3 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

4 Hello. Welcome to the the May 4th meeting of the Fire, Rescue, and
5 Emergency Medical Services and Preparedness Committee. If I could

22 **Suffolk County Hazardous Material Detection Equipment (CP 3423).**
23 **(Co. Exec.).** Is there a motion?

28 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

29 Motion by Legislator Hahn. Second by Legislator Donnelly. We do
30 have Deputy Commissioner Beckley in the room with us today.
31 Commissioner, would you please just give us a brief overview of
32 what this is?

33

34 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**

35 Thank you, sir. So real briefly, this is going to be valuable for
36 the agency to move forward with it's long-range plan of replacing
37 some detection equipment that is more than 20 years old. It's
38 going to bring us up to a better state of readiness when it comes
39 to our mission with detecting various hazardous materials
40 throughout the county, and it's going to help us put us in line
41 with the state typecasting for our team, and also it addresses the
42 county emergency preparedness assessment by the state as well as
43 the thiourea by the federal government in helping meet those
44 capabilities.

45

46 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

47 Terrific. Thank you for that. Any questions? Seeing none,
48 Mr. Clerk, please call the roll.

20 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
21 Motion passes. IR 1299, Appropriating funds in connection with
22 enhancements to the (Fire/Ems) Public Safety Communications System.
23 (3416). (Co. Exec.) Is there a motion? Motion by Legislator
24 Donnelly.
25
26 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
27 Second.
28
29 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
30 Second by Legislator Hahn. Commissioner.
31
32 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**
33 So this resolution cat upgrade is going to help us to upgrade our
34 software and hardware because the software is no longer going to be
35 supported by Microsoft, so we have to move to a Windows 10
36 environment. That's also going to help us be less vulnerable from
37 cyber attacks to continue using Windows 7. Moving to the new
38 software will not require additional capital funding, so that's
39 also a positive. We are working with I.T. steering committee,
40 Commissioner Mastellon to help make sure we do this the right way
41 moving forward and make sure we're going to be also able to
42 consolidate our data centers in the future. This upgrade will also
43 have an impact -- a positive impact on our EOC because we'll be
44 able to upgrade our hardware there as well as our incident
45 management software. E-Team that we use currently is unsupported.
46 There's going to be no further updates, so we're looking at a web
47 EOC environment which will put us in line with FEMA. That's the
48 current software FEMA uses, and Nassau County is also looking to
49 move to the web EOC environment, so we'll be able to collaborate
50 with them as well in that new environment.
51
52 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
53 Terrific. Legislator Hahn has a question.
54
55 **D.P.O. HAHN:**
56 It mentioned hardware; so, you know, as part of this -- I know

1 periodically we have to upgrade radios and make things more
2 interoperable. We've been talking about that since 2001 probably
3 or even before that, so it's been 20 years. Is some of this -- it
4 mentions hardware. I think I only heard you mentioning software,
5 so what hardware is included?
6

7 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**

8 It's going to be our PCs, our laptops that we use, things of that
9 nature, and they are all -- it's going to bring us more in line
10 with the standards of today, so we'll be able to operate the
11 Windows 10 software. As we progress with our software, it puts
12 more and more burden on our hardware.
13

14 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

15 So it's just like in the department, the laptops in your department
16 there?
17

18 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**

19 Yes, with the dispatcher's CAD program. That's a very labor
20 intensive program that requires a lot of bandwidth, so to speak,
21 from the equipment, so it's going to upgrade that as well.
22

23 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

24 Okay. So not radios or anything for departments or any help like
25 that; this is all within FRES and managing the systems and the
26 software, the hardware needed to do that.
27

28 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**

29 Yes. It's also going to support infrastructure improvements.
30

31 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

32 Thank you.

34 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

35 Thank you, Legislator Hahn. Any other questions. Seeing none, we

11 **IR 1320, Bond Resolution of the County of Suffolk, New York,**
12 **authorizing the issuance of \$1,450,000 in Bonds to finance the cost**
13 **of Improvements to the Suffolk County Fire Academy (CP 3405.327,**
14 **.410 and .513). Is there a motion? Motion by Legislator Hahn.**
15 **I'll second. Any questions? Commissioner, why don't you give us a**
16 **brief overview?**

17
18 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**
19 Yes. I'm excited about the fire academy. Since I've been here,
20 we've met pretty much on a weekly basis with now Director Johnston
21 and Deputy Director Sunderman. We have a really good work
22 relationship with them. We toured the fire academy with the FRES
23 commission. They give us a nice tour to see the grounds and the
24 training aids and to see where we're going to make the
25 improvements, so this is going to help us develop that new garden
26 apartment burn building that's needed by our firefighters to gain
27 that experience and as well as support other initiatives concerning
28 the tower, the taxpayer burn building modifications, and
29 construction of a new redesign hazardous material area.

30
31 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
32 And, Commissioner, this is a bond resolution only. I think we've
33 already approved the appropriating resolution on this; is that
34 correct?

35
36 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**
37 That is correct, sir.

38
39 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
40 Any other questions? Legislator Kennedy.

41
42 **LEG. KENNEDY:**
43 I just wanted to ask, can you divide up the amount from planning
44 and the actual construction? I support the project. I understand.
45 I just want a better idea if you have it. This is to Mr. Beckley.

46
47 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**
48 Yes, Legislator. It's \$100,000 in planning.

49
50 **LEG. KENNEDY:**
51 Okay. That's great. Thank you.

52
53 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
54 Okay. Any other questions? If not, we have a motion and -- oh,
55 Legislator Hahn. Go ahead.

56

1 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

2 I just want to make a statement. I'm really glad the garden
3 apartment burn unit is finally getting done. It's been talked
4 about for a long time, so I'm glad that we're going to get this
5 done. Do you have a timeline?
6

7 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**

8 Between 18 months and 24 months.
9

10 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

11 And the redesign of the hazardous material area, same?
12

13 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**

14 Yeah. And, you know, one thing you will also like is that we are
15 incorporating Zoom rooms because we all know that we have to think
16 of new ways to get our firefighters trained during Covid, so that's
17 go to be one of the highlights that all of our rooms will be
18 connected to Zoom, and so we will be able to provide that training
19 to fire department even offsite.
20

21 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

22 Thank you for recognizing that because I worked very hard on the
23 first online training of HAZMAT recertification courses and
24 firefighter one courses being able to get those up in a way as we
25 all know our volunteers, you know, sometimes working two jobs,
26 maybe more and taking the time to get to the academy can be tough
27 and/or into classroom spaces and so whatever can be done. It's
28 important you're particular about what doesn't require in person,
29 but there is quite a bit that can, so thank you for continuing to
30 make that possible. Whatever we can do to help volunteers, you
31 know, because as we all know, so much ongoing training that's
32 required and the easier we make that and the more seamless we make
33 that, the better off we are in retention of our volunteers.
34

35 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
