

17

18 **LEG. BERLAND:**

19 Second.

20

21 **LEG. CILMI:**

22 I'll second.

23

24 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

25 And a second from Legislator Berland. Mr. Clerk, can you -- is
26 there any discussion? Seeing none, Mr. Clerk, would you please
27 call the roll?

28

29 *(*Roll Call by Dan Dubois, Chief Deputy Clerk*)*

30

31 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

32 Yes.

33

34 **LEG. BERLAND:**

35 Yes.

36

37 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

38 Yes.

39

40 **LEG. CILMI:**

41 Yes.

42

43 **LEG. ANKER:**

44 Yes.

45

46 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

49 **P.O. CALARCO:**

50 Yes.

51

52 **MR. DUBOIS:**

53 *Seven. (Vote: Approved 7-0-0-0)*

54

55 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

56 Thank you.

1
2 **LEG. ANKER:**

3 Chairperson Richberg, can I just make a comment. It's going back
4 to the 1013. We don't need to reopen that, but I just want to
5 state on the record, I think it's appalling that Legislator Trotta
6 actually said this is a good thing that COVID happened to Suffolk
7 County. We've lost 3,035 people, residents in Suffolk County.
8 What a terrible thing to say. I just want to put that on the
9 record.

10
11 **LEG. TROTТА:**

12 Excuse me. What I said, Legislator Anker, was --

13
14 **LEG. ANKER:**

15 I had to wait until you got off the phone.

16
17 **LEG. TROTТА:**

18 -- fiscally. Fis -- what I said was, fiscally, it was the best
19 thing to ever happen to Suffolk County.

20
21 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

22 Okay.

23
24 **LEG. ANKER:**

25 It's a terrible thing to say.

26
27 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

28 All right.

29
30 **LEG. ANKER:**

31 Thank you.

32
33 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

34 Thank you. Thank you to everyone. While COVID-19 personally is
35 not -- is a very hard subject, I think we all need to keep our eye
36 on the prize, right? And the idea is that we all need to move
37 forward and get things done for our districts. And I don't agree
38 with language that's used by everyone, but in this case, I think
39 what's important is that we understand, we understand that no
40 matter what happens, we have to work together. It doesn't matter
41 what side of the aisle you're on, it doesn't matter any of that
42 other stuff, we have to work together. And we can all throw stones
43 at each other all day. It doesn't mean anything unless we get work
44 done, and moving forward.

45

56 Motion.

2 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

6 Motion.

7
8 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

9 A motion by Legislator Berland to approve and place on the Consent
10 Calendar. Is there a second?

11
12 **LEG. ANKER:**

13 I'll second.

16 I'll make -- there's a second by Legislator Anker. Any discussion?
17 Seeing none, Mr. Clerk, please call the roll.

21 **LEG. BERLAND:**

22 Yes.

33 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

34 Yes.

35
36 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**

38
39 **P.O. CALARCO:**

40 Yes.

41
42 **MR. DUBOIS:**

43 *Seven. (Vote: Approved - Consent Calendar 7-0-0-0)*

44
45 **CHAIRMAN RICHBERG:**

46 Thank you. *Introductory Resolution 1032 - Resolution delegating to*
47 *the County Comptroller to authorize -- the power to authorize the*
