(The meeting was called to order at 11:36 a.m.)

CHAIRMAN CILMI:

Welcome to the August 31st meeting of the Fire, Rescue, Emergency Medical Services and Preparedness Committee. If I could ask all to rise for the Pledge of Allegiance to be led by Deputy Presiding Officer Kara Hahn.

Salutation

If I could ask everybody to please remain standing for a moment of silence. Please keep in your thoughts and your prayers all of the victims of Hurricane Ida, certainly all of the first responders that will be helping with the recovery rescue efforts there as well. We are on the eve of the 20th anniversary of 9/11 and we always keep in our hearts and minds all of those lost in that terrible tragedy in our nation's history and all of the first responders that sacrificed their lives, their well-being to help others and all of those first responders who are still suffering the results of that horrible day.

Moment of Silence Observed

Thank you. Before we start our agenda let me say happy birthday to our Deputy Commissioner. He's muted. Someday I hope never to have to say the words *you're on mute* again. I hope he can hear me. All right. Well, he's figuring that out.

So moving on to the -- we have no public speakers today for public portion. I do have one piece of correspondence that I'd like to read into the record. This comes to us from the Board of Fire Commissioners.

"Dear Legislator Cilmi, I'm writing you today on behalf of Suffolk County REMSCO to request improvements to the auditorium in the Suffolk County EMS building in Yaphank. This auditorium is used by Suffolk REMSCO, Suffolk REMAC and Suffolk County Sheriffs for classes, meetings and numerous other events.

Some requested improvements are repair the leaking roof, which has stained recently replaced ceiling tiles, replaced the stained and worn carpet, clean the furniture, remove old and unrepairable furniture from the stage. Any help you can give us would be greatly appreciated. I can be reached at my cell number or at my e-mail address. Thank you very much. Sincerely, John Manzi, Vice Chairman, Suffolk County REMSCO."

So that's the only piece of correspondence. And, in fact, we have no items on our -- or I should say no resolutions on our agenda today, but we do have a public hearing on our Capital Budget. And I've asked Commissioner Brown from DPW to join us today to talk to us a little bit at the advice of Nicole Amendola and our Health Commissioner, Dr. Pigott, to talk to us a little bit about that particular building and the repairs that are needed. Commissioner Brown, welcome. Thank you for being here.

1 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**
2 Thank you, Legislator. Are you able to hear me okay?

3
4 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
5 Yes, we can hear you fine, thank you. Drive carefully.

6
7 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**
8 Great. I apologize. I'm driving to a pediatrician appointment
9 with my son, so I apologize. I appreciate that we're on at the
10 beginning. I have Deputy Commissioner Hofmeister on as well. It's
11 his division that manages building design and construction, so he's
12 available to answer questions as well. Dr. Pigott did call me last
13 week to give me a heads up about this and ask questions. We have
14 done a lot of repairs recently to the mechanical equipment
15 attachments on the roof to make sure that, you know, that has been
16 causing leaks, to make sure that there were no leaks from those
17 attachments, but we do recommend that a leak diversion system be
18 set up. We're going to go take a look at it during the rain
19 hopefully (*audio malfunction*).

20
21 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
22 Joe, we lost you. You're on mute. You're back.

23
24 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**
25 Yeah, I'm sorry about that. It muted me, I didn't do that. I
26 apologize.

27
28 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**
29 We lost you at leak diversion system.

30
31 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**
32 Okay, that happens a lot. So the leak diversion system is about
33 \$25,000, you know, at the cupola which will divert any water that's
34 coming through to a place where we can collect it outside of the
35 structure. So that is something that can be done fairly soon to
36 isolate the leak and keep the leak from happening. But in the
37 long-term, you know, more major repairs initially, you know, a half
38 a million dollars and more needs to be spent to really fix the
39 roof. We do have, you know, annual contracts to do that roofing.
40 So, you know, that's where we are with the course of the last week
41 when Dr. Pigott called me about it last week. Eric, do you have
42 anything you want to add to that?

43
44 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER HOFMEISTER:**
45 Well, just some specifics about the cupola. There's a vent system
46 up there that the or louver systems that are actually not
47 watertight. So, again, as the Commissioner indicated, our staff is
48 going to get up that 40-foot ladder into the cupola during the rain
49 event this week to be able to isolate that and also to get a better
50 look at -- there's a wooden vent that's at the top of the cupola
51 that will need to be fixed at some point.

52
53 The \$500,000 that the Commissioner refers to would be to have to
54 pick that whole cupola right off of the roof with a big, you know,
55 boom and have it restored, as the building is an historic building,
56 but we think that this water diversion system will be a short-term

1 fix while we can accumulate the money to do the overall roofing
2 system for the facility and keep that area kind of watertight.

3
4 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

5 So the work that you've described that can be done in short order,
6 that you have the budget for and I can share, should be done within
7 a month's time or so?

8
9 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER HOFMEISTER:**

10 Well, once they get a better look up there. You know, in the next
11 two days they're going to figure out how to design it. It will
12 have to -- it will be like this tray system. It will have to be
13 fabricated. So, yeah, we would hope that, you know, a month or two
14 that it could be completed.

15
16 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

17 Okay. So that will hopefully be a short-term fix, then, but it
18 will not negate the need for a longer-term fix. Do we have money
19 in our capital? I know we have money in our Capital Budget and
20 Program for general roof repairs. Is there enough in there to
21 handle what's needed at this building?

22
23 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER HOFMEISTER:**

24 The overall roof system at this building will be somewhere about
25 \$1.5. When we add a cupola it will be almost \$2 million to do the
26 entire roofing system. Inasmuch as we typically get somewhere
27 around 700, 750 a year, we'll have to accumulate money for a couple
28 of years to be able to do this project.

29
30 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

31 Okay. So this -- perhaps this needs to be a separate project,
32 then.

33
34 **COMMISSIONER BROWN:**

35 Yeah, I would think that's something to be considered, Legislator.
36 You know, we do -- we already have an idea, especially with the
37 course of where we can spend some of that money in the coming year
38 so, you know, we can adjust for the \$25,000. That's not much of a
39 problem, but then looking at the bigger amount. And also, when we
40 have a chance to inspect it tomorrow or whenever it rains again,
41 we're going to have a little better idea of what that timetable and
42 total costs are going to be. We can share that with you and the
43 committee at some point.

44
45 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

46 Yeah, if you could do that, that would be great. And Eric, is the
47 Administration -- would the Administration be supportive of a
48 Capital Budget amendment to address this longer-term concern?

49
50 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER HOFMEISTER:**

51 Legislator, we certainly can look at that for you.

52
53 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

54 If you would, and again, get back to the committee and let us know.
55 As you know, we're going through Capital Budget process now and it
56 won't be long before we reach the deadline to submit amendments, so

1 we'd like to get that taken care of as quickly as possible.

2

3 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER HOFMEISTER:**

4 Okay, roger.

5

6 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

7 Great. Thank you very much. The Health Department does not have
8 any other requests in terms of the Capital Budget. Commissioner
9 Beckley, thanks for being here. How's everything on the FRES side?

10

11 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**

12 Everything is going fine, sir. Appreciate being here with you
13 today.

14

15 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

16 Okay. So nothing to add with respect to the Capital Budget and
17 Program?

18

19 **DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BECKLEY:**

20 No, sir.

21

22 **CHAIRMAN CILMI:**

23 Okay. Anybody on the committee have questions for either Eric
24 Hofmeister, Commissioner Brown or Commissioner Beckley? I don't
25 see any, gentlemen.

26

27 All right. Thank you all for being here. I have no other items on
28 the agenda. We are adjourned. Have a great day.
